## Statue planned for new entrance to school Trible to be immortalized in bronze when Shoe Lane is rerouted

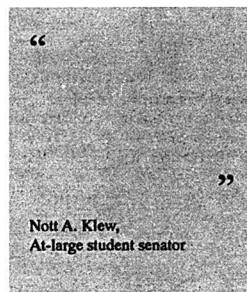

Nott A. Klew, At-large student senator

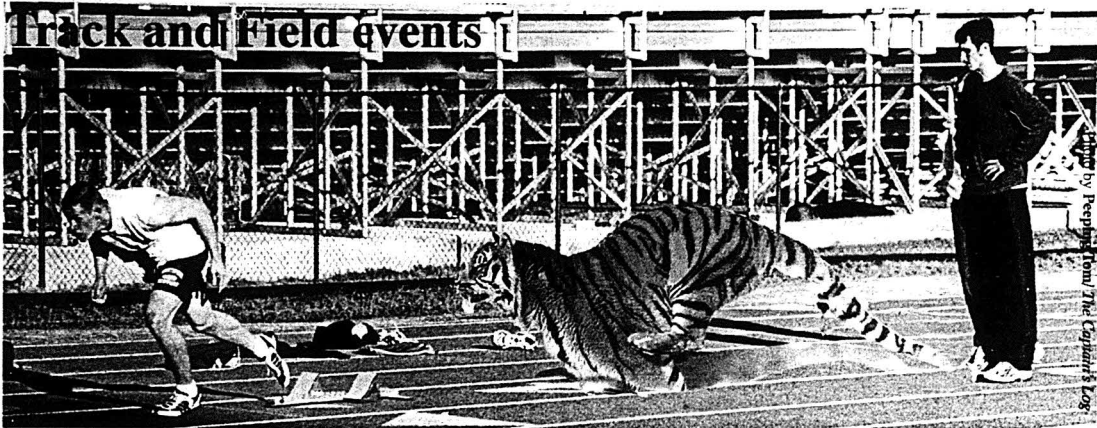

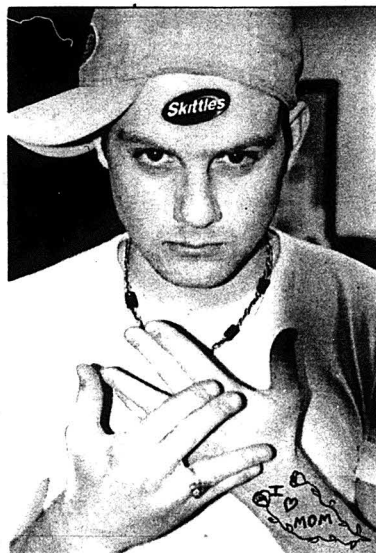

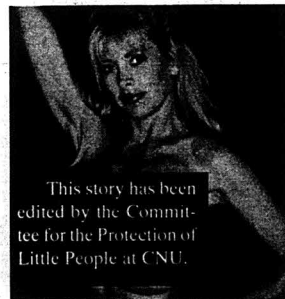

## Canine athletes mark CNU as their territory Title K-9 brings equality, biting victories to CNU's athletic department

Think of it as affirmative action for dogs.

In the last 10 years a ground swell has developed in the canine community and found fruit with the passage of Title K-9 in 1997, creating a quagmire in the athletics world.

Title K-9 is a 1997 law mandating that, "no dog in the United States shall, on the basis of canine characteristics...be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving federal financial assistance."

Title K-9 came out of the work of the Council on Athletics Negative Influence on canines in Educational Institutions, or C.A.N.I.N.E., that met during the Westminster Dog Show of 1989.

"We were of the thought that something had to be done," said Maggie Schumblers, a 35-year old Pomeranian and C.A.N.I.N.E. committee member. "Countless numbers of our puppies had gone on to some of the finest colleges and universities in the nation, and all were denied opportunities to participate in NCAA athletics. We had to take some kind of action."

Word spread quickly through the dog community, with puppy activists speaking at kennel coffee-houses to drum.

Reginald Frisky, a 73-year old West Highland Terrier, was a leader in the early years of C.A.N.I.N.E.'s work and learned first hand about the hard face of bigotry.

"Dogs in sports really was a subject that no one wanted to talk about," said Frisky. "There was a great deal of opposition coming from all sides. The humans in the athletic community didn't want to play with dogs. We heard a lot of threats and nasty names. A day didn't go by when some human wouldn't call me a bitch."

But even through hardships, people started listening to the doggy activists. It wasn't until 1997, however, that real headway was made.

Senator Charles Hagel (R-Nebraska) took the initiative in equal rights for dogs in sports.

"Thank god my Sheepdog, Constituency, alerted me to this," said Hagel. "No American should ever be denied their right to equality in their daily lives. I felt it was my moral duty to do something. I mean, I marched at Selma for godssake."

There is little doubt that Title K-9 has enhanced canine sports. According to an Associated Press article, in 1997 there were less than 18,000 dogs participating in a collegiate sport. Now there are more than 72,000 puppy athletes nationwide.

At CNU, Title K-9 is still an issue that is being dealt with. But there haven't been any legal challenges to the athletics department.

"Just making sure that we are in compliance with Title K-9 can be a very diffi-

cult matter," said Athletic Director C.J. Woollum. "We have begun a few new sports for dogs here at CNU. There just is a lot of distrust lingering between the dog and human communities. We have instituted a number of dog awareness classes for our student athletes. The answer for us has been awareness and understanding. We have been working closely with Alex Butterfield, Coordinator of Student Programs, to make sure the campus as a whole knows about this."

Opponents of the law argue that teams with doggy participants will become flea infested and bitten. Wrestling and football in particular contain some of Title K-9's most vocal opponents.

"I mean who wants to wrestle with a mangy, flea-ridden mutt," said CNU athlete Patrick Humphries. "I don't want to be out on the mat wrestling some Husky

and have to worry that he is going to go for the jugular."

Charges like these, however, taken hard in the canine community.

"Yeah the flea and biting charges," said canine athlete Lassie Jr. "Doggy athletes aren't like that. This kind of stereotyping has to stop. Why must the entire community be stigmatized because of a few unwashed and overly aggressive individuals?"

As Title K-9 reverberates throughout the nation, its impact at CNU may be felt even more in the years to come.

And Woollum is ready.

"Here at CNU," he said, "we are way ahead of the game in accordance with Title K-9, and are prepared for the future of canine athletics."

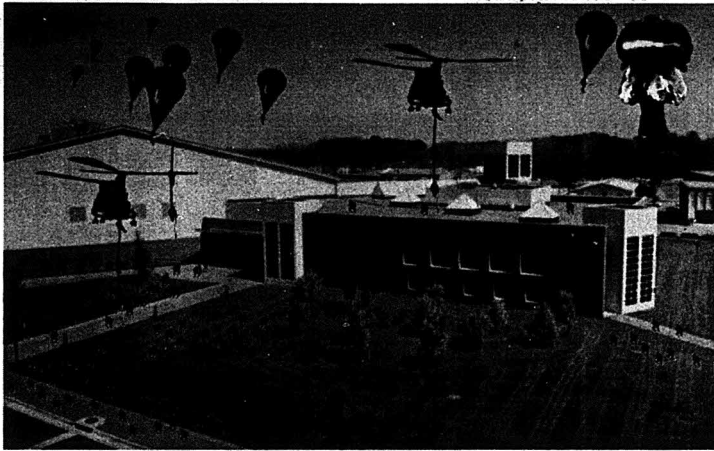

## ROTC plans to violently take over Freeman Center

"I say it's all good if we have some young, fresh women frolicking in the air, feet above the crowd. These women are

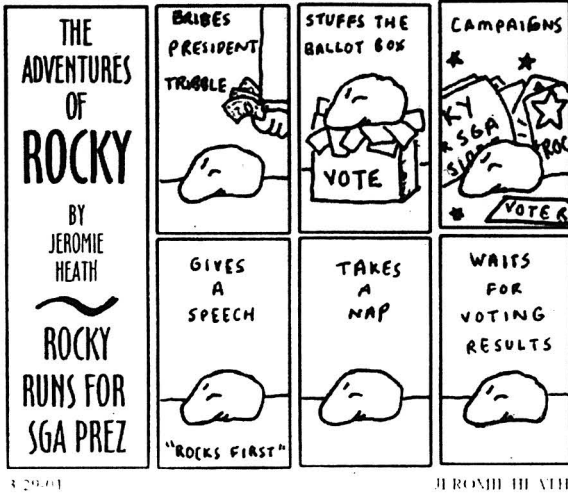

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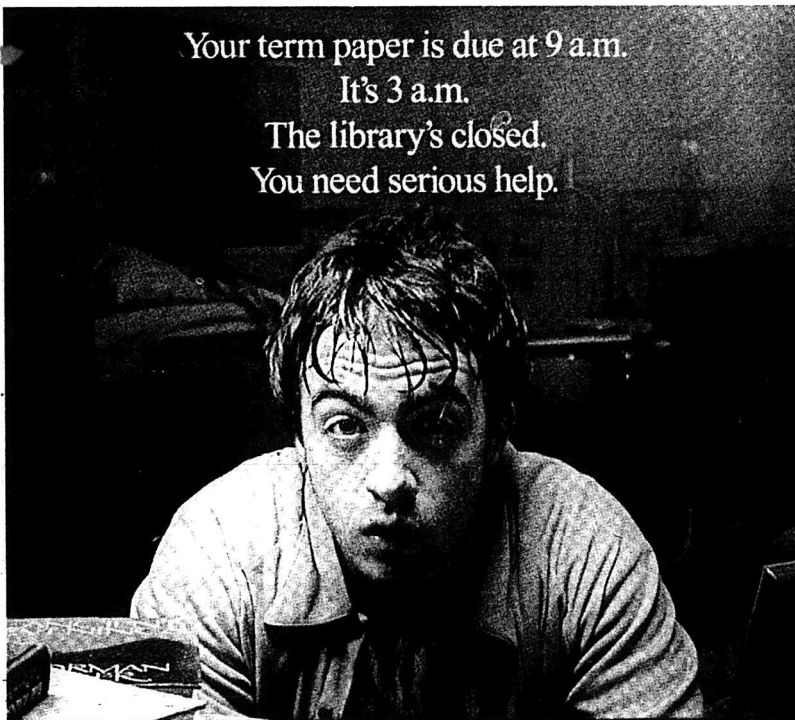
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
