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Change in Title and Duties of Coordinator of the Division of Business and Economics

Effective January 1, 1978, the position of Division Coordinator of the Division of Business and Economics is to be re-designated Division Director, with authority and responsibilities as described below.

This re-designation is to assure the continued orderly development of the Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degree program through better inter-departmental coordination. The increased authority of the Division Director, as compared with that of the Division Coordinator, is necessary because of the inter-disciplinary nature of the B.S.B.A. curriculum.

The Director of the Division of Business and Economics shall be appointed by the Dean of Academic Affairs, with the concurrence of the President, and will report to the Dean of Academic Affairs through the Assistant Dean of Academic Affairs for the Faculty of Social and Behavioral Sciences and Professional Studies. In effect, the Director's position is an extension of the College's Administration.

The specific authority and responsibilities of the Director of the Division of Business and Economics are as follows:

- (1) In consultation with the Assistant Dean of Academic Affairs for the Faculty of Social and Behavioral Sciences and Professional Studies, to supervise and coordinate the recruitment of authorized faculty--regular and adjunct--for the departments of the division. The Director will serve on all faculty search committees of the division.
- (2) In consultation with the Assistant Dean of Academic Affairs for the Faculty of Social and Behavioral Sciences and Professional Studies, to authorize, supervise and coordinate the implementation of division planning and budget documents.
- (3) In consultation with the Assistant Dean of Academic Affairs for the Faculty of Social and Behavioral Sciences and Professional Studies, to authorize, and allocate overload course assignments, on-campus and off-campus, to the faculty of the Division.

- (4) In consultation with the chairmen of the division's departments, to coordinate course scheduling for day, evening, and summer classes, on-campus and off-campus, with the authority to resolve all conflicts so as to provide to all of the division's students a fair and equitable opportunity to earn the division's degree.
 - (5) In consultation with the chairmen of the division's departments, to coordinate the academic advisement of the division's students, with the authority to resolve conflicts so as to best serve the needs of the division's students.
 - (6) In cooperation with the chairmen of the division's departments, to coordinate the emerging planning statements and budgetary requests with the authority to resolve conflicts so as to best achieve the division's goals.
 - (7) To establish and maintain channels of communication with business and professional organizations and leaders in the greater community which the College serves.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Curriculum Committee

The Curriculum Committee met November 16 to consider new course proposals. It recommends approval of the following courses to the faculty.

Philosophy 451: Great Philosophers (Ancient) (3-3-0)

Prerequisite: Junior or Senior standing or consent of the instructor.

A comprehensive examination of the writings of one of the major thinkers of the Ancient or Medieval Period.

Philosophy 452: Great Philosophers (Modern) (3-3-0)

Prerequisite: Junior or Senior standing or consent of the instructor.

A comprehensive examination of the writings of one of the major thinkers within the period from the Renaissance to the present.

Philosophy 484: Medical Ethics (3-3-0)

Prerequisite: Junior or Senior standing or consent of the instructor.

An examination of the major value issues in the life sciences and medicine. The student is introduced to moral problems and techniques of dealing with them in these areas: abortion, transplants, death, experimenting with humans, behavior control, genetic engineering; aspects of the physician-patient relation such as how much to tell, maintaining confidentiality, obtaining consent; getting health care to those who need it.

Economics 435: History of Economic Thought (3-3-0)

Prerequisite: Economics 201-202 or consent of the instructor.

The development of economic analysis with emphasis upon Classical, Marxian, and Keynesian economics.

Economics 485: Comparative Economic Systems (3-3-0)

Prerequisite: Economics 201-202 or consent of instructor.

A comparative analysis of economic systems and the performance of such economies as measured by growth, equity, and efficiency criteria. Theoretical and actual systems such as the U.S., West and East Europe, the Soviet Union, China, Cuba, Norway, Sweden, and Japan are examined.

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Degrees Committee

Report of Meetings of November 28 & 30th, 1977.

I. Recommends faculty approval of the list of candidates for graduation on January 8, 1978, contingent upon successful completion of all degree requirements (list attached).

II. Recommends faculty approval of the following student petitions:

#1 Student petitioned for a waiver of Business 108 (Mathematics of Business Finance) for a B.S.B.A. degree. This student holds a B.A. degree with a major in Mathematics from C.N.C. in 1976. Major department recommended approval.

#2 Student petitioned for a waiver of the thirty hour residency requirement in order to accept a job in Germany beginning in January, 1978. The student has completed 94 hours at C.N.C. He needs 10 hours to satisfy the M.I.S. degree requirements (C.S. 430, Psy. 313, Bus. 418 or Econ 490, and 1 elective hour). The student requests permission to fulfill these requirements at an accredited college for transfer to C.N.C. Major department recommended approval.

#3 Student petitioned for a waiver of the humanities distribution sequence requirement. Music 201 was completed during the summer of 1977. Music 202 was not offered during the fall semester, and the time at which it is offered in the spring semester conflicts with the student's employment. The student requests substitution of Fine Arts 202 to fulfill the humanities distribution requirement for graduation in May, 1978.

#4 Student petitioned for a waiver of the humanities distribution sequence requirement. English 205 was transferred to C.N.C. English 206 was not offered during the fall term. After approval of his advisor and the English department chairman the student enrolled in English 207 to satisfy the humanities distribution requirement for graduation in January, 1978.

#5 Student petitioned for a waiver of the thirty hour residency requirement. The student has completed 68 hours at C.N.C. During the fall semester 6 of the 9 hours of philosophy needed to complete degree requirements were cancelled. It became necessary for his family to move to California. The student requests permission to fulfill the 9 hour philosophy requirement at an accredited college for transfer to C.N.C. Major department recommended approval.

#6 Student petitioned for a waiver of the thirty hour residency requirement. He will have completed 24 semester hours as a classified student by May, 1978. Nine hours in philosophy were completed as an unclassified student at C.N.C. Major department recommended approval.

#7 Student petitioned for a waiver of the thirty hour residency requirement. This student transferred in 66 hours after completing 53 hours at C.N.C. She needs 21 hours to complete degree requirements. Major department recommended approval.

#8 Student petitioned for a waiver of the thirty hour residency requirement. This student transferred 22 hours after completing 69 hours at C.N.C. He will have completed 18 hours in residence by May of 1978. Major department recommended approval.

#9 Student petitioned for a waiver of the humanities distribution sequence requirement for the A.A. degree in Retailing. She expects to obtain a B.S.B.A. and satisfy the humanities distribution requirement for that degree with Fine Arts 201 and Speech 201.

#10 Student petitioned to apply a total of 20 semester credits of law enforcement courses as electives toward the BA degree with a major in political science (Degree requirement limit these to 16 semester hours). Major department recommended approval.

III. The following student petitions were approved under the Faculty guidelines:

Two students petitioned that the natural science distribution requirement be fulfilled by non-sequence courses. These courses satisfied the natural science requirement at the college from which each student transferred.

IV. Five student petitions were denied.
