Paris! The Riviera! Monte Carlo! Geneva!

This program combines the charm and cultural experience of Paris with the provencial land-scapes made famous by Van Gogh and Cezanne, the excitement and holiday atmosphere of the Riviera and the natural beauty of Geneva.

Departure: June 25, 1987 (approximately) to July 8, 1987

- Day 1 DEPARTURE from the U.S.A. overnight transatlantic flight.
- Day 2 PARIS Upon arrival in Paris, welcome by your guide and transfer to your accommodations. You are free to rest or start your discovery of Paris this afternoon.

 Dinner at the hotel.
- Day 3 PARIS Morning panoramic tour of Paris by motorcoach including the Champs Elysees, La Concorde, Notre Dame Cathedral and the Etoile. Afternoon and dinner on your own.
- Day 4 PARIS GIVERNY Morning at leisure. Afternoon excursion to Giverny, Monet's legendary estate where he painted most of his impressionist masterpieces. Dinner on your own.
- Day 5 PARIS Full day at leisure in the City of Lights!
- Day 6 PARIS AVIGNON The day is free to take a cruise down the Seine by Bateaux-mouches, climb the Eiffel Tower or visit the controversial Pompidou Center. Later transfer to the Gare de Lyon to board the TGV, the world's fastest train, to Avignon. Dinner and overnight in Avignon.
- Day 7 AVIGNON NIMES TARASCON Full day excursion to the 2000-year old Pont du Gard, the most famous Roman monument in France. Continue to Nimes, founded by Emperor Augustus to visit the Maison Carree, inspired by the legendary Greek Parthenon, and the impressive amphitheater which was the site of many combats during the early days of Christianity. Then to Tarascon where you will visit the imposing fortress still controlling the entrance of the Rhone Valley. Return to Avignon for dinner and overnight.
- Day 8 AVIGNON AIX Morning visit to the Palais des Papes dominating Avignon with its splendor. Drive across Province to Aix and stroll down the splendid Cours Mirabeau, stopping to admire the 17th Century Fountain of Dolphins Dinner and overnight in Aix-en-Provence.
- Day 9 AIX CANNES NICE After breakfast continue to fashionable Cannes, for a stroll along the Croisette then on to Nice, the "Queen of the Riviera," for dinner and overnight.
- Day 10 NICE Full day at leisure in Nice: You can visit the Chagall and Matisse Museums, stroll along the Promenade des Anglais, observe the fish merchants at the Vieux Port or at the hotel or a restaurant nearby.
- Day 11 NICE MONACO Morning excursion to one of the smallest countries of the world, Monaco, and its internationally known capital of Monte Carlo. On the way you will be able to stop at the village of Eze which commands a magnificent view of the Mediterranean. Afternoon at leisure in Nice.
- Day 12 NICE Full day at leisure. We suggest an optional tour to Grasse, the perfume capital of the world and the artistic village of St. Paul de Vence. Dinner in Nice.
- Day 13 NICE GENEVA After a day at leisure in Nice and dinner, transfer to the train station for the overnight train with "couchettes" to Geneva.
- Day 14 GENEVA Upon arrival transfer to your hotel. Full day to discover the delights of this diplomatic city set on lovely Lac Leman. Visit the charming square "Place Bourg de Four" and walk up the narrow streets and steps of St. Peter's Cathedral for a spectacular view of Geneva and the lake from the North Tower. You may visit the United Nations or walk along the lake to see the Alps and Mont Blanc Europe's highest peak. Tonight enjoy a typical "fondue" dinner.

Day 15 HOME - After breakfast, transfer to the airport your return transatlantic flight. Arrival U.S.A. on the same day.
