Winter Commencement Exercises

Pass/Fail Courses

Over the years a few courses have been added to the curriculum of the College with the explicit proviso that they could be taken only on a pass/fail basis, and this proviso has been made part of their respective catalogue descriptions. It has been the practice of the College not to count credits earned in such courses against the six hours that seniors are permitted to elect to take on a pass/fail basis (cf., CNC Catalogue, 82-83, p.29) and not to restrict the use that can be made of credits earned in such courses solely because of their (required) pass/fail grading system. In particular, credits earned in such courses have, historically, been permitted to count toward meeting major field requirements. This practice will remain in effect until and unless a change is authorized by this office upon recommendation of the Faculty. The issue is presently before the Curriculum Committee for consideration; comments and concerns should be directed to the Committee, c/o Professor Gary Hammer, Chairman.
