
It is believed that CNU could benefit well from the football program. The residence hall population would rise Salsberry said.

Not until the students themselves embrace this future, or create a vision of their own, will CNU ever be more than a pretty campus with a good spin. The pros and cons I have mentioned here are nothing more than my suggestions on where to first look at our university's future. They are symptoms only, not the root of the deeper troubles, the troubles of a student body which has relinquished its role of leadership in favor of someone else's dreams.



When Director of Institutional Advancement Lucy Latchum called and asked her to head the Senior Gift Committee, Stasia Place was a bit hesitant.

"I just had so much other stuff to do," said Place, a communications major, a Spanish minor, and the Student Government Association's Vice President of University

Ultimately though, it took little persuasion on Latchum's part to get Place to spear-head the group. "I figured that it would be a good experience for me," she said, "because it was the perfect opportunity to uti-lize the skills that I had been learning."

But for the Vice President of University Relations, the Senior Gift Committee is just one of a series of responsibilities she's held down in her time at CNU.

Before earning her current position in the SGA, Place spent two years as a senator and one as the Human Relations Chair. This year, when SGA President Tamara Poole asked her to take over as Vice President of

University Relations, she gladly accepted. Recently, she spoke in support of the

proposal to close Shoe Lane at a Newport News City Council meeting. Despite the hostility aimed at the

proposal by some of the Shoe Lane residents who attended, she never lost her cool. "I like giving speeches," she said. "I do have to work with people and in order to do that I have to have great communication skills.

Now though, Place is ready to focus her attention on the gift committee. Since 1994, none of the previous committees have raised enough

money to purchase the gifts they intended to give to the school. Due to lack of donations, plans for a scholarship fund ('94), a fountain ('95), a gazebo ('96), and a walkway ('97) have all been left in limbo.

Each committee has three years to raise

'93 committee, which had a sitting area constructed in front of Santoro Hall, has raised adequate funds.

This year's committee, whose theme is "the class of '99 sails towards the 21st century," is looking at slightly more modest goals. At their first meeting, committee members discussed the possibility of starting another scholarship fund - which has to

have a base of at least \$10,000 to be used contributing materi-als to the Captain John Smith Library, or contributing to the fund started in '96 for construction of a ga-

ship," Place said, "but personally I'd like to get something people could see

Participation has been limited so far only about 13 people have expressed interest in involvement and only five people showed up at the first meeting - so Place is not getting her hopes up. "I have a lot of people who say they're interested," she said, but we'll see who shows up to the meet-

But, dare she sound too cynical, Place reiterates her enthusiasm. "Is it a lot of work? Yeah. Is it good experience? Yeah."

Cary Street Bistro & Tavern 500 Jamestown Road Williamsburg -220-8233

Let me tell you about a great little place I recently found.

Two friends and I decided last Wednesday that a "girl's lunch out" was long over-due. We decided to meet in Williamsburg, which is simply beautiful this time of year, at a charming little place called the Cary Street Bistro on Jamestown Road. It was quite full when we arrived with what I as-

sumed to be their typical lunch crowd The decor was a nice blend of sophistication and quaintness - cloth napkins,


menus that weren't covered in plastic, and small champagne glasses filled with wild flowers at the end of each table.

The menu, which we found reasonably priced, seems to be geared towards those who prefer a lighter, vegetarian fare. In addition to the Cary Street Crab Soup, broccoli-cheese was the soup of the day.

The appetizers, quite different than the average chain restaurant, include pita "crisps" served with hummus - a blend of garbonzo beans, garlic, olive oil, and spices and herbed cream cheese-stuffed jalapenos served with a cooling mint sauce. The salads include a salmon salad and a tortilla salad -filled with black bean chile instead of the typical beans and cheese.

The "sandwiches and more" section

offers anything from an eight ounce seasoned burger to crab cakes and tarragon



chicken salad. Needless to say, we had no problem finding something we liked.

We asked to see the dinner menu while we waited, and were pleased to find it just as interesting as the lunch menu. It features California Dry Jack cheese tarts, a crab and oyster saute, molasses-grilled lamb chops, and several pasta dishes.

The wine list offers a wide variety of California and local wines. none of which are over \$24. In fact, one of

my favorite champagnes, Perrier Jouet, is priced significantly lower than I'm used to

Our appetizers arrived in under 10 minutes. Two of us got the crab soup. It was delightfully creamy and hot, full of crab meat and flavorful sherry. We also chose an appetizer to share between us - freshchopped basil-topped, delicious, sliced, local tomatoes surrounded by large slices of mozzarella cheese, all drizzled with just the right amount of olive oil. We were just about finished when the entrees arrived.

For the most part, we all decided to stay on the "lighter fare" path. The Cary Street Salad that I selected was amazing — mixed gourmet greens, a mild "chevre" cheese, pecans, and local vegetables topped with a homemade blackberry vinaigrette.

The vegetarian sub that Ann Marie selected was huge and, though she said it was quite tasty, it was pretty tricky for her to eat without all of the stuffing falling out. It



Duo Black Star shines with a genuinely hip-hop debut

Ever since A Tribe Called Quest lit the torch of jazz infused hip-hop, it has passed through the hands of many, including Common (formerly Common Sense), the Roots and Bahamadia, just to name a few. Now that the originators have called it quits, the style of hip-hop spun from the heart is on shaky ground. Answering the prayers of many, the Man upstairs anointed the hip-hop world with the first offering from Lyricist Lounge favorites Mos Def and Talib Kweli, together known as Black Star. Miracles never cease.

Though there will never be another Tribe, "Mos Def and Talib Kweli are Black Star" (Rawkus) demonstrates the duo are definitely not far behind. The influence of artists past is evident but the album has a unique appeal on every level, right down to the liner notes. Complete with an explanation of all songs from each member, the liner notes are decorated with odd artwork, ranging from the paintings of Marcus Garvey (his great granddaughter contributes to the notes as well) to a mock working of an album cover from No Limit or Cash Money Records.

The music speaks for itself. Woven together by the duo's seemingly limitless creativity, the 13 selections embody well-produced beats while provoking thought at the same time. "Definition," and its remix "Re: Definition" caution rappers not to let a little commercial success blow up their egos, while "Hater Players" insinuates real lyricists lie in the underground, not the money hungry mainstream. Even the Common-esque rap ballad "Brown Skinned Lady" comes off flawlessly.

Their flavor fuels "Respiration," which compares the city to a living, breathing organism. With special guest Common, they conjure vivid imagery with their words (I could feel the city breathin'/ Chest heevin against the flesh of the evenin'), stressing that like human beings, the city does not cease to exist because of what is going on around it.

Black Star's grip on hip-hop's torch is tight, and they show no signs of letting it go. Through their infectious rhythms and knowledgeable rhymes, the men of Black Star have proven they can roll with the best out there, commercially successful or not. Undoubtedly, this talented duo will leave their mark for lovers of real hip-hop guided by the light.

Gregg Alexander, singer and songwriter for the New Radicals, seems to have taken that idea to the extreme. On the New Radical's debut single, "You Get what you Give," Alexander slams half of the acts on the Billboard Top Ten album chart, calling everyone from Hanson to Courtney Love to Marilyn Manson 'fakes.' While this lyrical insult may seem like a desperate attempt to draw attention to an otherwise unremarkable band, the fact remains that "You Get what you Give" is one of the catchiest singles of the year. Sounding like a mix between World Party and Third Eye Blind, Alexander and the rest of the New Radicals have crafted an enjoyable, but ephemeral pop gem. 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


