At Southern Women's Conference

The Dean William Parks Memorial Colloquia Series is sponsoring the keynote address, given by novelist Lee Smith, at the Virginia Humanities Conference. Smith will speak at noon, on Friday, April 8, 1994, in the Gaines Theatre. Hosted by Christopher Newport University, the Conference focuses on "Southern Women in Communities: Traditions and Innovations" and takes place April 7-9.

A native Virginian, Smith is described as "one of the greatest storytellers of our nation, one of the great artist," by her peers. Among her numerous writing awards, Smith has received two O. Henry Awards and the PEN/Faulkner Award. A professor at North Carolina State University, her novels include <u>Fair and Tender Ladies</u>, <u>Oral History</u>, <u>Family Linen</u>, and <u>The Devil's Dream</u>.

Barbara Bates Smith will perform a condensed version of the off-broadway play "Ivy Rowe" at Christopher Newport University, April 9 at noon. Directed by Mark Hunter, the New York production has received rave reviews.

The performance is part of the Virginia Humanities Conference, which CNU is hosting April 7-9. The theme is "Southern Women in Communities: Traditions and Innovations." The three day conference will include more than 100 presentations, a theatre production, a dance performance, a gallery exhibit and a musical show. Ms. Smith has appeared in numerous regional theatre productions, including the world premiere of Horton Foote's "Talking Pictures" at Florida's Asolo Theatre. Some of her other leading roles include "Woman in Mind," "The Road to Mecca," "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" and "Sister Mary Ignatius."

Southern Women and their Communities Conference

Christopher Newport University will host the 1994 Virginia Humanities Conference April 7-9. The theme this year is "Southern Women in Communities: Traditions and Innovations."
