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CNC Exchange With Montpellier, France

It's that time of year again! I am seeking families that would host a French student during the Fall semester of next year.

Let me give an update on what is expected of host families and how your participation directly benefits CNC and its students. Our students going to Montpellier pay approximately \$1,800 for one

semester, including tuition, fees, and room and board. French students coming here must pay roughly that same amount for just tuition, fees, and insurance. To keep parity and keep the exchange going, we need families who will provide the French students with room and board for one semester. Host families can require any reasonable services of their French student (house sitting, cleaning, yard work, French Lessons, etc.), and there is no obligation after the one semester.

So far the CNC community has hosted five French students. With your help we have sent three students to Montpellier this year and two more are planning to spend the next Fall semester in Montpellier. Given the financial status of most of our students, this exchange is absolutely the only way that the opportunity to live and study in France would be available to them; the cost of any official study abroad program is at least twice that of the arrangement we have worked out through Professor Chantal Martin in Montpellier. In addition, our students have the possibility of taking a wide variety of courses in management, finance and marketing, as well as more traditional courses in art, history, language, literature, culture, etc.

If you can possibly host a French student and help us keep this valuable exchange alive; or if you simply would like more information, please contact me at 47083 (W-217) or 253-5681.

Please help! Your generosity for one semester can make a life-time of tangible difference for one of our CNC students and can enliven and enrich the campus environment for us all.

RE: Introduction of General Foreign Language Requirement

The Department of Modern and Classical Languages and Literatures proposes that a general foreign language requirement of 6 hours (one sequence) be required of all candidates for the B.S. Degree and professional degrees.

Those candidates for the B.A. will still be required an additional 6 hours (one sequence)--no change from the present requirement.

We propose changing the catalogue to read:

Area I: THE STUDY OF WORDS AND NUMBERS
(English Composition/Mathematics/Foreign Language)
(16-18 Semester Hours Required)
ENGLISH COMPOSITION (6 Hours)
MATHEMATICS (4-6 Hours)
FOREIGN LANGUAGE (One Sequence....6 Hours)
FREN 101-102, GERM 101-102, SPAN 101-102,
LATIN 101-102 or JAPN 101-102*

Area IV: DEGREES STUDIES

(1) LETTERS DEGREES (9-15 Hours)
SPCH 201 or PHIL 101 and
FOREIGN LANGUAGE (One Sequence.....6 Hours)
FREN 201-202, GERM 201-202, SPAN 201-202,
LATIN 201-202 or JAPN 201-202*

*Students with 1 year or less of background in a foreign language in high school must begin at the 101 level. All other students, including native speakers, will be required to take the placement examination, the results of which will determine where the student will begin his/her study of foreign language.

B.S. and professional degree candidates who demonstrate competency beyond the 102 level will have satisfied the language requirement for their degree and be granted +6 credits towards graduation from CNC. B. A. candidates who demonstrate competency beyond the 202 level will have satisfied the language requirement for their degree and be granted +12 credits towards graduation from CNC.
