

#### Meal Reimbursements

Under the current IRS regulations, all meal reimbursements paid to State employees where no overnight travel or rest was involved shall be viewed as potential reportable income.

The responsibility for reporting this income lies with the Agency. Each agency must extract all reimbursements for meals paid throughout a calendar year where there was no overnight travel.

If meal reimbursements plus wages total \$600 or more in a calendar year, then the Agency will report this income to the IRS as "other compensation", as represented on the employee's Form W-2, Wage and Tax Statement.

To fully comply with this regulation, the Business Office will need the following information from an employee submitting a request for reimbursable items.

Please specify: 1. Name(s)

- 2. Date
- 3. Location
- 4. Purpose
- 5. Amount

Your wages will be adjusted on a quarterly basis to reflect any/all meal reimbursements received where no overnight travel was involved.

#### NEW PERIODICAL INDEXES IN THE LIBRARY

Two unique periodical indexes are now available in the Captain John Smith Library, and they offer several important advantages over more traditional indexes. The Magazine Index and the Business Index have a special motorized format in which citations are rapidly accessible at the press of a button. Unlike traditional indexes available in book form, the Magazine Index and the Business Index are cumulative for a number of years. Instead of leafing through numerous index volumes, just press a button to view journal citations on your topic.

Currently, the <u>Magazine Index</u> indexes more than 400 magazines, and you will find a cumulative listing of general interest articles from January 1979 to January 1984. The <u>Business Index</u> now lists articles on accounting and finance, management and marketing, and economics from more than 800 journals between April 1980 and January 1984.

The Magazine Index cites articles from twice the number of magazines indexed in the Reader's Guide to Periodical Literature, and the Business Index indexes more than four times the number of journals listed in the Business Periodicals Index. Since both of these motorized, cumulative indexes are updated monthly, you save much time researching your topic, and retrieve more relevant citations as well.

Both of these new indexes are found adjacent to the index tables inside the Periodicals Room. For more information or assistance in using these research tools, please contact the staff of the Reference or Periodicals Departments (ext. 7132 or 7135).
