

Faculty/Staff Activities

Dr. Clyde Brockett, professor of music, and Dr. Elizabeth Jones, professor of modern & classical languages & literature, were inducted Friday, March 24, 1995 into Alpha Delta Gamma, the founding chapter of the recently established National Honor Society for Medieval and Renaissance Studies. The ceremony was held in the Wren Chapel at the College of William and Mary.

Dr. Sandy Bryan, director of overseas internships & assoc. professor of education and leisure studies, was invited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to evaluate the 10-year self study for Colegio Jorge Washington in Cartagena, Colombia on March 21-26 and to conduct an interim study for The Columbus School in Medellin, Colombia on March 26-29, 1995.

Dr. Danielle Cahill, assistant professor of modern & classical languages & literature, presented three papers during the months of March and April. The first paper, "Teaching First-Year Spanish Online," was presented at the Virginia Humanities Conference at VCU on March 30-April 1, 1995; the second was a slide presentation and talk to the Lifelong Learning Society at CNU highlighting Arabic and Mudejar architecture and Moorish and Christian castles in Spain on April 3, 1995; and "Languages and Communication for World Business and The Professions," and "Teaching Business Spanish at the Intermediate Level" was at Eastern Michigan University on April 4-8, 1995.

Marian D. Carrington, director of minority student services, attended the 17th Annual Black Family Conference at Hampton University on March 15-17, 1995. The conference theme was "And Still We Rise: The Strength and Vision of Women of Color." Mrs. Carrington participated on a panel discussion of "Women's Theology: Religion and Spirituality."

Dr. Jim Forte, assistant professor of sociology, social work, and anthropology, received the Virginia Social Work Education Consortium's "1994 Outstanding Social Work Educator" award March 3 at the National Association of Social Workers-Virginia Chapter "Social

Work Month" luncheon in Richmond.

Dr. Robert F. Hodson, assistant professor of physics and computer science, had an exhibit at NASA's Technology Opportunities Showcase (TOPS) on April 6-8, 1995 at the NASA Langley Research Center. Through the efforts of CEBAF, CNU and NASA, the Content Addressable Memory (CAM), a 256 x 32 bit specialized memory chip, was created. The CAM chip behaves much like an ordinary computer memory, but it also has the ability to compare a piece of data to the internally stored data.

Drs. Kara Keeling, Scott Pollard, and Douglas Gordon, English dept., served as judges for the 80th Annual Virginia State High School Forensics Championships in Charlottesville, Virginia. The event drew 122 school coaches, 228 contestants, and 99 judges from throughout the Commonwealth.

Dr. Terry Lee, assistant professor of English, attended the spring College Media Advisers Convention in New York City on March 15-18 with three editors from *The Captain's Log.* Issues of the student newspaper were critiqued and praised by a New York City editor who cited the student work for its professionalism. Misty Hatcher, managing editor, and Chuck Harbin and Wesley Cline, co-opinion editors, also attended.

On March 31, Dr. Lee presented a lecture, "Active Collaboration in Freshman Composition (That Works!)" at the meeting of the Virginia Humanities Conference, "Re-Visioning Our Teaching: Making Connections in the Humanities in Virginia." Dr. Lee also attended two conferences and made three presentations on April 6, 7, and 8. At the Sixth National Conference on College Teaching and Learning in Jacksonville, FL., he conducted two one-hour workshops titled, "Guided Peer Editing" and "Collaborative Pedagogy in Freshman Composition." In Natchitoches, LA., at the Fourth International Kate Chopin Conference, he presented a paper, "Crossing Boundaries in *The Awakening*: Finding `Rapture and Rebirth' in the Story's `Horror and Ruin."
