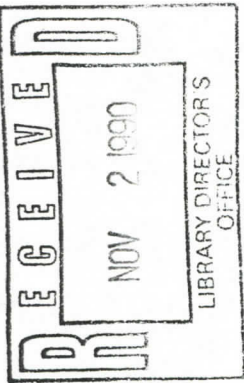

Peru: Crisis or Reform? Professor Lea Pellett



When the Christopher Newport College group entered Peru in August, the country had just gone into a state of emergency. In a long term plan to stabilize the economy, the new President had removed subsidies from all essential commodities and services. Peruvians, who had been looking forward to normalization of political and economical conditions, were instead faced with galloping inflation, civil strikes, and a shut-down of electricity, water, and public transportation. A trip that had been planned as a field visit to the health and education facilities in Quechuan villages expanded into an exceptional opportunity to witness the courage of a people in crisis.

Professor Lea Pellett received her Bachelor of Arts from Hampton Institute. She has two Master's degrees, one in Sociology from the College of William and Mary and a Master of Social Work Degree from Norfolk State University. She has been concerned with providing opportunity for students to experience other cultures, and to gain a vantage from which to view their own.

Professor Pellett regularly accompanies Social Science students for short trips into Latin American countries.
