

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Legal Defense for Faculty

As Chairman of the College Handbook Committee Task Force on Policies Affecting the Faculty, I have written to the Attorney General in an attempt to obtain a definitive position on "availability of legal defense for faculty members serving the College by participating in the faculty evaluation process."

The essence of the reply was...yes, usually:

When such employees are sued in their official capacity, this Office generally provides representation unless a conflict of interest, or other factor in the public interest, would require otherwise. Necessarily, such a determination must be made on a case by case basis.

This Office has no duty to defend a State employee sued personally. Generally, such defense is provided through insurance carried either by the State agency on behalf of the employee, or the employee himself. The applicable provisions of the insurance policy must be looked to... as a general rule, where the State employee is sued for an uninsured claim for action taken in the scope of employment, and there appears to be no indication that the employee's conduct has exceeded the scope of expected duties, I have often recommended to the Attorney General that either this Office provide the employee with representation, with the affected employee's consent, or authorize the agency to engage private counsel acceptable to this Office to defend the employee.

The complete letters of inquiry and reply are available on request.

We are gathering information on group liability policies. The AAUP policy is a good one, for members only. Note that the policies generally do <u>not</u> cover punitive or exemplary damages, but do provide legal costs and acts of both commission and omission in broad areas of professional activity.

FACULTY/STAFF NEWS

On May 7, Dr. Clyde Brockett will read a paper entitled "Modal and Motivic Coherence in the Music of the 'Fleury Play Book'," for the Medieval Institute, meeting conjointly with the Medieval Academy of America, at Kalamazoo, Michigan. The invitation to read this paper resulted from a symposium/clinic on Medieval Church Drama last summer at Staunton, Virginia. Then Dr. Brockett transcribed, produced, and appeared in the cast of a liturgical setting of the earliest known Latin Sepulcher Visit drama, circa 950, from Mainz. The "Fleury Play Book" is the source from which Dr. Brockett transcribed, edited, and produced the Latin plays of Herod and the Slaying of the Holy Innocents performed by CNC students in Newport News, Norfolk, Williamsburg, Richmond, and Washington, D.C. in December, 1978.

Dr. Algin B. King, Dean of the School of Business and Economics, attended the Annual Meeting of the Northeastern American Institute for Decision Sciences in Washington, D.C. on Friday, April 16, at which time he presented two papers: "The Ford EXP-A new Product Offering: An Analysis of Product Image Based on Selected Socio-Economic Variables;" and "A Case Study of the Failure of A Product to Achieve Broad Market Penetration: Implications for Marketing Strategies for the Industry."

On April 16, <u>Douglas Gordon</u> delivered a paper entitled "Progoff Intensive Journal Methods in Writing Classes" at the Virginia Developmental Writing Workshop sponsored by Old Dominion University.

Dr. Dick Guthrie entertained at a reception in the Cafeteria of the Campus Center, Tuesday, April 20, the high school German Teachers and Supervisors of Foreign Language Instruction in Newport News, Hampton, and York County. The purpose of this reception was to introduce the reinstated German major to those who would be most interested and most affected.

Dr. Martin Buoncristiani, Department of Physics, has been the chief author or coauthor of 5 reports published during the past 6 months on the results of his research on semiconductors and solar energy conversion. These scientific papers have appeared in the Journal of Applied Physics, NASA Technical Memorandum, and the Proceedings of the 4th Miami International Conference on Alternative Energy Sources.

Dr. Barry Smith, NASA Research Associate and Adjunct Faculty member of CNC's Department of Physics is a co-author of 4 of these papers.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Task Force on Policies Affecting the Faculty

The attention of the Faculty is respectfully called to the prior notice of the divesting of the role as grievance committee from the Faculty Advisory Committee. In the proposed description of the FAC, that Committee would serve only to facilitate formation of three-member ad hoc grievance committees.

We request Faculty guidance concerning the desirability of a standing grievance committee. To facilitate consideration, we will offer at the April Faculty meeting the following motion:

Add, as a standing committee of the Faculty:

C. Grievance Committee

Membership: Eight faculty members elected by the Faculty

- reports to the Faculty and to member(s) of the Administration, as appropriate for each grievance
- subcommittees of no fewer than five members hear grievances brought by faculty members
- recommends to the Faculty changes in policies or procedures which have given rise to grievable situations.
