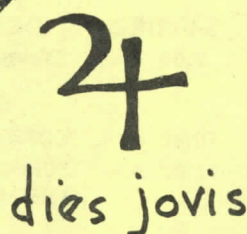

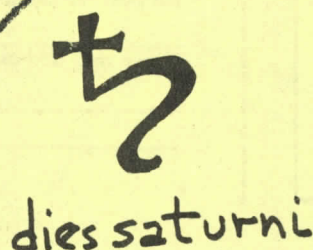

Tenure Workload Study

I would be pleased to provide a briefing for any faculty members who are interested in the State Council Tenure Workload Study on Friday, September 19, at 3:00 P.M. in N125.

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Dropping A Course Without Penalty

Last Spring, Ron Persky introduced a motion, passed by the Faculty, which extended the time period during which a student could drop a course without penalty to one week beyond the date for mid-semester grades. The motion called for extending the drop-without-penalty period to the end of the eighth week of class, however the eighth week of class is significant only in terms of its relationship to the date of reporting mid-semester grades. Unfortunately, the motion was passed after the 1975-77 Catalogue went to press.

In the 1975-77 College Catalogue, October 17 (fall semester), and March 1 (spring semester), are listed as the dates for mid-semester grade reports and the last day for dropping a class without penalty. In the light of Professor Persky's resolution, the date for dropping a course without penalty will be changed to October 24 in the fall semester. Because of the time scheduled for spring vacation, the date for submitting mid-semester grades in the spring will be changed to February 27.

Please note these changes in your copy of the College Catalogue and/or your copy of Dean Edwards' administrative calendar.

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Conference on Retirement

Sister Benedict Donahue, CNC adjunct professor and Professor of Music and Art at Hampton Institute, has been instrumental in procuring a grant from the Virginia Foundation for the Humanities and Public Policy to conduct a conference on October 23, 24, and 25 on the topic of How Senior Citizens Might Enrich Their Retirement Years Through the Study of the Humanities. Information pertinent to this conference may be found below in this issue of the CNC Community Chronicle. I would like to recommend this conference as a very worthwhile activity for both faculty and students. The conference is not simply for the elderly. Students taking courses in the humanities and social sciences are especially urged to attend. This is a Peninsula community project, and an excellent opportunity for faculty members to interact with community people as professional teachers and scholars. There is no charge unless participants attend the Friday evening banquet or require accommodations in the Chamberlin Hotel.

In general, the bottom line indicates that this semester we enjoy an enrollment increase of about 12%. The notice concerning the new William and Mary library cards which was published in the Chronicle of September 5, 1975, was incorrect. The correct information was published the previous week, August 29, 1975, in the library column and is repeated below:

A change has occurred in the circulation procedures at the Earl Gregg Swem Library of the College of William and Mary in that they have recently implemented a machine charging system which requires that each borrower have a plastic library card for use with the machine. Christopher Newport faculty members may obtain library cards by filling out a registration form, which will be marked to indicate the special borrowing privileges to which they are entitled. (The basic loan period for special borrowers is six months, with an option to renew books in person once only for a like period of time.) The Swem Library charges a \$1.00 fee to cover the cost of these library cards.

GRANTS & FELLOWSHIPS

Teach or Study Abroad

Grants will be available to teach abroad during academic year 1976-77 or to attend a seminar abroad during the summer of 1976. Teaching positions will be available in a number of countries in Europe, the Middle East, the Far East and Africa. Some of the positions will involve an interchange with a teacher from abroad: others will be one-way assignments.

Summer seminars will be held for teachers of German in Germany, for teachers of the classics in Italy, and for teachers of art in Belgium and the Netherlands. Seminars may be held for teachers of World/Asian history and supervisors of social studies in India and Pakistan, subject to the availability of funds.

Eligibility Requirements: U. S. citizenship; bachelor's degree; 3 years of teaching experience for the teaching positions; 2 years for seminar grants for teachers; 3 years for seminar grants for supervisors and curriculum directors.

West Germany has established a fund for German-American exchanges in honor of the American Bicentennial: the John J. McCloy Fund, to be set up under the American Council on Germany. The aim is to exchange young politicians, representatives of free professions, and youth leaders, to arrange German-American conferences and to support important publications on German-American relations.

National Science Foundation

Comprehensive Assistance to Undergraduate Science Education

A new program, authorized by Congress and signed by the President during the summer, which will take over the best features of the COSIP program.

U. S. - France Exchange of Scientists - Information on procedures is available. Competition is open between September 1 and November 1, 1975.

Scientists and Engineers in Economic Development Program

Will provide support for scientists to apply their experience to specific problems of development in an extensive list of countries. Deadline: December 15, 1975

Student-Originated Studies - Deadline: November 10, 1975

Technical Innovations in Education - designed to improve the quality and quantity of science instruction. Proposals may be submitted at any time.

National Endowment for the Humanities

Humanities Consultants on Campus - Deadlines: October 1, 1975, January 1, April 1, and July 1, 1976.

U. S. Department of State

The Department has designated \$600,000 to support mid-term research initiatives in fy 1976. Four topical foci have been suggested for the first year of the program. Further information should be available following a September 24 Task Force meeting.
