## DEANS' ANNOUNCEMENTS

### Copyright Workshop

In response to inquiries by a number of the faculty, I have asked the Library to conduct a brief question-and-answer workshop on the copyright law. This workshop will be held on Tuesday, October 24, from 12:15 to 1:00 in N125. Members of the library staff will outline the provisions of the law and will answer questions concerning the law and the policies the library has established to meet its provisions. Prohibitions in the law concerning the making of photocopies have caused some confusion and difficulty; this discussion will give us an opportunity to clarify the most pressing matters relating to the new copyright law.

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### Deadline for Submission of New Course Proposals

November 15 is the last day that the Curriculum Committee will accept new course or degree proposals for action by the Faculty during this semester.

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### Policy on Awarding Overload Contracts

Departments which are not allocated enough course sections to permit all members who so desire to have an overload should insure that available overloads are awarded on a rotating basis. This will insure that all members of the department will have an equal opportunity to earn extra income.

We hope to see you at the Forum and look forward to your response to our proposals.



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There is no waiver of the core curriculum. Of the distribution requirements, two courses may be waived in one area, or one course may be waived in each of two different areas. No course above the 200-level shall serve as a core or distribution requirement. In the Social Science and Humanities requirements, no more than two courses can be offered in any single discipline. Courses taken in the major or minor fields may be offered to satisfy the core and distribution requirements if they are among the approved courses. There shall be no limit on the number of hours a student may take in the major field.

#### Proposed Statement of Educational Objectives

The educational goals of CNC are:

1. to insure that each graduate has the requisite skills to think and communicate clearly and to reason quantitatively;
2. to provide students with an understanding and appreciation of the basic approaches to knowledge in the humanities, in social-behavioral sciences, in the natural and quantitative sciences, and in foreign languages and cultures;
3. to familiarize students with life-long leisure skills; and
4. to allow students sufficient time, courses, and guidance to develop an in-depth knowledge of a particular field.

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FACULTY NEWS

On October 13 and 14, Doris Reppen and Susan St. Onge attended the Seventeenth Annual State Foreign Language Conference in Norfolk where they participated in a variety of workshops on language methodology.

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On Saturday, Oct. 14, 1978, Radio WCPK, Chesapeake, presented a program on Argentina's music and poetry. Professor Reppen spoke on Martin Fierro, a poem by José Hernandez and three students of Spanish read excerpts of the poem. The students were: Kristi Rohnstock, Robert Ward and Sharon Trueax.

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Dr. Bruno Koch attended the Virginia Theatre Conference in Richmond (Oct. 13-15). He was elected Second Vice President of the State Conference and re-elected Secretary of the Division of University and Colleges.

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Bette Mosteller and Nan Eddins attended the Joint Conference of the Southwestern Library Association and the Southeastern Library Association in New Orleans, La. on October 6-8, 1978. "Beyond Regional Bounds" was the theme of the conference; topics discussed at meetings of the college and university section included SOLINET, library orientation and bibliographic instruction, and networking and resource sharing.

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Professor Carl M. Colonna attended a Workshop on the Economics of Aging, held by the Virginia Center on Aging in Richmond, Virginia.
