Next year the SGA will assume a new title and a new structure based on Academic Divisions (such as Arts and Letters, Business, etc.). Each Division, as outlined in the April 5 issue of the *Captain's log* will elect a President, Vice President, and Department Chairmen. Each of these Divisions will operate under the organization known as the Student Association, headed by a President, Vice President, and Attorney General. Elections for each of these positions will take place in front of the Campus Center Theatre from 8 am to 8 pm on Thursday April 21, and from 8 am to 5 pm on Friday, April 22. candidates in their department. Departments or divisions that do not have candidates on the ballot for offices may have write-ins for the candidate of the voter's choice. A write-in must have 25 votes to be eligible for elections. The results will be posted in the Campus Center by 8:00 Friday.

Students running for office on Thursday and Friday are as follows: Mike Leininger, the current President of the SGA is running for re-election in the SA position; incumbent Joy Cipriano and challenger Bev Walker are running for Vice President of the SA; Charlie Brown is seeking the office of Attorney General; and Bill Bell and Jim Cobb are running for the office of President of the Business and Economics Division.

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Student Graduation Committee presents recommendations

The Student Graduation Committee, headed by Alice Frapoli, submitted a report to President Windsor based on research done by the Committee and polls taken by the students expressing its suggestions for future graduation procedure. The following article highlights the most important suggestions made by the Committee, and President Windsor's response.

The Student Graduation Committee recommended that CNC hold two graduation ceremonies, one in December and one in May. Each ceremony to be funded equally and both to be held in the Hampton Coliseum with nationally known speakers. The committee felt that two equally impressive graduations could be provided for a total expenditure of no more, and perhaps less, than is now being spent for three ceremonies of varying magnitude.

The Committee recommended, for the future composition of graduation committees, that the chairman of the Senior Caucus be appointed Chairman of the Graduation Committee; and that the remaining members consist of three graduating seniors appointed by the Student Association (SA), three faculty members appointed by the President, and the Registrar and Assistant Registrar as *ex officio* members. The Committee recommended a procedure for obtaining speakers for the two graduation ceremonies. The first step would be to poll the rising senior class in the spring for suggestions concerning graduation speakers. The Graduation Committee would review these suggestions based on budgetary requirements of the institution and the speakers' availability to attend the ceremony. In the early Fall the committee would offer a slate of feasible candidates to the graduating seniors to establish a final priority. The committee finally proposed that the choice of graduation speakers and the responsibility for this crucial aspect of graduation would rest solely in the hands of the representatives of the graduating seniors; even to the point of contacting and engaging the speakers for both ceremonies.

Finalizing their report to President Windsor concerning the restructure of the graduation procedures, the Graduation Committee stated: "We strongly feel that the recommendations of a committee constituted in such a fashion and operating under the procedures outlined above should be honored as rigorously as possible."

Response by President Windsor

I want to express appreciation for your excellent research and report on future graduation exercises at CNC. I have discussed your recommendations with appropriate persons in the administration. The Faculty had previously expressed its views.

My decisions on these matters, as set forth below, will not please all interested parties

completely, but I hope that they represent a middle and support ground which everyone can accept on a trial basis. We will continue to evaluate and refine the system in light of our experience.

We will have two graduation ceremonies per year, one at the end of the first full week in January and one at the end of the second week in May, the precise dates to be established when the session calendar is confirmed. For 1978 the dates will be January 8 and May 14. Each ceremony will be scheduled for the early afternoon so that out-of-town guests will be able to get an early start on their return trip.

To have the mid-year graduation immediately after classes end, and prior to Christmas, creates unreasonable hardships on all concerned. Our experience suggests that only a very few of our first semester graduates would not be available at the first of the year. We have also found it practically impossible to secure a prominent speaker on the weekend prior to Christmas.

Those who complete their degrees at the end of the summer session will receive a Certificate of Completion which will confirm that all requirements for the degree have been met and that it will be awarded officially at the January exercises. This arrangement will in no way interfere with employment opportunities.

We will have a graduation ceremony in August, 1977 as planned.

Each graduation will be held in the Coliseum where we have the advantages of unlimited parking and seating space. It is desirable to have our graduation ceremonies on campus, but we have outgrown our facilities. Utilizing the Coliseum allows us to invite the public to our graduation exercises, thus providing an educational opportunity for the community which reflects favorably upon the College.

An annual budget will be established which will provide equal funding for each of the graduations. Within the limitations of the budget, prominent persons will be invited to speak on each occasion.

The above assumes that future graduating classes will wish to have a speaker. Traditionally, a speaker has been a significant part of this academic ceremony.

The present Graduation Committee will plan the August 1977 graduation. A new committee will be appointed to plan the January and May graduations for 1978. The new committee will consist of three graduating seniors appointed by the Dean of Academic Affairs; and the Registrar and Assistant to the President as non-voting, *ex officio* members, the Chairman of the Senior Caucus will serve as chairman.

The new Graduation Committee as described

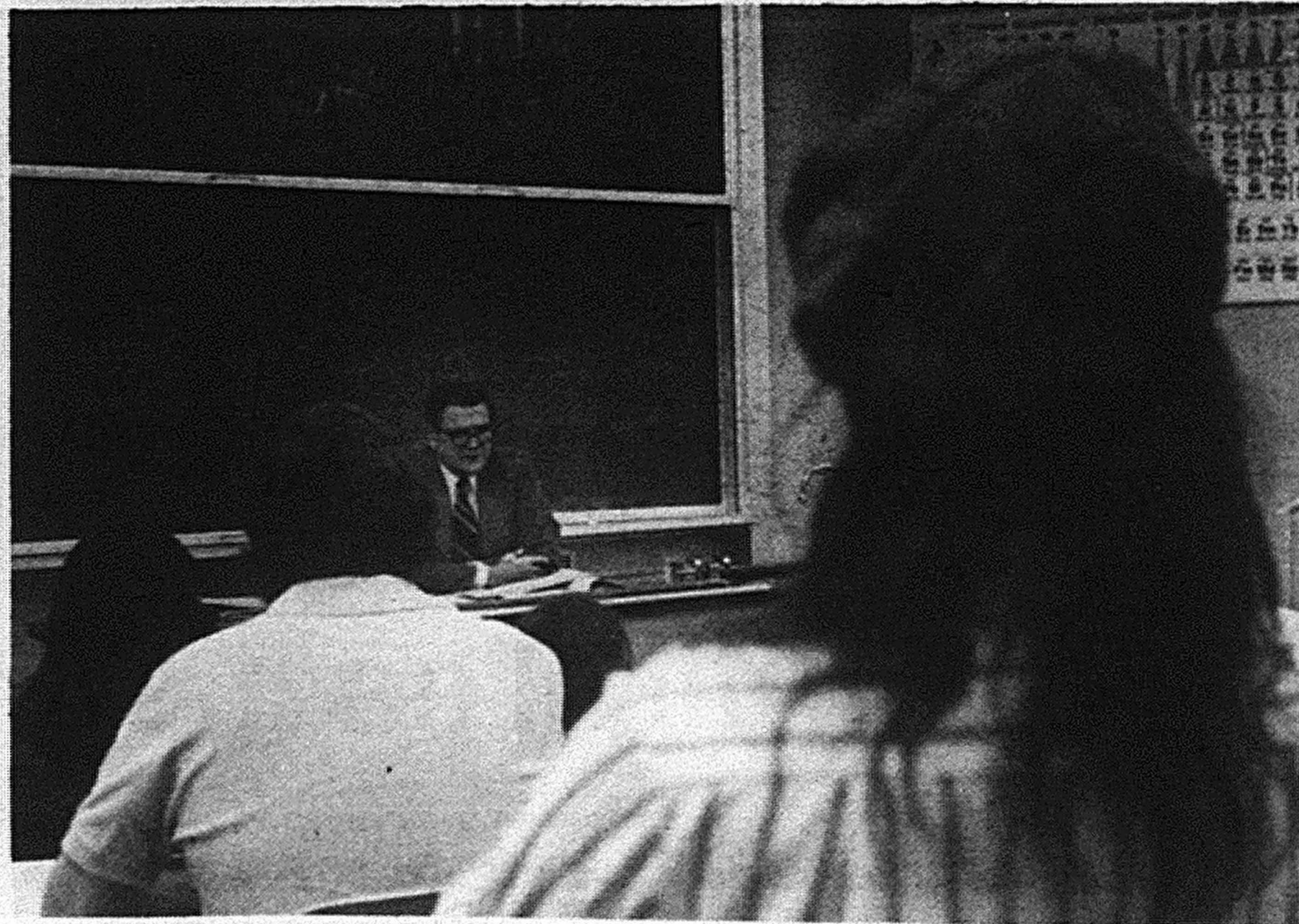

Tennis Team springs big Div. I win

There has been a new and unique entry made in the record books of athletics at Christopher Newport College. So new in fact, that the ink is hardly dry. Unique in that this type of log has never been made before. The event? The quashing of a Division I school by CNC, a Division III sports school.

It is also unique to note that this breakthrough was achieved by a sports team that represents possibly one of the fastest growing outdoor events to sweep the country - tennis.

It's true. Christopher Newport travelled to "scary" and infamous Lexington Va. to meet the Keydets of Virginia Military Institute in tennis competition. The result, as predicted by Coach Armistead and many of his high riding players, was a 6-3 win by the Captains over VMI.

Although the three losses were at the hands of VMI's # 1, 3, and 6 singles, the Captains swept the doubles competition in addition to winning at the # 2, 4, and 5 singles.

In talking with Coach Armistead about this tremendous win over a Division I school, he again mentioned the fact that we were superior in doubles all the way. "I felt we played tough in singles competition, but our doubles play was truly remarkable. With the exception of ODU, (CNC lost to Div. I ODU 9-0 earlier) we were

phenomenal in play against a Division I school. Let me say this though, we weren't outclassed over at ODU. We lost, but they didn't kill us."

Given the opportunity to talk about the atmosphere around VMI during a sporting event, Coach Armistead said, "There was a 21 gun salute, helicopter flying overhead, alligators nipping at our heels, and a three star general was there to watch our match."

"This win put our program over the hump. We can play any Division III school in Virginia and North Carolina. We can also play with many Division II and some Division I teams.

The following day, the CNC team moved on to Greensboro, North Carolina with a double meeting with Greensboro College and the University of North Carolina-Greensboro. Playing against Greensboro College on Friday, the CNC squad was given a scare, as the Greensboro team opened the match by defeating our first three singles. The Greensboro College courts are only three large, so when our team came off the court down 0-3, it would have to be said that they were pretty down.

An example of two of the first three singles gives an idea of how close we lost. No. 2, Johnny Roberts opened the first set with a 6-0 win but lost the match in three sets. No. 3 Sean Baier went up 6-4 in the first set and also lost the match in three sets. Top seed Mike Hash also fell to defeat as the top three singles of CNC lost.

However, the bottom three singles of Larry Shelton, Alex Vazquez and John Ireland, all came back to defeat their opponents. Couple that with a sweep of the doubles competition and it adds up to an important Dixie Conference win for the Captains over Greensboro, 6-3.

"We were surprised," says Armistead, "by the quickness of the first three singles. The team was down, our backs against the wall, but we fought our way back and I think that shows you the character of this team. Their no. 1 doubles played at no.2, giving Sean and Alex a heck of a time (6-7 5-2 6-0 6-2). With Hash and Roberts match already won, Shelton and Ireland came back and iced the win at the no. 3 doubles, 6-1, 6-2."

On Saturday, the team moved across town to UNC-G and again faced tough competition, but walked away with a 5-4 win.

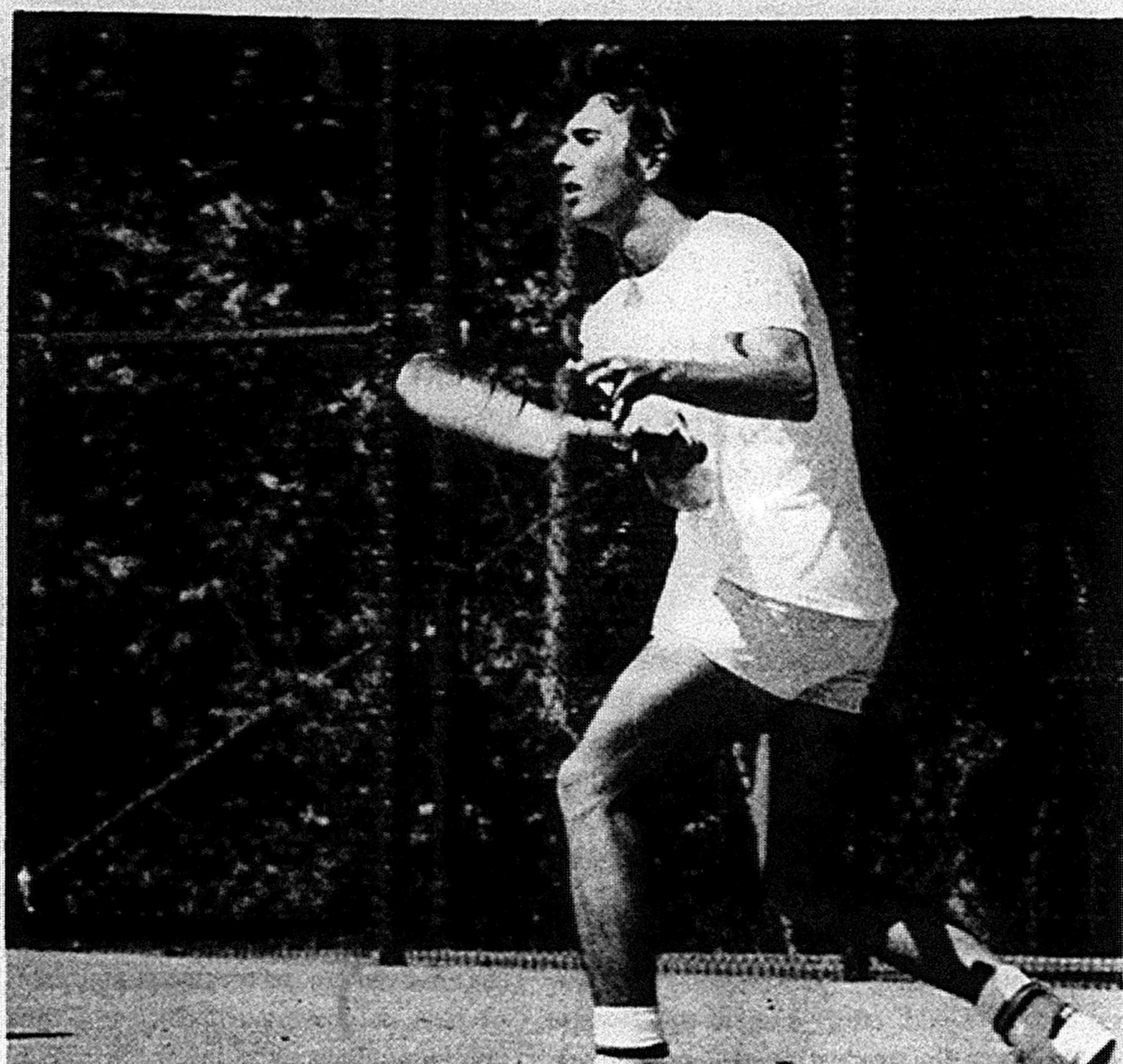

Says Armistead, "We went into the match pretty tired, playing well everywhere except for the no. 6 singles."

The key match against UNC-G proved to be CNC's tough (and undefeated in conference play) doubles combination of Sean Baier and Alex Vazquez, a combination which Armistead calls "very tough".

This win over UNC-G is very significant as they stand second in the conference behind CNC. These players are to be commended for their efforts after such a tiring trip covering

many miles in three short days.

A Tuesday home meeting against Virginia Wesleyan College proved to be an easy task for the Captains as they went up 8-1 in another Dixie Conference matchup. So easy in fact that Coach Armistead pulled his no. 1 and 2 players for a rest and moved up Sean Baier into the no. 1 singles position. This was the only loss against Virginia Wesleyan as Baier fought against a tough no. 1 opponent losing in three sets, 3-6, 6-4, 6-0. As indicated by these scores

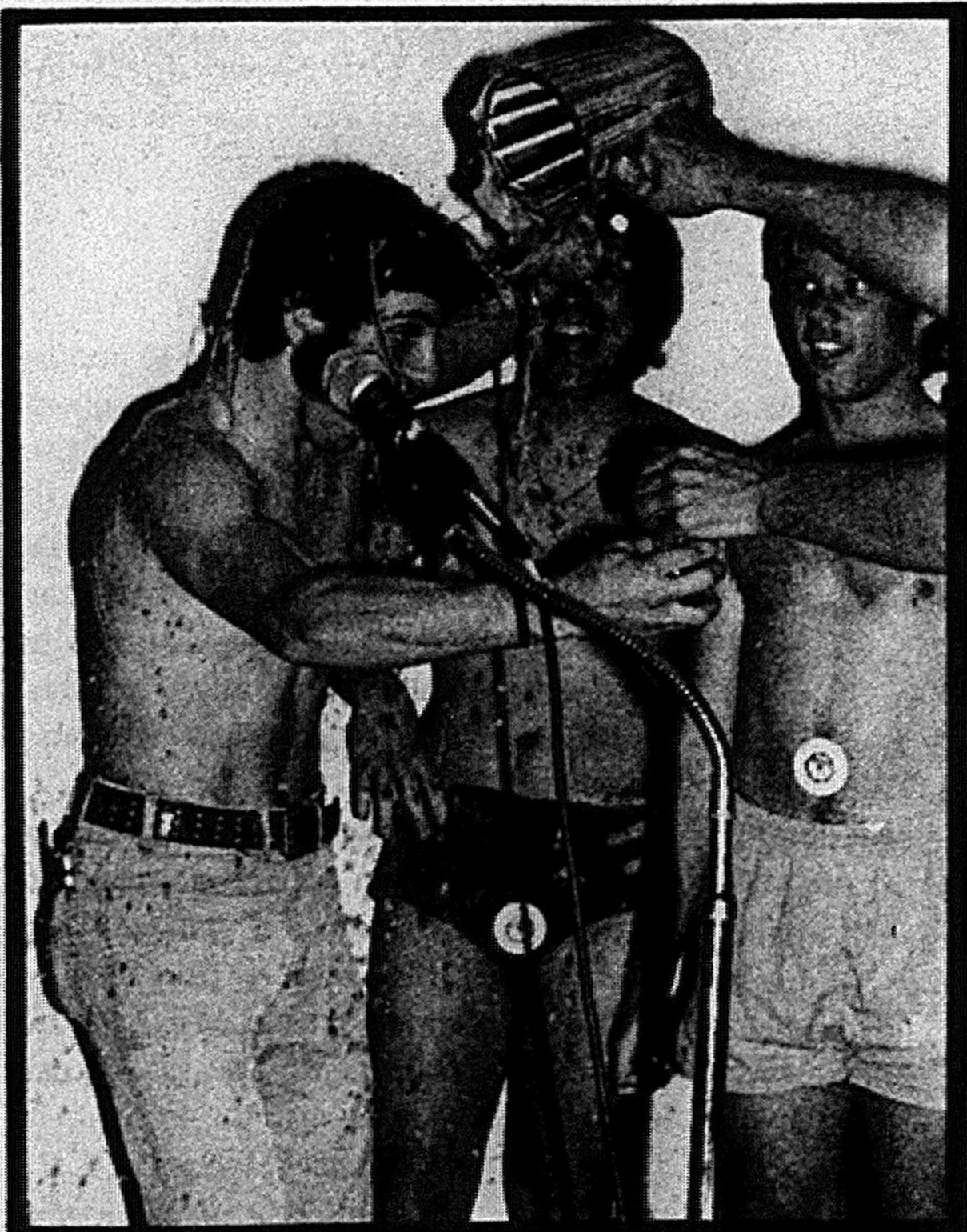

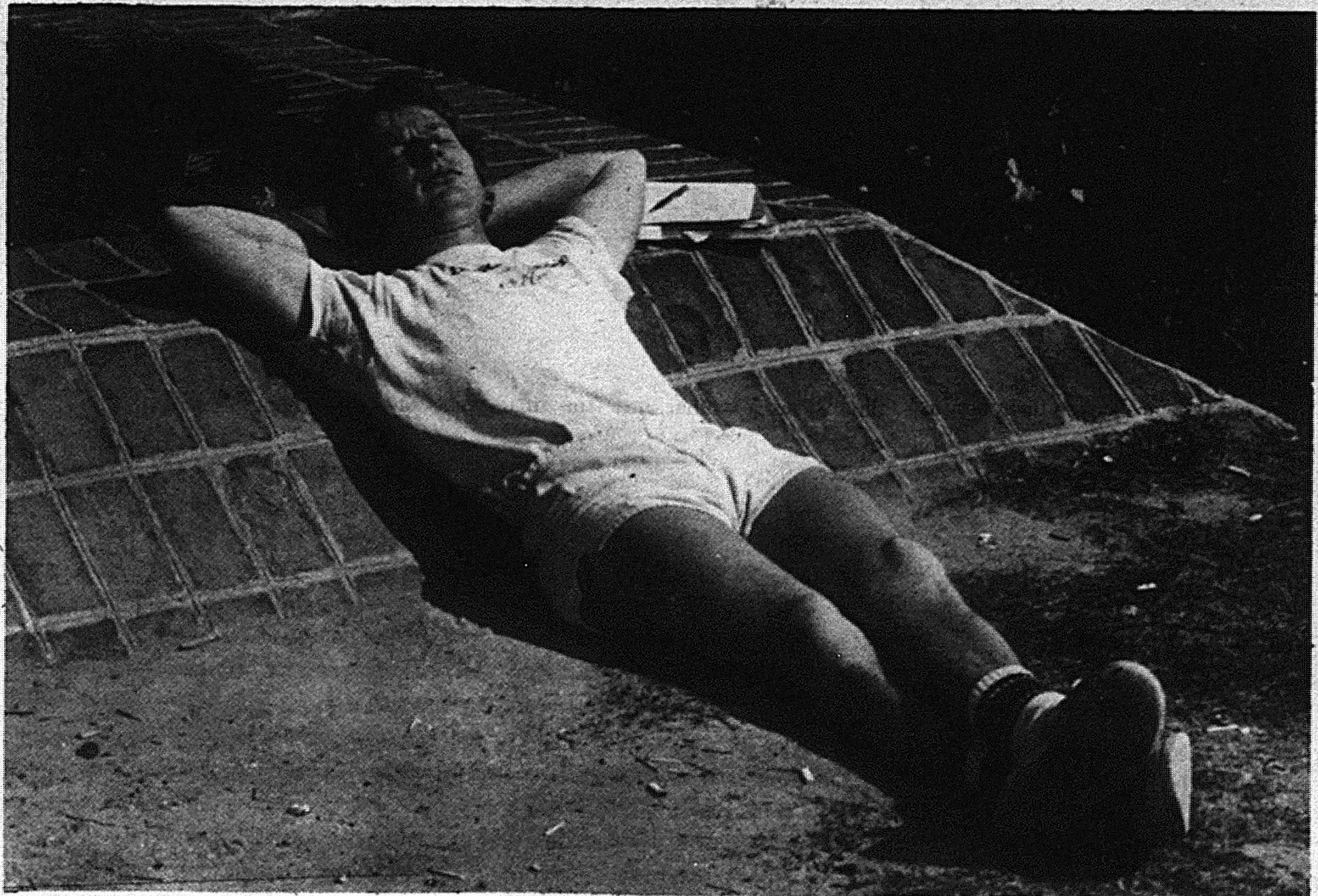

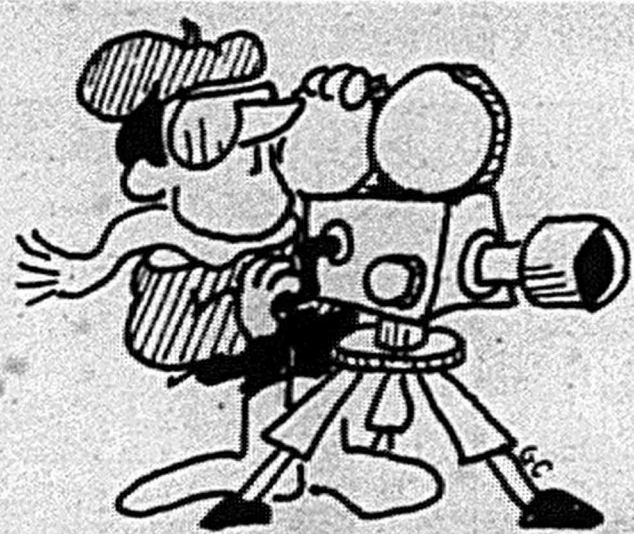

Movie Reviews by David Bruce

Horror flicks Things that go bump in the night

Well-made horror films have become a reality only in recent years. The horror flicks of the thirties and forties may have been effective then, but they are looked upon now as either unconscious self-parodies or camp.

The fifties brought about the advent of the low-budget, poor quality "B" horror flick which became instant camp. At least the horror flicks of the thirties and forties almost withstood the test of time. The "B" turkeys soon branched out from horror to beach movies [*Beach Blanket Bingo*], gangster films [*The St. Valentines Day Massacre*], and other sundry garbage. Roger Corman became the "B" movie creator. In the sixties, it was he who was responsible for the Edgar Allan Poe movies starring Vincent Price. He also attempted to film H.P. Lovecraft's *The Dunwich Horror*. The only thing Corman accomplished was to demonstrate that it is difficult, if not impossible, to transfer Poe and Lovecraft on the screen. Both writers' work contain poetic craftsmanship, precise, subtle imagery and a feverish intensity which cannot be transferred to the second (with the exception of the late Rod Serling's successful screen renditions of Poe's and Lovecraft's works on his short-lived and excellent *Night Gallery*).

This is not the case, however, with the writers William Peter Blatty, Peter Benchley, Stephen Kings, and Richard Matheson.

Blatty's *The Exorcist*, probably the only thing this awful writer will ever be remembered for, was quite possibly the most chillingly effective horror flick ever made. This is probably due to the fact that it was filmed by the extremely talented director William Friedkin [*French Connection*]. *The Exorcist's* shocking scenes, when combined with Friedkin's remarkable talent for making the unreal appear startlingly real, combined in the most tasteless, grotesque, horrible yet effective horror flick ever made.

Again, the success of the other most effective horror flick - *JAWS* - was due to its talented director Stephen Spielberg [*Sugarland Express*]. Spielberg's Hitchcock-like suspense and Benchley's shocking violence were mixed brilliantly for stunningly visceral shock effects. Happily, Spielberg eliminated the Harold Robbins-like hack subplot, in which ichthyologist Hooper and Chief Brody's wife had an adulterous liason which added nothing to the main plot. Spielberg also wisely changed Benchley's portrayal of the shark as instrument of Divine Will, and instead made the creature an indifferent eating-machine straight out of 19th Century Naturalism a-la Stephen Crane. Unfortunately, Spielberg let Wunit - the most asinine screen character since Scarlett O'Hara - remain. Spielberg is now filming *Close Encounters of the Third Kind*, which deals with encounters with outer space creatures. According to reports, *Close Encounters* is the *JAWS* of science fiction horror flicks.

Stephen King is one of the worst hack writers in the history of hack writing. Somehow, however, he is a success. King's *Carrie* was recently filmed by director Brian De Palma [*Obsession*]. The film is an obviously self-

conscious self-parody. Piper Laurie is brilliantly sarcastic in her characterization of Carrie's religious fanatic mother. The whole film is richly comic until the final scene of spectacular revenge. This scene, in which Carrie unleashes her powers and the immensely creative and uniquely personal De Palma loses his cinematic bag of tricks is by itself worth the price of admission. Sissy Spacek is totally believable in her role as the homely victim of relentless torment - Carrie. Miss Spacek is an actress with a range and versatility equalled only by actor Robert De Niro. The entire film presents a Thomas Hardy like view of humanity bound together by unmerited suffering which ennoble us all. In *Carrie*, all are victims of chance, circumstance, heredity, and environment. Fate and Fortune are the real monsters, not the telekinetic Carrie. King's *The Shining* will be filmed soon by the greatest director in the history of cinema - the one and only Stanley Kubrick. It will be fascinating to see what Kubrick does with horror, as he has proved himself capable of masterpieces in nearly every other film genre.

The Omen is probably the only horror film which sustains a level of suspense and creates a real feeling of over powering, primal, malevolent, supernatural menace. Seven scenes in the film are particularly effective and spectacular: the suicide of the nanny, the baboon attack, the impalement of the priest by the lightning rod, the decapitation of the photographer, the assault of the hell hounds in the grave yard, Damien's attack on his mother, and Gregory Peck's attempted execution of the anti-christ. The photography, special effects, and music are all effective. Like *Rosemary's Baby*, *The Invaders* and *The Stepford Wives*, *The Omen* reflects a paranoid middle class attitude of the seventies that there is something out there which is out to get us, which only a select few can see and will believe in and which we are powerless to stop. It would be interesting to see a psychological study done on these films and this attitude.

Richard Matheson is the most talented, literate, creative, and prolific of all modern horror study writers. Matheson has written three novels which he subsequently transferred to the screen: *The Incredible Shrinking Man*, *I Am Legend* (filmed twice with Vincent Price as *The Last Man on Earth*, and with Charlton Heston as the *Omega Man*) and *Hell House*. Matheson wrote the screenplays for the TV movies *Duel*, *The Night Stalker*, and *Trilogy of Terror* (with Karen Black.) He and director Dan Curtis (*Dark Shadows*) made the most faithful and literate screen adaptations of the horror classics *Dracula* (with Jack Palance), *Frankenstein* (with Bo Svenson), *The Picture of Dorian Gray*, *The Turn of the Screw* (with Lynn Redgrave), and *Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde* (with Jack Palance). These films contain brilliantly constructed horror and important, significant, profound statements about the human condition. They transcend the horror film genre into the category of universal art. The Matheson-Curtis collaborations are the best horror films ever made.

To work it all off and help relieve the tensions of this semester, a full afternoon of crazy

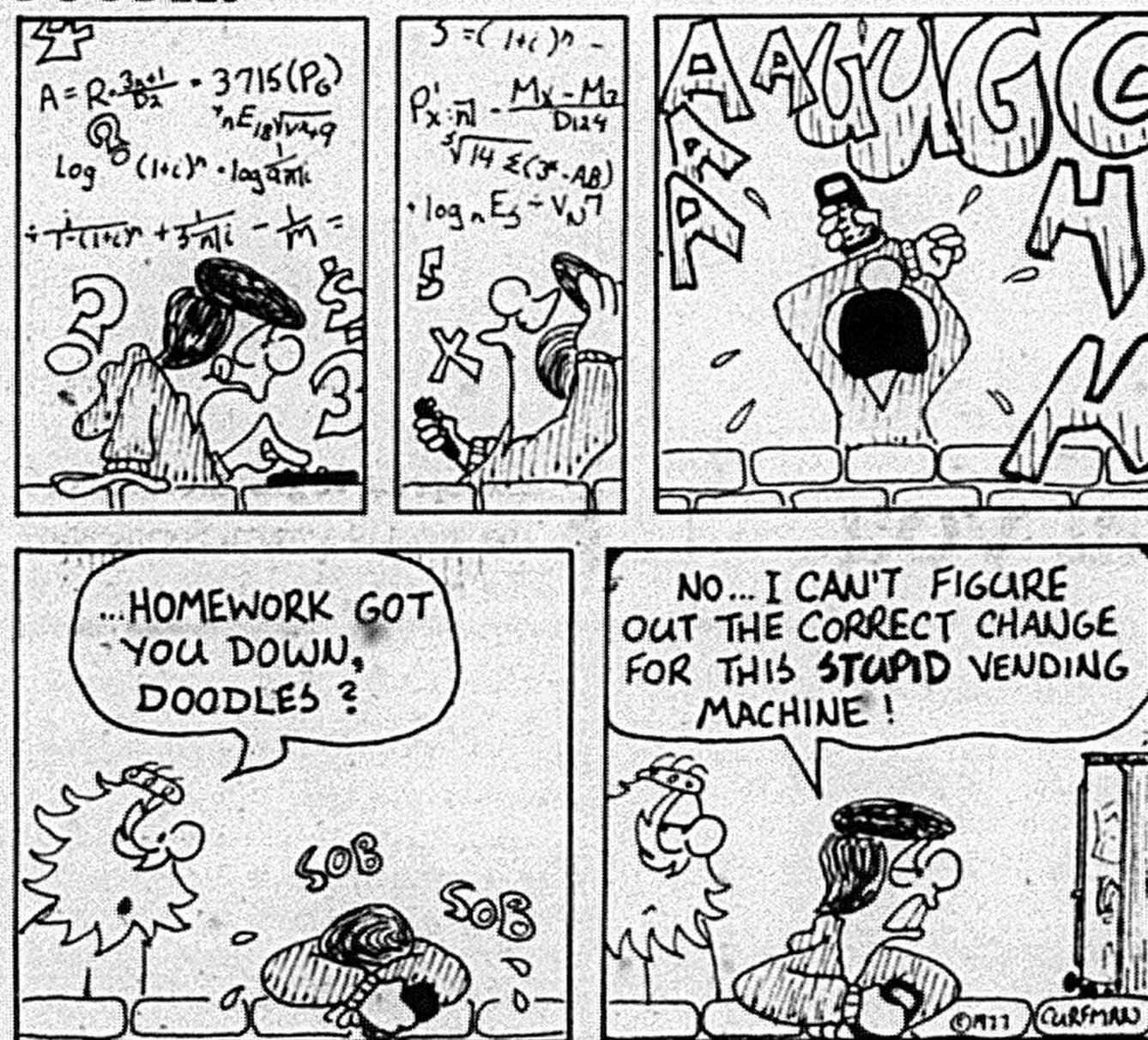

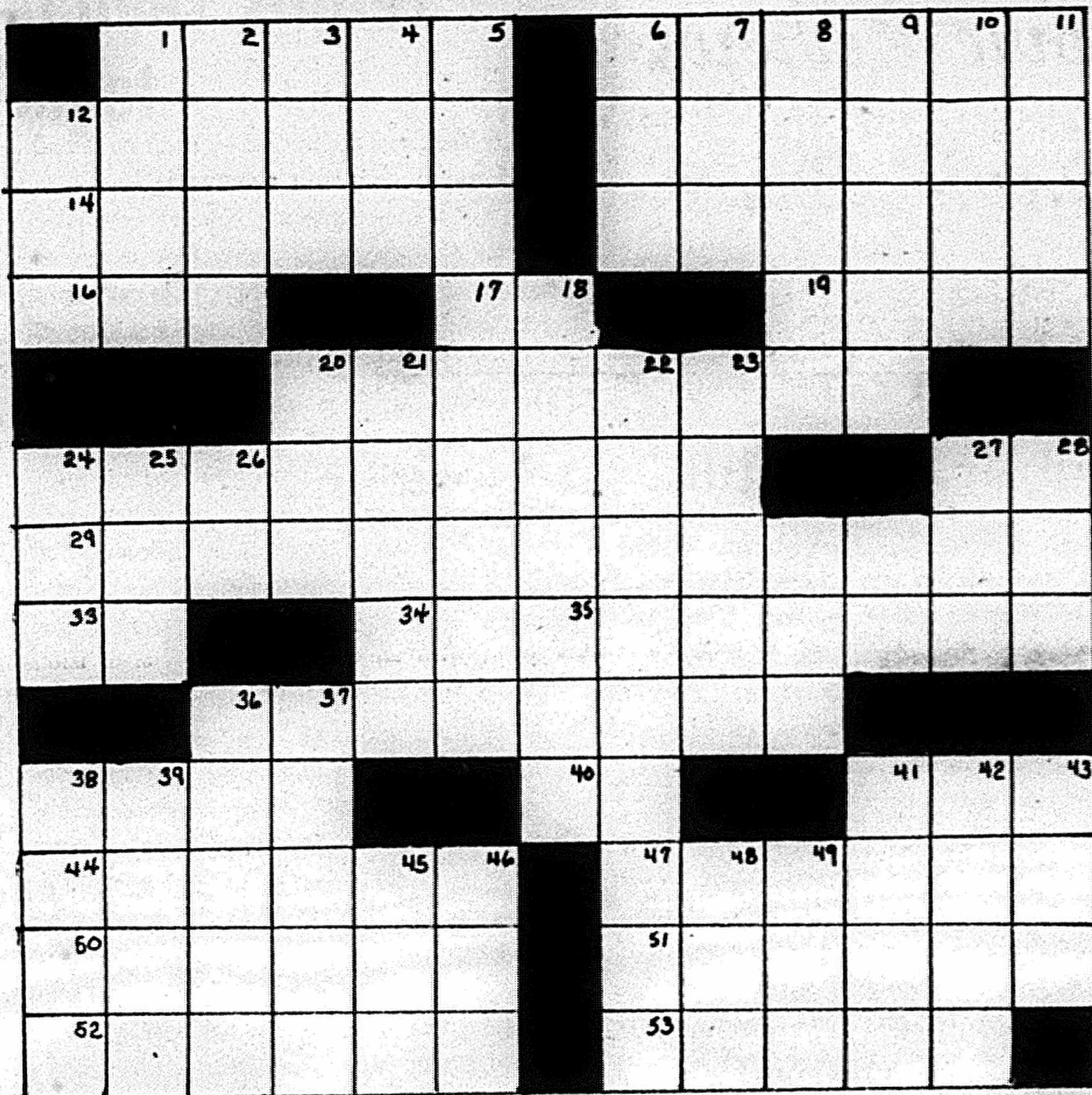
