

The recently distributed document titled "A Curriculum for the '80s and '90s, tage II" represents a rewrite of the curriculum proposal developed by the Task proce On Curriculum Development and which was discussed with the majority of the culty at a series of breakfast meetings held during the past summer. This new raft document has taken into account some of the more prevalent comments of faculty embers participating in the discussions.

One of the specific proposals which appears to have the strong support of many culty members is that of the Honors Program. A committee is being appointed to velop recommendations concerning the details of this program. The advice of culty members on this subject would be welcomed by the Vice President for Academic fairs.

Each ard provides tuition at the school of the student's choice and \$2500 to \$3500 annual-until the student completes the doctorate. an over-all increase of almost 11% in new admittees (all categories) this fall. The largest areas of growth are in new degree-seeking freshmen and in Unclassified students. It also now appears that a much higher percentage than usual of those who were admitted actually enrolled. As of the end of the Drop/Add period the total enrollment of the College was up 12.5% over the same date last fall. A final admissions report will appear here in three weeks.

Fran Slocumb was accepted into the National Training Laboratories Supervised Cotraining Program this summer and she co-trained two advanced NTL labs in Bethel, Maine. The first, July 16-27, Training Theory and Practice, is a skills-oriented program focused on designing and implementing experienced-based learning opportunities and basic theory of laboratory education and group dynamics. The second, July 30-August 4, Explorations in Applied Behavioral Science, is a theory and research oriented program which addresses generic issues about human behavior and the work of changing behavior in human systems. Professor Slocumb invites other faculty members with an interest in developing laboratory education skills or exploring the possibilities of laboratory education in college courses to contact her.

The Christopher Newport College Office of Continuing Studies sponsors a great books course for adults which begins on September 19, 1979. Students in this course will examine and evaluate the ideas found in the most important works of western civilization. Through a series of informal, round-table discussions adults interested in exploring the thoughts of the great teachers will have an opportunity to discover their applicability to contemporary life.

The course is offered on a continuing basis, twice each year. In each term a new set of books is read and discussed. Over time, therefore, an individual who remains with the program will be introduced to the greatest works of literature, history, social science, biography, natural science, mathematics, philosophy and theology of the last twenty-five centuries. Using the books, which have always been considered the substance of a liberal education, the group will examine contemporary political, moral, social and economic problems, as well as attempt to answer questions about philosophy, science, religion, art, human relationships, and the nature of education itself.

The class will meet on every other Wednesday evening from 7 to 9 p.m. for seven class meetings. The following is the schedule for the Fall 1979 term:

Sept. 19 Introductory Class Oct. 3 Homer, The Iliad

Oct. 17 Marcus Aurelius, Meditations Oct. 31 Montaigne, Essays (selections)

Nov. 14 Descartes, Discourse and Meditations

Nov. 28 Melville, Moby Dick

Dec. 12 Freud, Genl. Intro. Psychoanalysis

No previous college education is necessary and a student does not have to be involved in the program for more than one term. The cost is \$28 per term. (This does not include the cost of books. These may either be purchased in paperback editions or borrowed from local libraries. The cost per term for paperbacks, which have been ordered through the CNC Bookstore, is approximately \$15.)
