

Larcenies Reported During 1984

During the period of January 1, 1984 to December 31, 1984 there were 26 incidents of larceny reported to Campus Police resulting in losses totaling \$2,673.50.

As noted, the majority of the reported larcenies occurred within campus buildings and consisted of wallets, purses, articles of clothing, jewelry and personal electronic equipment (radios, calculators, tape recorders, etc.) that were left unattended by the owners.

Campus Police offer these suggestions to help prevent or reduce the incident of larceny:

- 1. Do not leave bicycles unsecure and unattended. Lock bicycles in bicycle rack or to an immovable object.
- 2. Do not leave wallets or purses unattended on desks or tables.
- 3. Mark your radios, tape recorders, calculators, etc. with your social security number.
- 4. Lock your automobiles and don't leave valuables in unattended vehicles.
- 5. Keep personal articles of clothing with you.
- 6. Do not leave your office open when unattended. Close and lock the door.

Most important of all, report suspicious persons observed on campus to the Campus Police Department immediately.

Job Search Strategies Workshop

The Office of Counseling and Career Services is sponsoring a two-part job Search Strategies Workshop to assist job seekers in identifying practical steps in the job-hunt process. The workshop provides general guidelines for the job search and enables participants to identify and implement job search strategies appropriate for their individual needs.

The length of the two-part workshop is three hours; each session is an hour and a half. The format includes lecture, exercises and discussion, which actively involve participants.

Assignments requiring participants to take action for their job search will be expected before the second session. In the second session, participants refine their ideas and prepare an action plan to implement the job search strategies they have identified.

The target audience is Christopher Newport College juniors, seniors and graduates. The workshop objectives are:

- . to provide information on job search strategies, implementation tools, and resource aids
- . to provide a system for identifying, selecting, and evaluating job search strategies . to promote a positive attitude about the job search process as a vehicle for personal exploration and growth.

The workshop is scheduled to be given twice: April 1 and 3 from 4:00 - 5:30 p.m.; April 2 and 4 from 3:30 - 5:00 p.m. The minimum number of registrants required to hold the session will be 10; the location will be determined based on the number of registrants.

Committee on Degrees - Meeting 3/14/85

The Committee on Degrees met March 14, 1985 at 2:30 PM. The following members were present - Professors Paul, Grobel, Hornback, Weber, and Williams. Dr. Summerville was also present to discuss with the committee the implementation and interpretation of the new curricular changes.

In other business, the committee approved the list of candidates for degrees for May 1985, contingent upon successful completion of all requirements; and considered the following petitions.

- Student #1: Student petitioned to be allowed to take at least 20 hours of coursework in the major field of English at the College of William and Mary.

 Committee Action: Recommends approval based upon recommendation of the Department of English.
- Student #2: Student petitioned to be allowed to present History 101-102 as the humanities requirement since it fulfilled the humanities area at the previous college and present another sequence with History 201-202 to satisfy the social science requirement at CNC.

 Committee Action: Recommends approval based upon the faculty guidelines concerning satisfying distribution requirements.
- Student #3: Student is a second degree candidate at CNC and has petitioned to have the distribution areas of humanities and natural science satisfied by courses taken for the first degree at the previous college. The courses were in English, biology and astronomy.

 Committee Action: Recommends approval based upon faculty guidelines concerning the areas of distribution being satisfied at the previous institution.

There was one case with no action taken pending additional and specific information.

Faculty Grievance Committee Report & Recommendation

In the course of its operations this year, the Faculty Grievance Committee has encountered several problems in the present statement of the "Faculty Handbook" (Section VII, part B. 10, Faculty Grievance Procedures). The following recommended changes are based on those observations. Due to time constraints, the particulars have not been reviewed by the full Committee; therefore, this report should be considered as a recommendation from the Chairman that attempts to implement the general intent of the Committee. Because the Handbook Committee is making its recommendations within the next week or so on this section of the Handbook, it is necessary that the matter be considered by the Faculty at the March meeting if a Faculty recommendation is to be obtained. Most of the substantive changes have been discussed with the President and the Assistant to the President (who is a member of the Handbook Committee). Deletions are in [brackets]; additions underlined.

page VII-54, VII. B. 10.

- a. A faculty member who has suffered or believes that he or she will suffer material or professional loss...
- b. 2) add: In general, the informal procedure is carried out only to two levels. At each level, a response is required within five days; a lack of response within the specified time is equivalent to a denial of the appeal.
- c. 1) If the grievance [has not been resolved] is not resolved after [carrying it to] consideration at the [highest] next higher administrative level, [in] according to the informal procedures, the faculty member, within five (5) [working days of notification of failure of the grievance] days during which the College is in session following notification of denial of the appeal may file... (line 11) ... must state with reasonable precision...
- 2) ...within three (3) [working] days [of] during which the College is in session following receipt...
- 3) The Chairman of the FGC may then call upon other members of the FGC or the College community to [ascertain whether] assure that the petition contains grievable matters and [whether attempt has been made to first seek resolution through the informal procedures] that the Informal Grievance Procedures have been completed. (Omit last sentence and add:) Only if both requirements are met is a grievance properly before the FGC. The Chairman of the FGC notifies the petitioner of the acceptance or rejection of the petition; this determination should normally be completed within one week. If the grievance petition is rejected, the reason for rejection is stated in the denial, which is also reported to the Committee members at that time.
- 5) The Chairman of the FGP [notifies] <u>arranges with</u> the concerned parties [of] the time(\underline{s}), date(\underline{s}) and place(\underline{s}) [for the purpose] of meeting(\underline{s}) to [discuss] <u>consider</u> the matters alleged in the grievance...
 - 6) (Replace entire section with:)

The FGP shall normally complete its operations within thirty days, by which time it submits its signed report and recommendations to the grievant and the party against whom the grievance is directed. Should it become evident that this time constraint will prevent adequate consideration, the Chairman of the FGP seeks agreement of both parties to the grievance to an extension of specified time; that failing, the full FGC may grant an extension of no more than two additional weeks. Any further extension must be approved by the President or, for a grievance directed against the President, by the Board. The FGP report is also transmitted to the administrative officer immediately above that against whom the grievance was directed or, in the case of a grievance against the President, to the Board. The College official receiving the recommendation (or the Board, as appropriate) takes final action and notifies all concerned of that action.
