IV. Consideration of a recommendation from the Curriculum Committee that the title, prerequisite, and course description of PHIL 102 be changed:

Dr. Weber

from: PHIL 102. Introduction to the Logic of Philosophic Inquiry (3-3-0). Prerequisite: none; corequisite: none.

The application of logical techniques of reasoning to some of the basic problems of philosophy that arise in everyone's experience: freedom, alienation, and personal identity; the enigma of being; moral values and the aim of life; ethical relativity and egoism; the justification of religious belief; and the problem of evil.

to: PHIL 102. Critical Thinking II (3-3-0). Prerequisite: PHIL 101 or consent of instructor; corequisite: none.

This course attempts to help students master the analysis and evaluation of longer arguments, and also to devise and defend an argumentative position. All of the arguments treated are in natural language, and attention focuses on the context of the argument also. Diagram techniques are employed to portray structure of shorter arguments, and the resulting appreciation of types is applied to larger units. Other techniques are partly derived from formal logic and rhetoric, and partly developed specially for informal logic and critical thinking.

Minutes of the Faculty Meeting of March 13, 1987

- I. Minutes of the meeting of February 6, 1987, were approved.
- II. Interim President Healy briefed the faculty on the outcome of legislative actions concerning salary administration and administrative computing. He expressed his appreciation for the opportunity to serve the CNC community.
- III. Committee Reports:
 - A. Academic Status Committee--No Report
 - B. Admissions Committee--No Report
 - C. Curriculum Committee -- No Report
 - D. Degrees Committee -- No Report
 - E. Faculty Advisory Committee -- No Report
 - F. Nominations Committee -- No Report
- IV. The faculty approved a recommendation from the Curriculum Committee that MUSC 308 Romantic Music (3-3-0) be added to the curriculum of the College.
- V. The faculty approved a recommendation from the Degrees Committee that a grade of "C" or higher be required for graduation in each of the six required credits of freshman composition, and that enrollments in ENGL 101,102,103 or 104 in which a grade of "D" has been earned not be counted in applying the "three enrollment" limitation for repeating these courses. The change in policy will appear in the 1988-89 College catalogue.
- VI. The faculty approved the recommendations from the Degrees Committee regarding eleven student petitions (pp. 5-6 of the #9 Chronicle of 1987.).
- VII. The faculty endorsed the guidelines for sabbatical leaves (p. 7 of the #9 Chronicle of 1987) recommended by the Board of Visitors Task Force on Academic Activities.
- VIII. The faculty voted to go into a Committee of the Whole for the purpose of discussing a draft proposal from the FAC pertaining to the creation of a faculty senate. The faculty indicated that it felt the executive committee of the faculty senate should be composed of a member from each school. It also felt that a simple majority of the faculty could override a decision of the Faculty Senate. Dr. Doane noted other suggestions of the faculty concerning revisions in the draft proposal.

Announcements

Dr. Mazzarella announced that he intends to write five letters for Amnesty International. He invited those faculty wishing to support the organization by making a contribution to contact him. He also announced that the College will sponsor a three-day symposium entitled "Platoon, the Movie: Vietnam, the Experience." He advised the faculty to watch for future announcements concerning the dates and the featured speakers.

Dr. Paul announced that the Pulitzer prize-winning poet, Henry Taylor, will be giving a poetry writing workshop at 3:00 in MacMurran and a poetry reading at 7:30 p.m. in the main lounge of the Campus Center on April 1, 1987.

The play "Charley's Aunt" will be performed in the Campus Center Theatre at 8:00 p.m. on March 27, March 28, and April 3.

There will be an informal get-together for Dr. Santoro on April 1, from 10-11 a.m. and from 2-3 p.m. on April 1, 1987 in the Brauer Room.

Committee on Degrees Report - April 9, 1987

The Committee on Degrees met April 9, 1987 at 3:30 P.M. with Dr. Linda Morgan presiding. The following student petitions were considered.

- Case 1: Student petitioned to be allowed to take English 208G in lieu of English 206 to satisfy a required literature sequence for English majors.

 Committee Action: Recommends approval based upon the approval by the English department and the student having a conflict in scheduling.
- Case 2: Student petitioned to be allowed to take English 207G in lieu of English 202 to complete the humanities sequence (a literature sequence required) for an education major.

 Committee Action: Recommends approval based upon the approval by the English department and a scheduling conflict.
- Case 3: Student petitioned to be allowed to present Philosophy 374, to be taught during Mini-session with Spch 201 to satisfy humanities distribution requirements for a BSBA degree.

 Committee Action: Recommends approval based upon the approval of the department concerned (Philosophy) and the fact that the student's schedule makes scheduling an appropriate course difficult.

 Committee Action: Recommends approval based upon the recommendation of the concerned department (Philosophy).
- Case 4: Student petitioned to be allowed to count towards the degree two additional hours in LSPE activities. The student started as a major in LSPE and then switched to History. The student plans to graduate in May 1987.

 Committee Action: Recommends approval based upon the recommendation of the LSPE department.
- Case 5: Student petitioned to be allowed to use the 1985-86 distribution requirements. The student transferred into CNC with 92 hours and can complete all degree requirements by January 1988 if allowed to use the above requirements.

 Committee Action: Recommends approval based on the fact that approximately another year and a half of course work would be needed in addition to the requirements that could be completed by January 1988.
- Case 6: Student petitioned to be allowed to use the 1984-85 catalog they entered under as a transfer unclassified student. The number of hours accumulated at CNC and as a transfer student total approximately 96 hours. Student will complete '84-85 requirements by January 1988.

 Committee Action: Recommends approval based upon the number of hours the student has accumulated and that the student also would have to stay approximately another year and a half to complete new requirements.
- Case 7: Student petitioned to be allowed to present a non-sequence in philosophy for the Philosophy 201-202 sequence. Student took the non-sequence at a previous college.

 Committee Action: Recommends approval based upon the recommendation of the Philosophy department.
- Case 8: Student petitioned to be allowed to present one LSPE activities course for the degree this May 1987. The total hours presented by the student is 126. The student misinterpreted the LSPE area of the advising sheet provided by the department and advisor. The area read 2-4 hours.

 Committee Action: Recommends approval, although the LSPE department did not approve and the student followed recommended avenues such as challenge. The deadline for challenge in LSPE had passed.

Case 9: Student petitioned to be allowed to present one activities LSPE course and a transferred LSPE elective course (health) to satisfy that area of the distribution requirements. The student has no physical disabilities, but thought that the area was satisfied with a health course and and activities. The student will present a total of 125 hours for the degree this May 1987.

Committee Action: Recommends approval, although the LSPE department did not approve.
