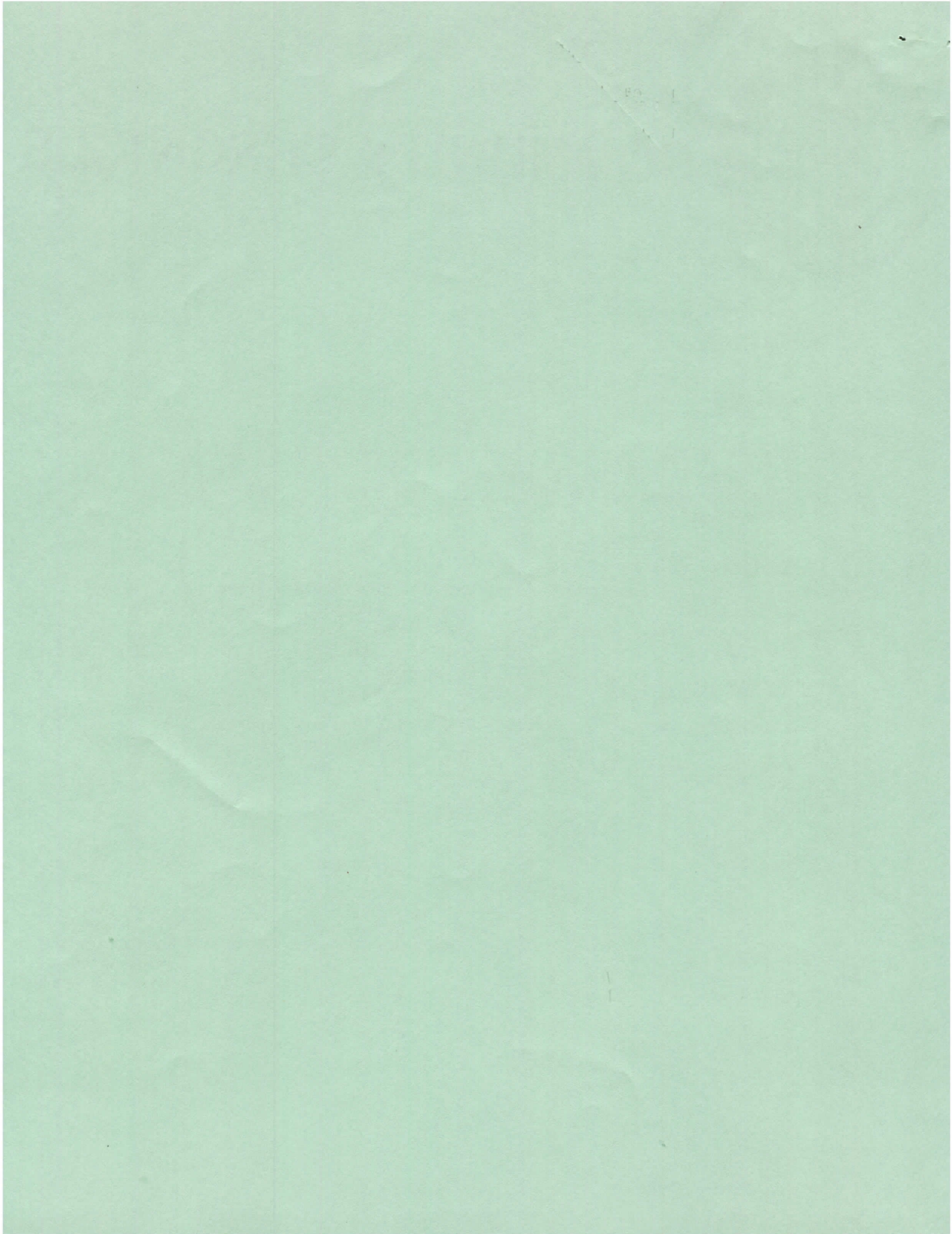

Replacement for Assistant Dean William Parks

The position of Assistant Dean of Academic Affairs left vacant by the death of Dr. Parks will not be filled in the immediate future. The organization of the Dean's office will be the subject of study for several months, and no action will be taken to fill the vacant position until a decision has been reached as to the organizational structure which will most efficiently serve the academic programs of the College. If the present organization is retained, a search for a person to fill the position would probably not take place until early spring.

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Matching Funds (Title VI-A, Equipment Grants)

Applications for Title VI-A (equipment grants) have arrived, and the State believes that grants to institutions will range from about \$5,000 to \$35,000. As you know, the State rates the applications in order to arrive at the amounts granted and the institutions which will receive grants. Please work on your narratives to back up the requests, and note the partial guidelines which were distributed to department heads a week or so ago. Audio-visual equipment will apparently be limited pretty much to closed circuit TV instruction.

REPORT ON THE FACULTY SENATE OF VIRGINIA

The Faculty Senate of Virginia will hold its fall meeting on Saturday, November 4, 1978 at the Medical College of Virginia. Any faculty member wishing to have a topic brought before the Senate should contact Larry Sacks or Bob Durel.

The present concerns of the Senate focus upon several areas.

1. VSRS - The FSV has made presentations to the Joint Legislative Committee and to the Virginia State Retirement Commission expressing concern over the soundness of the system and seeking further independent study of the retirement system.
2. Grievance Procedures - The FSV has made appearances before the Joint Legislative Subcommittee studying faculty grievance procedures. The Senate has advocated legislative enactment of minimum standards and procedural guarantees although not a single procedure for all colleges. Each college should establish its own specific procedures with full faculty participation in the process.
3. Faculty Benefits - The Senate is working with Delegate James' proposal which provides for an alternative to VSRS - primarily, TIAA - CREF. The Senate has also clarified a ruling by the State Director of Personnel concerning a halt to new insurance programs. The FSV agreed that some insurance policies now being paid by payroll deduction warrant careful study to protect the

majority of State employees from wasting money on poor coverage.

4. Research and Resources: The FSV has been involved in a nationwide study of fringe benefits. The data will be used to press for improvement in this very weak area of our compensation.
5. Academic Freedom: The FSV has continued to advise and assist faculty members under attack in areas of academic freedom.

The Faculty Senate of Virginia is a faculty-run group with elected senators from 28 colleges and universities in the State. Dues are \$10.00 per academic year and are supported by the participating faculties. At this time, I would request contributions to cover the cost of dues and other expenses encumbered by your representatives. Please forward contributions to support our participation in the Faculty Senate of Virginia to Dean Edwards.
