STRATEGIC PLANNING COUNCIL UPDATE: The Strategic Planning and Evaluation Council (SPEC) has been studying the many recommendations on the Strategic Plan submitted last year by students, faculty, staff and administrators. On 24 and 25 August, SPEC will go on retreat to work on a draft of the Mission Statement to be submitted for recommendations to the Faculty at its retreat of August 26, and by mail that day to the rest of the staff. Any recommendations must be submitted to my office by Wednesday, 1 September, so that SPEC may consider them in preparing its final draft. That final draft is due to be completed by 12 September, after which it will be submitted to the President and the Board of Visitors for their recommendations and completion. The current plan is for the Mission Statement to appear in the next catalog.

Below is a copy of a draft which SPEC will be working with on its retreat. The draft presented on 26 August will probably resemble it a good deal. It is reproduced here for you to consider and comment on if you wish. Or you may wish to see the final draft at the faculty retreat and make comments on that version.

Christopher Newport University is a state-assisted, comprehensive, coeducational, urban institution of higher learning within Virginia's public university system. The University is an academic community, committed to the search for truth, founded on the ideals of excellence, integrity, mutual respect and service, and dedicated to the discovery, dissemination and application of knowledge.

The mission of the University is to provide an education that develops the intellectual, ethical, affective and physical qualities of each student. The University's goal is to prepare its students to pursue lives of meaning and purpose and to assume their responsibility to improve their communities, their country and their world.

The University accomplishes its goal by the pursuit of excellence in teaching, learning and scholarship. The liberal arts provide the foundation for the institution's undergraduate programs. Graduate studies and scholarly research bring together students and faculty to discover knowledge. This scholarship enhances the quality of the undergraduate experience while contributing to the betterment of the constituencies of the University which extend from its home on the Virginia Peninsula to the Commonwealth, the nation and around the world. Finally, as an American university with a global view, Christopher Newport University enhances its students' awareness and appreciation of the human diversity which enriches us while building that community which unites us all.

This year, all the members of the University family will be asked to help work out the strategic goals and specific actions which will make the plan a reality. We aim to complete the Strategic Plan by the end of the 1993-1994 academic year.
