NOTICE FOR THE CHRONICLE

The Grants office has received notice of grants available from The Committee on Scholarly Communication with the People's Republic of China. Programs are being sponsored by the American Council of Learned Societies, the National Academy of Sciences, and the Social Science Research Council.

The Graduate Program supports individuals enrolled in a graduate program in social sciences or humanities to do course work or dissertation research at a Chinese university or research institute. Program is for one year, beginning September 1991. Deadline for application is October 13, 1990.

The Research Program supports individuals in the social science or humanities who hold a PH.D. or equivalent at the time of application to do in-depth research in China. This program offers grants for two to twelve months between July 1, 1991 and December 31, 1992. Application deadline is October 13, 1990.

The China Conference Travel Grants Program supports individuals with a PH.D. or equivalent in the social sciences or humanities to present results or recent research on an aspect of China studies at a conference in the Peoples Republic of China. Grants support partial travel expenses only, and do not support travel to lecture, teach, or consult, nor is travel supported to conferences dealing primarily with the improvement of teaching methods or skills. Application deadline is three months prior to the conference.

The Chinese Fellowships for Scholarly Development program supports Chinese scholars in the social sciences and humanities with master's or doctoral degree from a Chinese institution to conduct post-graduate research at a U. S. institution. American Scholars must nominate Chinese candidates to the program. Deadline is November 13, 1990.

SUBJECT: Prime Computer Support for Fall, 1990 Classes




