SUBJECT: Transfer of Responsibilities

Effective September 1, 1992, the procurement of computer related items will be the sole responsibility of the Office of Purchasing who will provide both the APR (Agency Procurement Request) approval required by the State Department of Information Technology (DIT) and the purchasing approval required by the State Department of General Services. In this capacity, the University's Office of Purchasing will administer the "Blanket" purchase contract for computer equipment and supplies and will be responsible for following the relevant state regulations. The CNU Office of Information Technology Services will continue to provide design and configuration advice on a voluntary basis. Please call ITSV at extension 4-7180 to request these services.

Also effective September 1, 1992, all telephone related activities and services will be transferred from the Department of University Services to the Office of Information Technology Services.
