Homecoming scheduled – a weekend-long event

This year's Homecoming will be a weekend event instead of just a dance in the gym after the basketball game. Beginning with the Lady Captains playing Lynchburg, the Homecoming Weekend, February 6-8, will conclude Sunday evening with a concert by Tommy Dorsey Orchestra.

Homecoming Court Presentation and Coronation will be Feb. 6 during halftime at the Captains vs. Methodist basketball game. Unlike previous Homecoming dances which were held in the Ratcliffe Gymnasium, the Warwick Yacht Club is the site for this year's semi-formal dance (men do not have to wear a tuxedo nor do the girls have to wear long formals). Admission to the dance is free.

A parade is scheduled for Saturday, February 7 tentatively. The route will be from Todd Stadium to CNC. A Pre-Game Party will be held at 6:00 p.m. in the Pub prior to the CNC-St. Andrews game. Afterwards, the Pub will be open to serve refreshments during a concert by Quietfire, a jazz trio. Tables will be arranged in the cafeteria to achieve a more "homey" effect.

Capping off the Homecoming Weekend is a concert in the CNC Theatre by the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra. Tickets will be sold to students on January 29 and 30 for \$6.00 per person in advance (limit two per person). On February 2 and 3, students, faculty, and staff will be able to purchase their tickets. Alumni can purchase their tickets February 4 and 5. The tickets are be sold to the public February 6 through 8. The price at the door is \$7.00.

Greg Jackson, of the Campus Program

Board, explained the reason for the expanded Homecoming. "The alumni expressed a desire to get involved more with the school. There is a lack of activities that enable the alumni to participate. A semi-formal Homecoming may be the way to solve that."

The President of the Alumni Association and President Anderson participate in the coronation ceremony.

A door-busting crowd is not expected at the dance, but, Jackson adds, a large crowd is expected. Hopefully student participation will make Homecomings such as this year's an annual event.




Add/Drop today

New Administration Building is difficult to get around

Many students are rapidly discovering that most CNC offices have moved to the new administration building which opened in December. Although the building is basically finished, it does lack one important thing: a directory.

If you need assistance in the Admissions Office, you will find it on the first floor of the new building. The only other office located on this floor is Veterans Affairs.

The second floor houses the Registrar's Office, the Business Office, and the Financial Aid Office. This floor was busy this week with lines of students changing classes, fixing schedules, and trying to resolve other problems. The Credit and Personnel Offices are also located on the second floor.

Need to find a professor? They are all located on the third floor. The professors offices are divided into their respective departments, which usually can be located by the sign on the door. The Math, Science, and Psychology Departments have remained in Gosnold and Wingfield Halls. The best advice for finding your professor is to ask him where his office is located now or simply to ask directions from someone in the Administration Building. Directories will be placed relatively soon in the lobby and hallways.

The President's Suite can be found on the fourth floor, along with the Office of the Vice Presidents for Student Affairs and Financial Affairs. The Internal Audit Office, Continuing Education, and the Dean of Liberal Arts are also found on the first floor.



Everyone enjoys a vacation and from the way that the men and women fared during the Christmas holidays, it was a good break. During the break, the men compiled an 8-4 record, making their over-all ledger 10-7. The Captains played two overtime games, losing one to Eastern Mennonite, 78-72, and winning the other, 76-75, against Averette at home.
