## Dorm Committee weighs designs

On Feb. 9 the Dorm committee met with architects for the last time and discussed the Preplanning Study for the new dormitories. Dr. Behymer who heads the committee, says no plans are available yet but elevation drawings will be prepared within the next two weeks.

Dr. Behymer says, "The dormitories will be targeted towards commuting students" although there will be room for non-commuters. The committee is interested in a building complex totaling 190,000 sq. ft. which will be comprised of four wings connected at an angle to each other. The wings will vary in height between 4, 5 and 6 stories each and will

accommodate at least 600 students.

Dr. Behymer says the building will be co-ed and the sexes will be separated by floors. Students will have access to all floors which will be closed off at a certain time. The ground floor will have a lounge area, dining and laundry facilities, and meeting rooms. Dr. Behymer says it will "also have a small dispensary which will hopefully be staffed by a nurse."

Living quarters will begin on the second floor. The committee is interested in two floor designs for the sleeping quarters. A "cluster" design will allow seven students to share three double rooms with one student in a small single room. The seven students will share one bath. This design is an adaptation of a suite arrange-

ment some colleges have, which will be modified to a cluster.

The other design, called a "split double", allows two double rooms to be separated by one bath. This way four students share one bath. Each double room will have a converging wall which will be built in such a way as to provide privacy for roommates. The rooms can be arranged to have either two sleeping areas, or a sleeping area and a lounging area.

The dormitories will be compatible with the architecture of the surrounding buildings. The committee is working to create a building which will complement the other buildings on campus.

## North should not be on trial

Lt. Col. Oliver North should not be on trial for what he did in the "Iran Contra Affair". He did not commit any crime, he was only doing his duty as a marine officer for aiding the anti-communist cause.

Back in 1987, what became known as the "Iran Contra Affair" came into the open. Congress had cut off all federal aid from the U.S. to the freedom fighters, who were fighting the communist backed government of Nicaragua. The Contras were people in Nicaragua who were fighting against the Sandinista controlled government in Nicaragua which took power in 1979.

In 1986, an omnibus appropriations bill was passed for the upcoming fiscal year, and an amendment was tacked to this bill making it illegal to send any kind of aid to the Nicaraguan Contras. But without such

aid the Contras would eventually break up and their cause would be lost.

North, along with his superiors set about to sell arms to the moderate forces in Iran, who in the future could be a new ally of the U.S. Since Khomeini, the current dictator of Iran will be dead in a few years because of his advancing age, it would be a wise thing to have the people succeeding him on our side. Especially because of Iran's position near the Soviet Union and the Persian Gulf.

North's critics and the many factions on the liberal side, including the major media, talk of the immorality of trading arms for hostages. But the end certainly does justify the means in this case. When the whole business is to win two allies to the U.S. side. No crime was committed, no law broken, just because of a minor amendment of a bill, which had nothing to do with the important appropriations bill it was attached to, happened to be violated.

The proceeds from this arms sale was

used to aid the Nicaraguan Contras until other aid from the U.S. Congress could be restored.

Where would the U.S. be today if the government of France had not sent aid and even troops over to the American colonies to help the "American" freedom fighters of 1776? Remember France helped our own ancestors win their independence from the dictator, King George III, of Great Britain.

The U.S. has a duty to halt, prevent, or overthrow communist aggression anywhere in the world. Because America's number one enemy is the Soviet Union and the Soviet's goal since 1917 has been world domination.

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



## Captains steal championship

For the third time in four years, CNC will make an appearance in the NCAA South Regional Tournament. The team travelled to Terre Haute, Indiana to play Rose-Hulman Institute of Technology (18-7). The winner of that game will play the number one seed, Centre College (21-5) in Danville, Kentucky.

In the first round of DIAC tournament play CNC defeated Va. Wesleyan, 70-51. Lamont Strothers led the team in scoring with 28, followed by Rodney Bradshaw with 14.

On Friday, the team met Greensboro College two hours late and on the court of Bayside High School in Va. Beach, due to the snow storm. CNC came out on top, 88-81. Troy Wright scored a tremendous 36

points, while Strothers had 18. In that game Strothers also passed the mark for seasonal scoring, with his current total of 670.

The Championship game was played back at Va. Wesleyan on Saturday. The lead flopped from side to side, with CNC holding the lead over NC Wesleyan at the final buzzer. The Captains won 54-51. It was the second time that CNC beat NC Wesleyan in the finals, after being defeated by them twice in the regular season.

Two members made the All-Tournament team, Lamont Strothers and Troy Wright, along with Chris Bratcher and Marvin MacKlin from NC Wesleyan, and Jeff Dastmalchian of Greensboro.



## Pell Grant form now includes drug use question

(CPS) — In a move some student advocates are calling reminiscent of "1984's" Big Brother, the federal government said Feb. 3 it would start asking students who get Pell Grants to prove they don't use illicit drugs.

The measure was published in the Federal Register, the list of regulations and rules the government produces to enforce federal laws. The drug rule, which will automatically go into effect if it's not formally challenged within 90 days, was created to implement the Drug-Free Work Place Act of 1988. It asks that all federal grant recipients like weapons manufacturers, highway builders and apparently even students work in "drug-free" environments.

Applying it to students, said Sheldon Steinbach of the American Council on

Education, the campus presidents' lobbying group in Washington, D.C., was "a strained interpretation (of the law) that strikes me as being beyond the pale of what was intended."

The U.S. Dept. of Education, which issued the rule, disagrees.

Somehow, students will have to swear they're not drug abusers.

"We're deciding if students will have to sign a separate form or just check a box on the grant application form," said department spokesman Jim Bradshaw. "But they will have to certify they are drug-free and not using the funds for drug-related activities."

If students lie on the form, Bradshaw said, they could lose their grants.

Still, no one knows how to determine if they are lying. "We don't have the resour-

ces to check on every student," Bradshaw admitted.

"We'll base our information on tips that students have gotten involved in drugs or on newspaper articles about drug activities," Bradshaw said.

Past convictions for drug possession or sales shouldn't affect a student's Pell Grant application, Bradshaw said, but it is an issue the Education Department is considering.

"If the money is going to be used for drugs, then it's better if they hand it to someone who would make good use of it," said a Pell Grant recipient at San Diego City College, who asked that her name not be used.

"It's great," she said.

"But Kevin Harris, organizing director of the United States Student Association in

Washington, D.C., called the regulations "an invasion of the personal right to privacy," and a poor signal for the new Bush administration to send to students.

"I think you'll hear a large outcry from students in opposition to this regulation," Harris predicted. "It's another signal of Big Brother looking down on the student population. They want to blame youth for the drug problem. It's crazy."

In fact, students are not the only ones being attacked in the war on drugs. In early January, Florida Gov. Bob Martinez announced that, starting in August, all new state employees — including faculty members, administrators, staffers and student workers at State University System of Florida campuses — would have to pass drug tests before being hired.

## Marijuana as addictive

Q) My roommate uses Marijuana on a daily basis and says he can't stop. Could he be addicted? What are the symptoms?

A) If he uses on a daily basis he is a chronic user and if he says he can't stop this is a definite indication of addiction.

## as other drugs

If your friend has consistently used more Marijuana to get the same effect this is a sign that he has tolerance to the drug, a symptom of addiction.

If he exhibits any of these symptoms there is a great likelihood that he is addicted: irritability, insomnia, anxiety, nausea (upset stomach), vomiting, dizziness (loss of balance), diarrhea, sweating, tremors or decreased appetite. All of the above are symptoms of withdrawal which appear after the drug leaves the user's system.

Symptoms of toxicity from Marijuana use which point to addiction are impaired breathing, increased infections, bronchitis and coughing, impaired task performance, memory lapse, abnormal thought process, disordered thoughts, and distorted perception.

If your friend displays a compulsion to use which indicates craving and continues to use Marijuana in spite of adverse

consequences he has the symptoms of addiction.

I have described physical symptoms in the above paragraphs and will now give you secondary symptoms which also point to addiction. Some of these are: pre-occupation with getting high, loss of interest in other activities, decreased work and/or school performance, increasing financial expense, difficulties with family and other relationships, morning use, trying other forms of Marijuana, decreased motivation, using alone, mild paranoia, fears, anxiety, and use with inferiors.

Keep in mind that the addicted person generally does not have all of these symptoms. It is not necessary to have them all to qualify as having an addiction. If you observe any of these behaviors or symptoms in your roommate he may definitely be addicted and most certainly has a problem. Encourage him to seek help.
