

Candidates for Vice President for Institutional Advancement

The VPIA search committee has identified three additional finalists to be interviewed on campus over the next few weeks. As is our custom, an open session has been scheduled for each. That session will be held from 1:00 to 1:45 p.m. in the room indicated on the candidate's interview day. The search committee invites all members of the College community to join us for these sessions. For your information, a brief profile of each finalist follows:

Mr. Bruce Froehlke - Wednesday, May 4 - Open Session Room A-105

Mr. Froehlke has been the Vice President for Institutional Advancement at Blackburn College in Illinois since 1986. During his tenure there he developed a 3-year marketing plan which resulted in \$1 million in gift income in its first year. He has also significantly increased alumni participation in the annual fund drive at Blackburn. His responsibilities there also include public relations for the college. From 1979 to 1986, Mr. Froehlke worked at the University of Missouri -- Columbia, first as the manager for campaigns and special projects, and later as Director of Development. He includes among his accomplishments there comprehensive responsibility for corporate and foundation support (which reached \$4.5 million in FY 185) and coordination of all major gift activity (\$13.2 million in the same year). Between 1976 and 1979, Mr. Froehlke worked as the Assistant, then Associate Director of Development at Haverford College in Pennsylvania -- the school from which he graduated in 1973 with a B.A. in Philosophy.

Dr. Thomas R. Conrad - Thursday, May 5 - Open Session Room A-105

Dr. Conrad is currently the Vice President for Development at Monmouth College in Illinois and for the last ten years has been the chief development officer at that school. During that period, he has taken the college's endowment from \$5.1 million to \$14.2 million. Between 1984 and 1986, he also led a successful \$15 million capital campaign for Monmouth. In addition to fund raising, he is responsible for alumni relations, parent relations, grant writing and college publicity. From 1974 to 1978, Dr. Conrad was the Executive Director of a consortium of four-year private colleges in Pennsylvania and West Virginia. He has taught courses in political science at the colleges for which he has worked and has a life-long interest in international education. He is a graduate of Wittenberg University (1962, Political Science) and holds an M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of Massachusetts. He also conducted one term of post-doctoral study and research at Oxford University.

Mr. James L. Maxwell - Monday, May 16 - Open Session Room A-105


Mr. Maxwell started his fund-raising career working for the March of Dimes and the American Cancer Society (1962-1968). In 1968, he went to work for The Johns Hopkins University as its Associate Director of Development. There he produced some \$200,000 in unrestricted new contributions in his first year and participated in planning a \$100 million capital campaign for the university. From 1971 to 1976, he was Director of Development for the Kennedy Center's National Symphony where he increased annual giving by \$1 million with over 8,000 first-time donors in three years. From 1978 to 1980, he served as the Executive Vice President of the National Society of Fund Raising Executives and then, at the end of that year, took over as Director of Institutional Relations for the Milwaukee Art Museum. Following that he spent two years as an independent consultant and worked for 35 organizations including The Brookings Institution, The Corcoran Gallery of Art, the National Symphony, the Washington Opera and several colleges and universities. Since 1983, Mr. Maxwell has been Director of Development and Public Relations for the Houston (Texas) Metropolitan Ministries where he manages all annual giving and capital campaigns, publications and city-wide events. Mr. Maxwell is a graduate of Ouachita University in Arkansas where he earned the B.A. in English and Speech in 1959. He has done graduate work at LSU and The Johns Hopkins University.

Faculty, Staff, and Student News

Glenn Weber chaired a session on "Computer-Based Models in Education" at the National ORSA/TIMS Conference held in Washington, DC on April 24-27, 1988. In addition, Glenn presented the paper "Teaching OR/MS By Computer Aided Puzzle Contest Solving" at the conference.

Dick Guthrie's two sections of German 102 were selected by the Educational Testing Service of Princeton, New Jersey as one of 6 centers nation-wide for the purpose of a testing sample. The results of the CNC students, along with those of the other 5 colleges in the nation, will be studied by the ETS in order to revise and update the German test on the College Board the results of this test will provide ETS a sampling of the knowledge of German a high school student ought to have acquired at the end of 3 years.

Professor Grace Stuckey presented a paper entitled "Fulfilling the Promise in Practice: A Model for Team Teaching Practice I," at the Virginia Social Science Association Meetings at Sweet Briar College on April 8, 1988. The paper was co-authored with Professor Cheryl

Wendell Barbour's and Cathy Doyle's chapter on "Space Utilization" in The Smaller Academic Library: A Management Handbook has been published by Greenwood Press.

Bruce Almeida and Frank Tambone, students in the Physics Department, participated in the second National Conference on Undergraduate Research at the University of North Carolina at Asheville on April 21-23. More than 1,000 top student researchers from 180 colleges and universities in 40 states were chosen to present their original research findings. They presented research on High Temperature Resistivity of the Superconductor 4 Ba2Cu3O $_\chi$. The conference is the only forum in the United States where undergraduate researchers in both the arts and sciences can present their original research findings.

The best research of the conference will be published in the UNCA Journal of Undergraduate Research, the nation's only journal devoted to student research in the arts and sciences.

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William Edwards, Robert Harvey, Allen Plum, and Sang Yang, students in the Physics Department, also participated in the Conference and presented research on Rare Earth Substitution Studies of the High Temperature Superconductor $VBa_2Cu_3O_{\chi}$.
