

Do you want to help a refugee child learn English?

If so, contact CONNECTIONS and volunteer to be an ESL (English as a Second Language) tutor.

No formal teaching background is required, just the ability to speak and read English. Two training sessions at the CONNECTIONS office provides the necessary training skills. Tutors are then matched with refugee students located near their home. Tutors must provide their own transportation to the child's home and must be willing to commit to a minimum of 2 hours a week for three months.

Student Activities Report - Fall 1987

During the fall 1987 semester, 21 student organizations sponsored 67 activities with an average attendance of 104 students per event.

The Campus Activities Board (CAB) sponsored the most activities (11) with an average attendance of 141 students per event.

The top 3 events, in terms of attendance:

650 Pi Kappa Sigma/Alpha Kappa Psi Halloween Dance

450 Sigma Tau Gamma Generic Dance

350 Campus Activities Board New Student Dance

24 student organizations held a total of 371 meetings. Intervarsity Christian Fellowship sponsored the most meetings (92), while the median number of meetings per organization was 13.

Writers' Conference and Contest

The Seventh Annual CNC Writers' Conference and Contest will be on Saturday, April 16, from 8:30 to 4 p.m. in the Campus Center.

This year's conference features five outstanding presenters:

Anne Hobson Freeman, a fiction writer and essayist - "Writing Short Fiction" Mary Batten, an editor with the Cousteau Society in Los Angeles, "Writing Nonfiction: The Problems of Telling the Truth"

Carolyn Bell, the administrator of the Visiting Writer Program at Randolph-Macon Women's College, "The Writer and the Professional Essay"

Don Baker, a playwright, "Writing for the Theater"

Judi Tull, a self-supporting freelance writer, "Paying Attention: The Key to Writing and Selling Nonfiction"

An integral part of the conference is the Writing Contest. All registrants are eligible to submit entries in these categories: Short Story, Poetry, Nonfiction, and Juvenile Fiction. The Deadline for entries is March 16.

The cost to attend this conference is \$65, but there are special discount rates for faculty/ staff and students. Faculty and staff pay \$51. Students pay only \$18. This fee includes lunch, breaks, a wine and cheese reception, and a booklet of the winning entries in the contest.
