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FROM THE REGISTRAR

Spring Program Planning - The period for program planning with advisers will be May 14 to May 23. Information and assignment to adviser will be mailed to returning students on or about May 9.

NOTE: Those students who have not returned the form indicating their plans for the fall will receive no information and no assignment to advisers.

Settle Your Accounts - Students are reminded that all fees and fines should be paid by May 23. Grade reports and transcripts are not released until all accounts are settled. Please take care of this right away.

Summer Session Elsewhere - If you wish to take a summer course at another college this summer and transfer the credit to CNC, be sure to pick up the permission forms in this office.

Declaration of Major - Rising juniors who have not declared their field of concentration should fill out the necessary form in this office before the end of the semester. During the summer, reports of your progress toward fulfillment of degree requirements will be prepared. This will be done only for those who have declared a major.

Conversion to Four-Point Grading System - Effective June 1969, the College will adopt a four-point scale of grading in which grade points will be assigned as follows: A = 4; B = 3; C = 2; D = 1; F = 0. Each returning student will receive during the summer, probably about August 1, a statement concerning this conversion as it applies to him.

Fall Schedule and Registration - Schedules for the fall classes will not be available before August 1. Those who plan to work might want to arrange a flexible job schedule until they can set up a class schedule.

All students who will register in September will be expected to meet with advisers sometime during the week preceding Registration Day for the purpose of setting up their class schedules. More information concerning this procedure will be sent to students around August 15. Registration Day is on September 17, 1969.

CAMPUS FOLK MASS

For the convenience of CNC students, a Folk Mass will be held on campus on Ascension Thursday (obligation day), May 15th, at 12 o'clock. This Mass is to be celebrated outside between Gosnold Hall and the parking area. In case of rain another location will be announced. LETTER FROM VIETNAM

Newport News, Virginia

Dear Dean:

I am writing to you on behalf of myself and a buddy. We are both serving in an Army postal unit in Vietnam, stationed in Vung Tau.

Our unit operates a base post office which handles approximately 20,000 pounds of mail per day. This is the reason I am writing. We get very little mail ourselves and naturally this is very discouraging when we are exposed to so much of it each day.

Many Americans have only a vague idea of what life is like here in Southeast Asia and how much letters mean to the GI's serving here. We would love to hear from any coeds who would be interested in corresponding with either of us. We are in our early 20's, and like most American guys are greatly interested in girls, music and sports.

Being in Vietnam has changed our lives tremendously as you have to adjust to a complete different way of life here. Letters certainly mean a lot.

We would appreciate it very much if you will pass this letter along to the proper channels.
