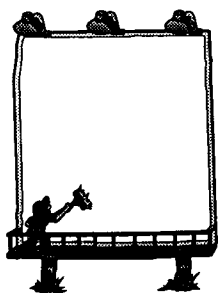
-the availability of information regarding three exchange programs with China, sponsored by the Committee on Scholarly Communication with China (CSCC).

The **Research Program** supports individuals with the Ph.D. or equivalent for in-depth research between July 1, 1996 and Dec. 31, 1997. Application deadline is Oct. 13, 1995.

The **Chinese Fellowships for Scholarly Development** supports Chinese scholars with the MA or Ph.D. from a Chinese institution to conduct research at a U.S. institution. American scholars must nominate Chinese candidates and the deadline is Nov. 3, 1995.
