This year's conference features five outstanding presenters:

Anne Hobson Freeman, a fiction writer and essayist - "Writing Short Fiction"

Mary Batten, an editor with the Cousteau Society in Los Angeles, "Writing Nonfiction:

The Problems of Telling the Truth"

Carolyn Bell, the administrator of the Visiting Writer Program at Randolph-Macon Women's College, "The Writer and the Professional Essay"

Don Baker, a playwright, "Writing for the Theater"

Judi Tull, a self-supporting freelance writer, "Paying Attention: The Key to Writing and Selling Nonfiction"

French Students for Next Year !!!!

A few weeks ago I made an appeal for families who would be willing to host a French exchange student for one semester next year. As stated then, there is provision for hosting a kid either for some remuneration (\$200-\$250 per month) or as a gesture toward helping CNC establish a viable exchange program with the Institute in France.

As of this date, I have not been besieged with offers. In order to start the ball rolling, I must know before school is out whether or not we will be able to house any students coming from France. They can pay tuition and fees here, but they don't have sufficient funds to pay normal housing expenses in an apartment.

If we don't get some help with the housing, our budding exchange program with France will come to a halt, and our students will lose the opportunity to profit from this incredibly rewarding (and cheap) way of spending one or two semesters in France. Please, if you can host a student (with or without pay) for even as long as one semester, let me know ASAP, or at least by May 1.
