#### Report of the Faculty Advisory Committee

##### Meeting with President Anderson

The Faculty Advisory Committee met with President Anderson and Dr. Summer-ville on Friday, February 18. The President briefed F.A.C. on the impact of the Memorandum of Understanding signed by Gov. Robb and the presidents of the Va. public institutions of higher education in fall 1982; the subsequent memorandum from Dr. Casteen, the Secretary of Education; and the ensuing communication between Pres. Anderson and Dr. Casteen. Copies of all but the original Memorandum of Understanding were published in the Chronicle last week by Pres. Anderson. The F.A.C. encourages the Faculty to read carefully all those documents paying closest attention to "the Requested Amendments" section on pp. 3 and 4.

Contingency plans must be developed in case a 5%, 10% or 15% reduction in General Fund allotments or appropriations is mandated by the Commonwealth. In the near future, President Anderson will be explaining to the Faculty and College community the specific sequence of events which will be involved in this planning process.

The second major topic of extensive discussion was the long-standing recommendation of F.A.C. that a Faculty or College Budget Advisory Committee be established. On March 4, President Anderson has invited the three Vice-Presidents; the Chairman of F.A.C., E. Daly; the Liaison Representatives to the Financial Affairs & Audit Committees of the Board of Visitors, A. Papageorge and Bob Fellowes to discuss the establishment of such an advisory group in the immediate future.

The relationship between the requirements for contingency retrenchment plans and the establishment of such an advisory group is perceived by F.A.C. to be a close one. It should be noted that at separate meetings of the departmental chairmen of the two schools, the recommendation for such a committee was unanimously endorsed.

The outcome of the March 4 meeting will be reported to the Faculty in the Chronicle.

#### Faculty Development Grants

The deadline for faculty development grant applications is Monday, February 28.

Previous recipients are reminded to submit their reports shortly after the completion of the funded projects or activities. Guidance concerning this is contained in the "pink pages."

**TAKE A BITE OUT OF  
CRIME**

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CNC's Profs. Reppen and Scheiderer proudly announce their fourth study-tour to Spain for the Spring of 1983. This venture is for anybody who would like to take a very special trip. Before leaving, there will be a non-credit class for everybody who plans to go. In the class Profs. Reppen and Scheiderer will teach Spanish for beginners and for those who already know some Spanish. In addition, slides and lectures on Spain and her people will be presented. The goal is to prepare the group to fully appreciate the trip.

This class will meet on Thursday evening from 7-9 p.m. in Wingfield Hall, Room 122, beginning on March 3rd and ending on May 5th. The tuition fee for this class is \$65.00 plus text.

The proposed itinerary for the trip is outlined below. Special care has been taken to ensure that the lodgings and other accommodations are first class in every respect. Also, this year we will be visiting three of Spain's major cities and one of her most famous resort areas. 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C.N.C. Trip (1983)

- May 24 - Departure: Evening departure on your regularly scheduled jet flight to Spain. Dinner and breakfast will be served on board.
- May 25 - Madrid: Upon arrival, you will be met by a tour guide and transferred to your hotel. Dinner and lodging at the hotel.
- May 26 - Madrid: Afternoon ride through the heart of the city. Then you will visit the former residence of the Spanish Kings - The Royal Palace. Later, you will tour the famous Prado Museum of Art. In the evening you will dine in a typical Spanish restaurant.
- May 27 - Madrid - Toledo: After breakfast you will leave for a visit to the Imperial City of Toledo. During your visit you will see the Cathedral, Santo Tomé Church, the most famous painting by El Greco: "The Burial of the Count of Orgaz," the Sinagogue, Bisagra's Gate, Alcantara's Bridge and the Alcazar. Lunch is included. Dinner and lodging at your hotel in Madrid.
- May 28 - Madrid - El Escorial - El Valle de los Caídos: After breakfast you will set out for El Escorial (the 16th Century monastery-palace commissioned by Philip II). After this tour you will have lunch and then go on to the Valley of the Fallen--Spain's memorial to those who died during its civil war, 1936-1939. Dinner and lodging at your hotel in Madrid.
- May 29 - Madrid - Cuenca: After breakfast the group will leave for Cuenca where the famous "Hanging Houses" and the "Enchanted City" are located. Dinner and lodging at your hotel in Cuenca.
- May 30 - Cuenca - Valencia: After breakfast, you will depart for the Parador Nacional Luis Vives, about six miles south of Valencia on the Mediterranean Sea. Dinner and lodging in the Parador.



- May 31 - Valencia - Peñíscola: After breakfast there will be a tour of Valencia and then the group will start up the coast to Peñíscola. En route, a stop will be made at Sagunto where significant Roman ruins have been preserved. Dinner and lodging at your hotel in Peñíscola.
- June 1 - Peñíscola - Barcelona: After breakfast the tour continues along the coast to Spain's second largest city--Barcelona. Dinner and lodging at your hotel in downtown Barcelona.
- June 2 - Barcelona: After breakfast, you will take a tour of this famous city. The Gothic Quarter, the Town Hall, the Chamber of Deputies and Montjuich Mountain are some of the major attractions. Dinner and lodging at your hotel.
- June 3 - Barcelona - Montserrat - Barcelona: After breakfast you will take a full day's excursion to the famous Montserrat Monastery. After lunch you return to your hotel in Barcelona for dinner and lodging.
- June 4 - Barcelona - Palma de Mallorca: After breakfast you will be transferred to the airport for a brief flight to the capital city of the Balearic Islands. In the afternoon there will be a tour of the city. Dinner and lodging at your hotel in Palma.
- June 5 - Palma - Manacor - Cuevas del Drach - Palma: After breakfast, the group will go to Manacor to see where the world's most famous pearls are made. Then the tour continues to Porto Cristo where you will see the fascinating Drach Caves. After lunch the group will return to Palma for dinner and lodging at the hotel.
- June 6 - Palma: This day is left open so everybody can shop, relax or do whatever one wishes. Dinner and lodging in the hotel.
- June 7 - Palma - New York: After breakfast, the group will be transferred to the airport for its return flight to New York.

The cost of this trip is estimated at \$1,300.00. No increase in price is expected and there is a good possibility that there may be a slight reduction. This quotation is based on double occupancy; if anybody wishes single accommodations, there will be an additional fee. The cost of this trip may be charged partially or in full to American Express, Master Card or Visa.

Included in the price of the trip:

1. Round trip air fare from New York. Air fare between Barcelona and Palma.
2. All transfers and portorage between hotels and airports.
3. Lodging in double rooms with private bath.
4. First class hotels (3 star rating or better).
5. All tours described in the itinerary with bilingual guides.
6. Land transportation in air conditioned buses.
7. All breakfasts (continental style) and all dinners. Lunches as indicated.

1. Transportation to and from J.F.K. airport in New York
