Final Grades - Fall 1980

Due to the timing of our holiday recess and commencement it is necessary to mail grade reports to students on 23 December 1980.

This means that your final grades must be entered into the system throughout the final examination period. We do not have the resources to enter most of the grades on the last day they are due. Therefore please follow the specific guidelines of hand delivering grades to the Office of the Registrar, second floor of the new administration building as follows:

- 1. 24 hours after each examination for graduating seniors note separate green grade sheets.
- 2. 48 hours after each examination for all other students note regular grade sheets.
- 3. Final deadline for grades for examinations given on December 19th and 20th will be 3:00 P.M., Monday, December 22, 1980.

This will require a major cooperative effort on the part of faculty, Registrar's staff, and Computer Center staff.

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Change in Christmas Holiday Leave

Traditionally, Governors have authorized State Government offices to be closed for one-half day on Christmas Eve, December 24. This practice was taken into consideration for the holiday schedule previously published in a memorandum dated August 15, 1980.

This year Governor Dalton has authorized offices to be closed all day on Friday, December 26, 1980 and Friday, January 2, 1981 instead of one-half day on December 24. Since December 25, 26, 29, 30, 31, and January 1 are already authorized holidays for classified employees, the two additional days the Governor has authorized will be observed on Wednesday, December 24, 1980 and Friday, January 2, 1981.

The College will close at 5:00 P.M. on December 23, and remain closed until 8:00 A.M. on January 5, 1981. All days are authorized holidays and annual leave is not charged. Necessary services shall, of course, be maintained and all employees required to work on these days are eligible for compensatory leave.


Graduation Ceremonies
