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### NEWS RELEASES

Mr. Cunningham has learned that Governor Godwin has given his approval that the College will receive \$7,500 for undergraduate scholarships. These scholarships were allotted among the institutions on the basis of their enrollment in the fall of 1968, of full-time, in-state students studying for a baccalaureate degree. The total amount of the allotments for undergraduate institutions was \$575,000 which was appropriated by the 1968 General Assembly. The policies for the scholarships provide that each institution shall determine scholarship recipients on the basis of financial need, but no student may receive more than \$350 from these funds in a single year. Miss Nancy Ramseur will administer this fund.

The Higher Education Facilities Commission recommended grants under Title VI A of the Higher Education Act of 1965. The following items included in the recommendations are laboratory, audio-visual equipment, and reference material (other than textbooks) to improve the quality of undergraduate instruction. CNC was recommended for \$22,750. The Commission also recommended the following grants for closed-circuit TV equipment to be used for undergraduate instruction for which CNC will be the recipient of \$1,410. Mr. Cunningham announced that when the money is received (after final approval by the U.S. Office of Education), it will assist in the expansion of the College to a 4-year level. Areas to be aided by the \$22,750 are: Biology, Chemistry, English, Government, History, Mathematics, Modern Languages, Physical Education, Psychology, and Sociology. The \$1,410 that has been granted to the Physical Education Department for closed-circuit TV will aid the professors in correcting any mistakes the student might make in physical education classes.

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
