

News From the CNC Chapter, AAUP

We had an excellent response (and on quite short notice) on our petition to the Appropriations Committee of the House of Delegates against HB 731, which would have drastically curtailed the retirement benefits of those enrolled in the Virginia Supplemental Retirement System. I am grateful to all of you who helped. And I am also happy to report that our efforts were of some avail. Here is the reply of Mr. Richard M. Bagley, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee:

"Thank you for your letter of February 16th and the petition from faculty and staff members expressing concern for House Bill 73l dealing with the Virginia Supplemental Retirement System. HB 73l was carried over by the Appropriations Committee. Portions of the bill were amended and incorporated into House Bill 9, which was reported by the Appropriations Committee last Friday, has now passed the House, and is presently being considered in the Senate. As reported by the Committee, this measure will not affect current or future benefits of present VSRS members."

The Governor signed the revised bill, HB 9, into law a short while ago.

It is a good thing that our legislators are sensitive to the needs of their constituents. Yet we were unable to prevent the lower benefits from applying to all who enter the VSRS after the cut-off date this year. At least, however, those who decide to work for the state will know what benefits they will get.

The AAUP initiative for tuition scholarships for faculty dependents did not fare so well this year. First it was converted into a request for a study on tuition scholarships. Then this request for a study was turned down by the Senate Rules Committee on February 29. No doubt we will try again on this one.

I am resigning as president of the CNC-Chapter on June 30 in order to accept a Fulbright Fellowship at the University of Bergen in Norway for the fall term of 1980. Nothing has been more rewarding for me or has given me more pleasure at CNC than my years of work with the great group of people in the AAUP Chapter. Together we have accomplished much. The one significant failure that galls me has been our inability to prevent the continual and significant erosion of faculty salaries against inflation. Yet I am convinced that with a tough stance, considerable effort, and a broader basis of support similar to unionization, we can stop this erosion. At least I hope to work with the Chapter toward that goal and other goals when I return.

Doris was elected president of the State Chapter of the American Association Teachers of Spanish and Portugese for the 1980-82 period.


