TRACK NEWS

On Saturday, February 15, Burt Seawell, Gaylon Ryan, and Greg Donner will represent CNC at the State Track Meet.

Our next dual meet is February 19 at Christchurch.

In "Snowball Classic" held at William and Mary, Burt Seawell long jumped 20'10" and triple jumped 42'7". Both are school indoor records.

On December 12 our indoor track team lost to Christchurch, 53-42, despite good performances by Burt Seawell, Gaylon Ryan, and Greg Donner. Seawell captured 3 firsts and 2 seconds for 19 points. Ryan placed 2nd in the mile and 2-mile. His 10:37.5 2-mile time is a school record. Donner had 1 first, 1 second, and 3 thirds.

Men's Physical Education News - Track

The pentathlon winner was Burt Seawell with 313 points (a new record). Second was Al White with 275 points.

The pentathlon takes place in the time span of one hour with the contestants taking part in five events. Seawell's performances were: 100 yd. dash (10.4), 880 yd. run (2:23), 16 lb. shotput (30'8"), broad jump (20'3"), and high jump (5'5").

Coach Vaughan and Coach Hubbard played their usual great game and were backed by Lynn Lindberg, Wayne Barry, and John Morris who saw that the Faculty members kept moving.
