

ANNUAL COMPETITION FOR GRADUATE STUDY ABROAD TO CLOSE SOON

The 1987-88 competition for grants for graduate study abroad offered under the Fulbright Program and by foreign governments, universities, and private donors will close on October 31, 1986. Only a few more weeks remain in which qualified graduate students may apply for one of the approximately 700 awards to over 70 countries.

Most of the grants offered provide round-trip transportation, tuition and maintenance for one academic year; a few provide international travel only, or a stipend intended as a partial grant-in-aid.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens at the time of application, and must generally hold a bachelor's degree or its equivalent before the beginning date of the grant, and in most cases, should be proficient in the language of the host country. Except for certain specific awards, candidates may not hold a Ph.D. at the time of application. Candidates for the 1987-88 competition are ineligible for a grant to a country if they have been doing graduate work or conducting research in that country for six months or more during academic year 1986-87.

Creative and performing artists are not required to have a bachelor's degree, but must have four years of professional study or equivalent experience. Candidates in medicine must have an M.D. or equivalent (e.g., O.D., D.D.S.) at time of application.

Staffing Committee - To all Faculty

Request for your Input About Staffing at the College

Next week you will each receive a questionnaire requesting your input about staffing at the College.

In addition, Department Chairmen and the Directors of the Library and Continuing Education will receive the following memorandum. Responses should be forwarded after consultation with the department members.

The Staffing Committee has already requested your input regarding three possible total allocations of positions for the faculty and the professional staff of the library and continuing education. The three possibilities are:

- 1. A decrease of from one to ten positions;
- A continuation of the current number of positions with, however, the possible reallocation of some staff;
- 3. An increase of from one to ten positions.

In consultation with the members of your department, would you please send the following additional information to the committee by October 3, 1986 to help us formulate our recommendations to the VPAA. Please forward your response to JoAnne Squires, W125.

- 1. a) In the event of a staff decrease or reallocation within the College, why should your department remain at least at its current level of staffing?
 - b) What would be the consequences to your department of a reduction of one position?
- 2. a) What value to your department and the College would an additional position in your department be? How would you use such a position?
 - b) Do you have plans for any new programs?
- 3. Would you list the names and details about anyone in your department who plans to retire, be on leave, or have release time during the next three years.
- 4. Are there any new programs related to your department that the College should plan for

under any one of the three possible staff allocations?

Your thoroughness and timeliness in responding would be greatly appreciated.

Your questionnaire and the response to the memorandum should be forwarded to J. Squires, W125 no later than October 3, 1986. Your input is essential. Thank you for your help.
