Monday, October 9, 1989

KAHTAN AL YASIRI - Currently (1977-present), dean, College of Business, Industry and Communication, University of Wisconsin-Platteville. Also professor of Economics. Developed Center of Excellence in Technology Management. From 1966-1977 and from 1965-1970 Chair, Department of Economics and Department of Business Organization and Management Accounting -- all at University of Wisconsin-Platteville. Ph.D. (Economics) Iowa State University, M.S. and B.S. University of Nebraska. Age approx. 50, married, four children.

Tuesday, October 10, 1989

DAVID T. GEITHMAN - Currently (1983-present), chairman, Department of Organizational and Social Sciences, New Jersey Institute of Technology. Also, professor of Organizational and Social Sciences. Chairs doctoral thesis committees in management at Rutgers. Previously consultant to Washington College (Chesterfield, Md.), chairman, Division of Economics at Bloomfield College. David also has

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held faculty rank at Hartwick College, Russell Sage College, and University of Florida. Ph.D. (Economics), M.A. and B.S. all at University of Florida. Age about 51, single.

Wednesday, October 11, 1989

DONALD C. DARNTON - Currently chairman, Department of Business Administration, West Virginia State College. Also special assistant to Board of Regents. Previously was president of Missouri Southern State College (1979). VPAA and interim president of Mansfield State College, and has held faculty rank at V.P.I. and Ohio University. Ph.D. (Economics) and M.A. University of Michigan, B.A. the College of William and Mary. Age about 58, married and children.

Thursday, October 12, 1989

M. DAVID BEVERIDGE - Currently (1986-present), acting associate provost and academic vice president, Western Illinois University. Formerly acting dean, College of Business, associate dean, College of Business, chairman, Department of Management -- all at Western Illinois. Also, Professor of Management. Quilt Show '89

Old quilts, new quilts, green quilts, blue quilts--all these and more will be on display during Piecemakers Quilt Show '89 on Saturday October 21 and Sunday October 22 at Christopher Newport College.

Piecemakers Quilt Show '89 is sponsored by the two sister quilt guilds of the Peninsula, Piecemakers, the Newport News Quilters Guild and Colonial Piecemakers Quilt Guild of Williamsburg, and by the Office of Continuing Education of Christopher Newport College.

The show will be open to the public from 10 AM to 6 PM on Saturday October 21 and from Noon to 6 PM on Sunday October 22 in the College Campus Center.

More than 200 quilts and quilted items will be featured in the show; several will be for sale. Each of the two quilt guilds have approximately 100 members who have stitched or who own the quilted pieces.

Viewer's Choice prizes will be awarded in the following categories: First Quilt, Mini Quilt, Wall Hanging and Full Sized Quilt. Exhibition categories include: Clothing, Challenge Projects, Pillows, Framed Items and Quilts of Yesterday.

A full sized Mariner's Compass quilt in reds and blues and white has been pieced and stitched by the members of the two guilds to be raffled off during the show. Raffle tickets may be purchased at the show for \$1; a winner will be drawn at 5:00 PM on Sunday October 22.

Local and regional merchants will be available with quilt related items for sale during the two-day show.

Tickets to the Piecemakers Quilt Show '89 may be purchased at the College Campus Center during both days of the show for \$3 for adults and \$2 for senior citizens and children. Children under the age of 5 will be admitted at no charge.
