


James Clayton Windsor first saw the light of day on August 11, 1932, in Price Hill, West Virginia.

Following graduation from high school, in 1950, Mr. Windsor served in the U.S. Marine Corps for four years. He was active in the Korean War and received the Purple Heart for a wound received during combat. He also received other service medals during this period, including a Naval Commendation for rescue behind the enemy lines.

Upon his discharge from the Marine Corps, Mr. Windsor entered the College of William and Mary. In 1957 he graduated with a B.A. degree in Government. As a student he was active in student organizations and a member of the varsity track team, as well as being in the reserves. He was also a member of the Kappa Alpha fraternity of which he was treasurer.

He did graduate work at Richmond Professional Institute where he received an M.S. degree in Psychology. A B.D. degree in Pastoral Psychology was given him from the University of Rochester and Rochester Divinity School. He served as president of the student body at Rochester Seminary.



Before coming to the Tidewater area, Mr. Windsor was a therapist and remedial teacher at the Memorial Child Guidance Clinic in Richmond. He is presently the Dean of Students and Assistant Professor of Psychology here at Christopher Newport College.

We, of the TRIDENT staff would like to express gratitude to Mr. Windsor for all the help and inspiration he has unselfishly given to the students. Not only does he give unlimited aid to the student's scholastic achievements, but he takes sincere interest in the personal achievements of the students. As a counselor, he gives advice; as a teacher, guidance; and as a person, understanding. Mr. Windsor, thank you for being the kind of person that you are - a man that each student can respect and admire. Thank you for just being yourself.




From the funds received by student dues, they were able to provide the freshman and sophomore classes with additional funds.


SAA Most Active at C.N.C


At the completion of the football season, the Association arranged an All-star game with Old Dominion College, which CNC won.








