## INTERNATIONAL STUDIES DIRECTOR APPOINTED AT CNC

Dr. Elizabeth Hansen has been appointed Christopher Newport College's Director of International Studies.

She will be responsible for the administration of the Bachelor of Arts Degree in International Culture and Commerce, and, in concert with the academic deans, department chairmen and appropriate committees, will develop the program's curriculum and course scheduling. Assisting in the development of funding initiatives for international studies and exchanges will also be part of her duties.

"Doctor Hansen comes to CNC with a wealth of experience in international studies and development," said College President Dr. Anthony R. Santoro. "She brings a distinctive perspective to the College's ongoing efforts to enhance and expand its programs and curricula in the areas of international education and exchange programs with other nations."

Before coming to CNC, Doctor Hansen was Assistant to the President for International Education at the City College of New York, where she coordinated international exchange programs with universities in Japan, the People's Republic of China, Kenya, Nigeria, France, Germany and the United Kingdom. She also developed programs of faculty exchange and technical assistance with universities and institutions in the Dominican Republic and Tanzania.

Doctor Hansen's experience includes a Rockefeller Foundation Research Fellowship in Columbia, work as a consultant to the Latin American and Caribbean Program of the Social Science Research Council and faculty positions at several institutions of higher education.

"I look forward to working with the students, faculty, and administrators at CNC to further enhance the College's already rich international focus," Doctor Hansen said. "Since this is such an important role in the program's success, I plan to become a clearinghouse -- providing information and resources to those who need them."

Fluent in Spanish, Portuguese and French, she holds a doctorate in anthropology and Latin American development from the City University of New York.

## HILTON RESIDENT AWARDED HONDA EXCELLENCE SCHOLARSHIP
