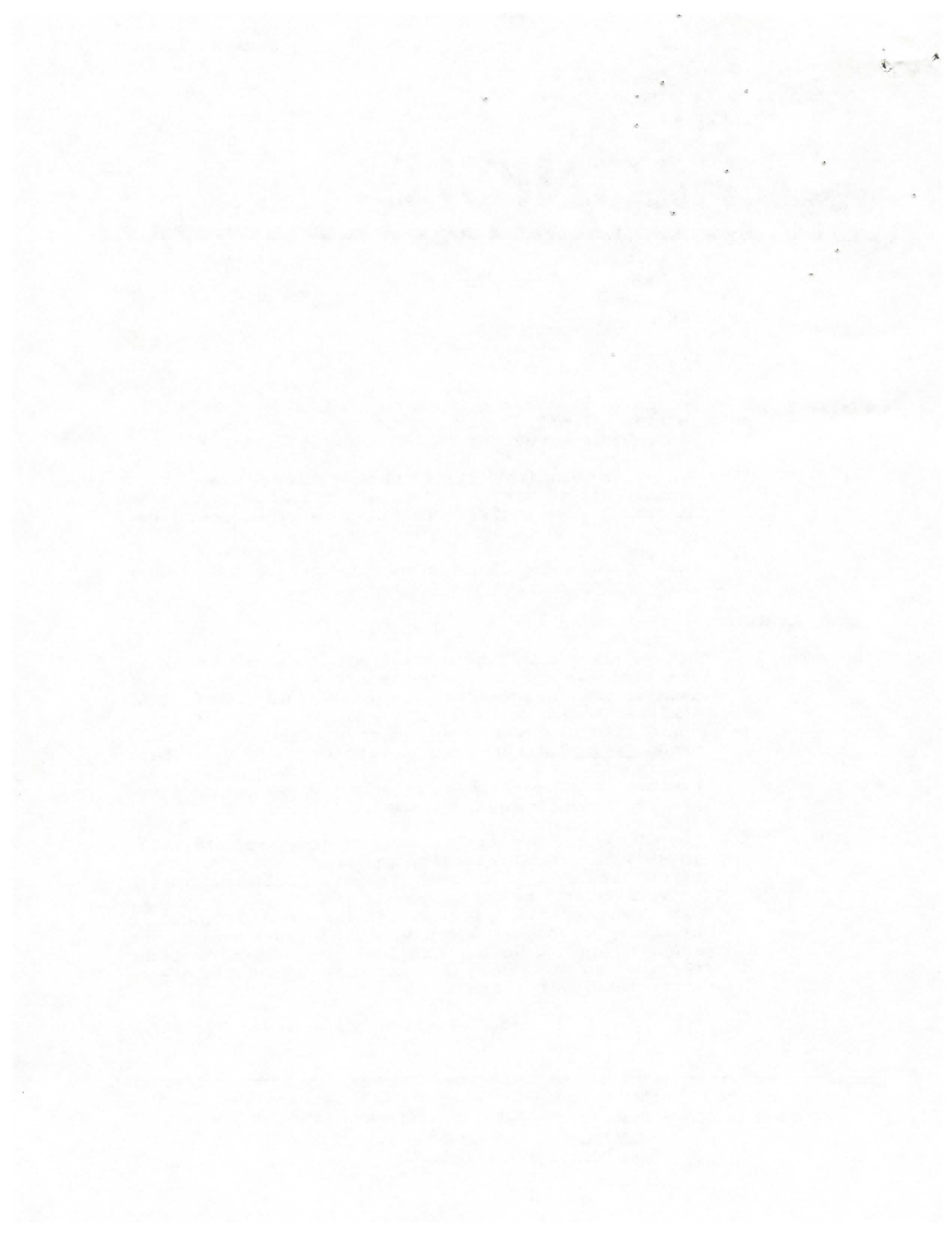

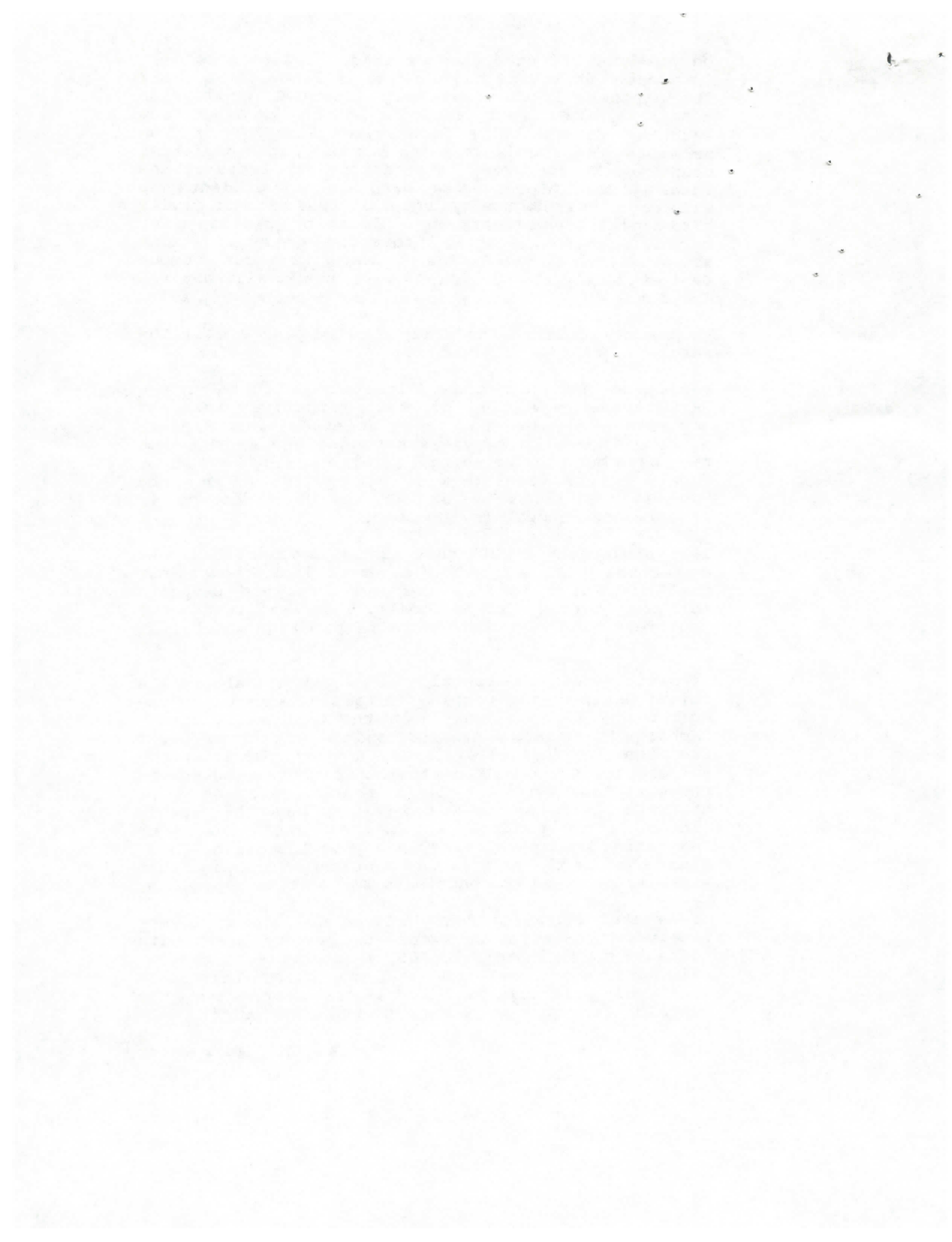
Virginia
Campaign

I am pleased to report that at the close of business on Wednesday, Nov. 7, we had received \$3,196 toward our goal of \$7,000 for the Combined Virginia Campaign (slightly over 45% of our goal). Thus far, twenty-two employees have contributed to the campaign which ends for us on Nov. 26.

I have received several calls asking about the relationship of the Combined Virginia Campaign to the United Way Fund Drive. Both the Combined Virginia Campaign (for state employees) and the Combined Federal Campaign (for federal employees) are broader in scope, but encompass the United Way in their distribution of unrestricted gifts. If you wish all of your contribution to go the United Way, or any other agency listed in the booklet, you may of course do so by indicating the appropriate agency on the pledge card. Also, this is the only annual charitable campaign that you will be asked to contribute to as state employees.

Given that close to four hundred College employees received information and twenty-two have responded with gifts of approximately \$3,200, I am confident that we will achieve our goal of \$7,000 even though this is an admittedly difficult year for all state employees. The Campaign appreciates your continued generosity.

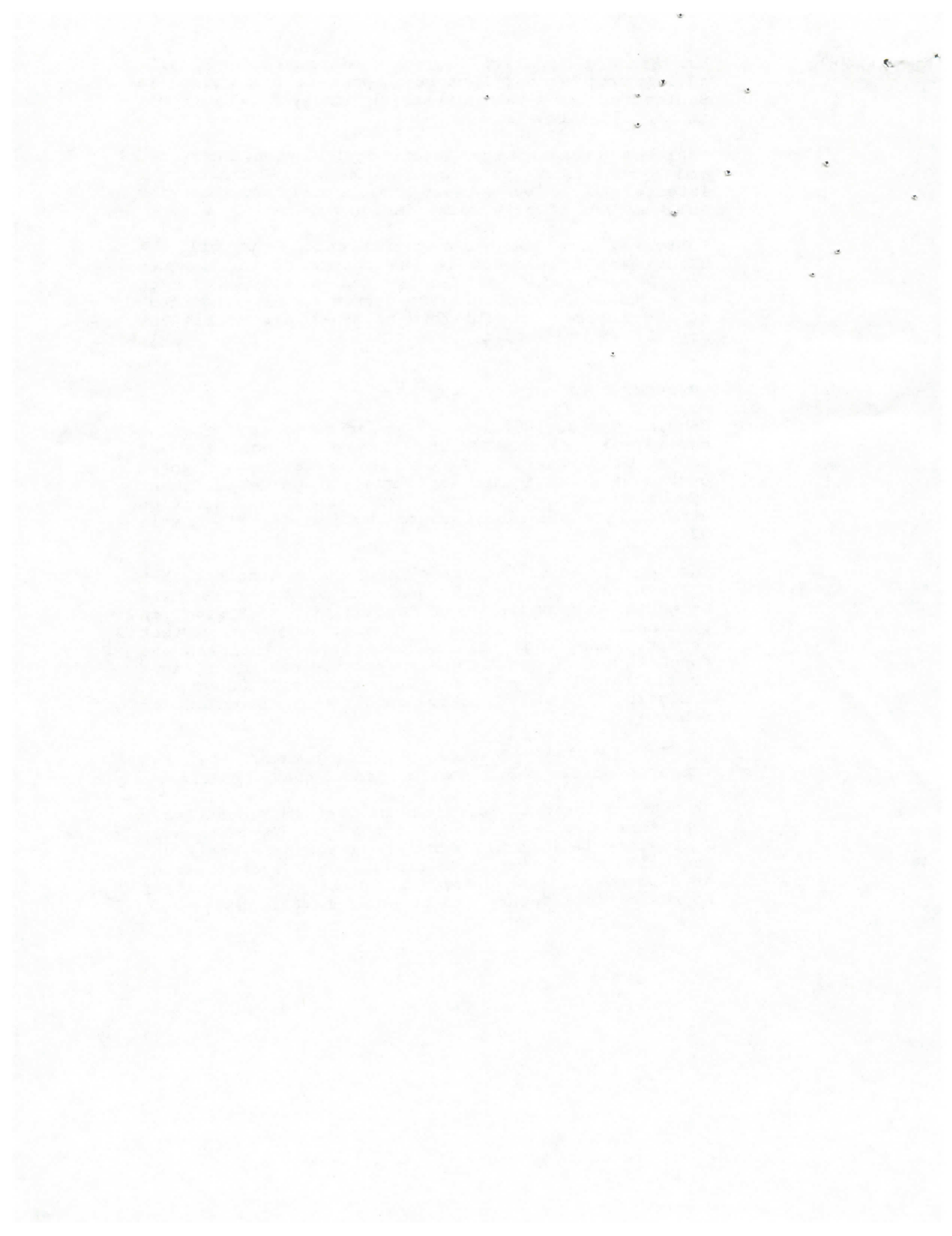
Faculty

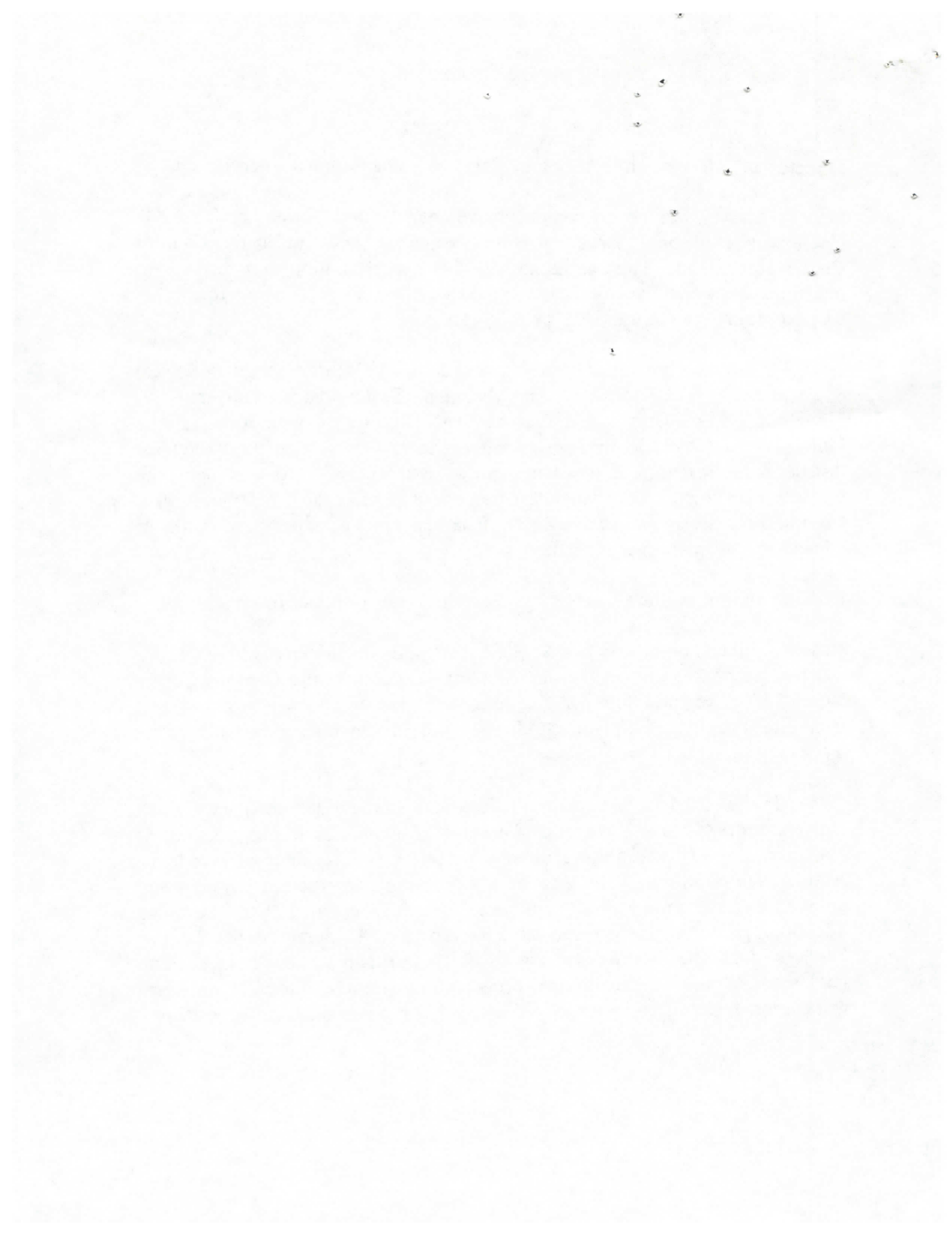
