# DOSL: Quality entertainment - yes, dry campus - No

## Campus USA

BRIGHAM YOUNG UNIVERSITY (CPS)—Officials at BYU, where facial hair for students is strictly prohibited, introduced a new portrait of bearded BYU founder Karl T. Maesar without a beard.

Officials explained the posthumous shave would help trim student resentment of their modern beard policy.

WINTHROP COLLEGE (CPS)— President Marth Kime Piper ordered her public safety department not to execute its usual holiday-season shooting pigeons on the campus, directing officials to find another way to thin out the pigeon population.

UNIVERSITY OF GEORGIA (CPS)—A Superior Court rules Jan. 5 that the university can make students pay fees to private sports associations. Four students had sued, claiming the school was unconstitutionally forcing them to pay fees to the private Georgia Athletic Association, which runs the campus intercollegiate programs.

Judge William Grant ruled the fees were legal because all students and the state itself benefits from UGa's athletics programs.

UNIVERSITY OF VIRGINIA (CPS)— Campus Police tightened library security during recent finals, where, for over three weeks, a mystery man snuck up on at least six women and, as they studied or slept, snipped off locks of their hair with a pair of scissors.

WICHITA STATE UNIVERSITY (CPS)— Jonathan Ash, 28, resigned as editor of the Sunflower, the campus paper, to end a staff strike in which reporters claimed he had no clear editorial policy and that he refused to print criticism of the WSU student government. There was a new face around the CNC Campus Center last week as Tisa Johnson officially took over the reins as the new director of Student Life.

Formerly the assistant dean of students at Hanover College, in Indiana, Ms. Johnson holds her Master of Science degree in Educational Psychology and Guidance/Personnel Work in Higher Education from Eastern Illinois University in May of 1984.

"She is very experienced considering her age," said Dick Ryther, Campus Center director. "What she has accomplished in 25 or 26 years is amazing."

Ms. Johnson sees her role as DOSL as three-fold

- 1) The duty of providing quality entertainment to all students.
- 2) The responsibility of recruiting students, along with the educator's role of teaching them leadership and organizational skills that will help them in the "real world."
- The sponsoring of educational programs.

"I feel that it is important to develop the whole person," explained Ms. Johnson. "It is necessary to develop



recreationally and spiritually to supplement the academics."

Ms. Johnson is very outspoken about the stringent alcohol policies that are forced upon our society. "It is sad that (the legislators) raised the drinking age to 21. This doesn't address the issue; it simply drives it underground."

CNC is lucky in that "many institutions

are instituting dry campus policies. This can be a mistake when dealing with impressionable young adults," said Ms. Johnson. "College stereotypically stresses alcohol abuse as a rite of passage, and colleges must learn to deal with the issues and teach students to drink responsibily, preparing them for a society that stresses alcohol."

Despite her impressive resume, Ms. Johnson has been under fire from several, students who feel she was not the best candidate for the job and possibly chosen because the college felt the need to fill the position with a woman.

"Tisa was chosen simply because she was the best qualified for the job," supported Ryther. "Her youth and her enthusiasm are what swayed me."

"I consider myself a work-a-holic," said Ms. Johnson, "some may denote that negatively, but I do not base my whole life on this job. I see it as a lifestyle, a lifestyle I've chosen and love."

Stressing the importance of the cocurricular experience, Ms. Johnson "thrives on student life. I see a lot of potential in the people I work with and for the organizations I advise."

"Athletes spend a lot of time working out to be the best that they can possibly be, and I see myself in the same light."

### Building a better Mousetrap:

Board hopes legislators receive plan enthusiastically

Late last semester, the CNC Board of Visitors was presented with a new proposal for residential housing at the college. Although the Board has investigated dormitories before, this plan was met with renewed optimism because it is a definite departure from previous plans, and some feel it is just what the State Council of Higher Education is looking for. The plan, as it stands now, combines student and faculty housing with a large lecture hall, meeting rooms and housing for distinguished visitors.

But CNC has a rocky history with the state in trying to obtain student housing and has looked into a series of proposals. Some call for the dormitories to be built on campus with state monies. However, the State Council of Higher Education has made clear that it wants to preserve

CNC's charter, which restricts the school to non-residential students.

Another proposal called for private developers to build dormitory facilities on property bordering the campus. In exchange for access to college roads, the developer would promise to restrict housing to CNC students.

One such proposal was presented to the Board in 1976 by Hampton developer J. Edward Epstein. However, this plan for private-owned facilities never reached fruition.

#### THE NEW PROPOSAL

After the state made it clear that it would not allow Christopher Newport to build on-campus housing of the traditional sort, CNC had to come up with some kind of unique residential structure that would

. . that you only break drinking glasses when you're using the good set? The Smurf set you got at Hardees and the Care Bears from Pizza Hut, however, will last forever?



## New dorm plan would meet many needs

be palatable to the state and would give the college the housing it so desperately wants.

In September of 1986, the Board of Visitors commissioned the newly formed Committee on Non-academic Student Activities to recommend whether CNC should seek funding for residential housing.

In its Oct. 27 report to the Board of Visitors, obtained by *The Captain's Log* through the Virginia Freedom of Information Act, the Committee recommended that the Board seek funds for "a multiple purpose residential facility."

In its preparation of the report, the Committee on Non-Academic Student Activities surveyed over half of CNC's faculty to determine their opinions on residential housing. The report concluded that 95.5 percent of those surveyed support on-campus housing, "provided that certain concerns are addressed."

#### A "UNIQUE" DORMITORY PROPOSAL

In its report to the Board, the Committee on Non-academic Student Activities unanimously recommended that the college pursue a "new and unique" angle for acquiring funding for dormitories.

The facility that the Committee envisions will have as its mission to not only house students on campus but to serve the many needs of the faculty and the surrounding community. The complex would contain student residence halls, a conference center and an Institute for the Study of Community Life.

The report sees the Institute providing a wide range of facilities including sponsoring exchange programs between faculty members and local governments and businesses, providing community programs and groups with "technical and administrative support" and sponsoring exchange programs for faculty with groups not located in the immediate area derived from a "comprehensive library of exchange programs."

In addition, the Committee sees the Institute sponsoring contracting research for members of the Faculty which would "act as a catalyst in promoting research in a wide variety of fields." The research programs would be self-supporting.

### THE CONFERENCE CENTER FACILITY

The Committee sees the proposed conference center as "the centerpiece of the College's relationship with all the Peninsula's communities "

The facility would include several seminar rooms able to accommodate multi-media presentations, an area for visiting and registration, several working areas equipped with work space, desks, computer terminals, small sleeping facilities, baths and "pullman kitchenettes."

Also, the plan calls for dining facilities, a lecture hall and computer terminal with modem availability.


In addition, the preliminary plans call for several offices and personnel to coordinate operations of both the conference center and the residence facilities.

By combining these facilities, the college would meet community and college needs, while simultaneously include air conditioning and computer terminals linked to CNC's mainframe computer. Also, a meal plan would be included and a female only facility would be an option.

The report recommends that six apartments be dispersed among the residence halls and made available for faculty to rent.

"There would be numerous advantages stemming from the presence of faculty members in close proximity to the student residences," the report says. "These include a monitoring capability and most importantly, a source of intellectual stimulation for the students, outside formal classroom interaction."

The faculty apartments would include



The report suggests that the facility be located behind Wingfield Hall, siting on what is nowunpaved parking area. This location would require an access road behind Sammy and Nick's Restaurant. Thus property would have to be acquired to make way for the road, the Committee says.

The Report says that this site is attractive for a number of reasons. First, the

conserving CNC's scant acreage as well as saving money on future construction costs, the report concludes.

Here is how the Committee envisions each component:

#### HOUSING FACILITIES

The housing portion of the facility would be made up of three parts: rooms for students, apartments spread among the rooms for faculty members and a townhouse for distinguished college visitors.

Housing for 250-300 students would be provided with rooms designed for two. The "well appointed" rooms would facility is close to the nearby apartments where an estimated 300 students live.

Second, this location, near the fringe of college property, would allow easy access to the facility, while limiting cross-campus traffic.

Last, it would separate residential activities from academic concerns and "provide a corner of the campus dedicated primarily to residential activities."

two bedrooms, one bathroom, a fully equipped kitchen and a living room.

"Substantial benefits" could be reaped with the presence of long-term distinguished visitors who would be housed in a townhouse portion of the multiple purpose facility, the report says.

These visiting scholars would lead major conferences at the facility on important issues of the day.

The report suggests that facilities in the townhouse be of "excellent quality" to allow for entertaining and short stays by other important guests.

#### INSTITUTE FOR THE STUDY

#### **OF COMMUNITY LIFE**

The Committee sees as the centerpiece of the facility the Institute for the Study of Community Life. The report cites as its mission "to offer a variety of services to the community and research opportunities for the Faculty."

#### **QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**

Q. IS THIS A FINAL PLAN?

A College officials stress that this is only a preliminary proposal. CNC Rector William T. O'Neill has said that he hopes that this plan will spark even better proposals.

Q. WHY A "MULTIPURPOSE RESI-DENTIAL FACILITY" INSTEAD OF JUST REGULAR DORMITORIES?

A. Officials cite a number of reasons for the unique domitory concept. First, the state has, in the past, rebuffed the schools attempts to become a residential college. Instead, they want to keep CNC an urban commuter college, as set forth in its charter. This plan, of which dormitories is but one part, may serve the appease those who do not favor dorms at CNC.

Second, with both limited construction funds and dwindling real estate to build on, the plan would combine a number of the college's needs into one facility.

Q. HOW SOON COULD DORMITORY PLANS BE APPROVED?

A. The Board of Visitors, on advice of the Committee on Nonacademic Student Activities, has decided to delay its request for construction funds until at least 1990.

Q. WHAT IS THE HISTORY OF THE COMMITTEE ON NON-ACADEMIC STUDENT ACTIVITIES?

A. The Committee, which was established in the Spring of last year by the Board of Visitors, is made up of four CNC faculty members: Drs. Jane Carter Webb, William Winter and Timothy, Morgan, as well as Doug Gallear. The dormitory proposal was the committee's first assignment.

Q. WHAT IS THE COMMITTEE'S RATIONALE FOR RECOMMENDING RESIDENTIAL HOUSING AT THE COLLEGE?

A. In its report, the Committee cites the work of Arthur W. Chickering, who suggests that dormitories are not only a convenience, but actually serve as a learning experience for students. He says that residential students are often superior in public speaking, leadership ability as well as several other important qualities.

In addition, the report states that "CNC's student body consists of precisely the kind of student who would benefit most from the intellectual stimulation that only residential living can provide."

## CNC not among nation's top party schools

(CPS)—Cal State-Chico, Miami (Fla.), San Diego State, Vermont and Slippery Rock are the biggest party schools in the U.S., a Playboy Magazine list of the nation's Top 40 Party Colleges claims.

Playboy says it compiled the list by interviewing student leaders at "more than 250 colleges nationwide."

But while students at the named schools generally seemed amused by the list, administrators—some locked in mortal battle to get more funding by convincing legislators their campuses are beacons of academic excellence—have reacted with outrage.

Officials at West Virginia, Mississippi, Cal State-Chico, Vermont, Miami and other schools on the list protested their inclusion in the list, sometimes calling press conferences to make the point.

But Playboy staffers reply the list was done "obviously as a fun thing, not to put down academic qualities."

"I have a feeling administrators are saying, "Harumph, harumph, we don't think we should be on this list," admits Playboy spokesman Bill Paige.

In one of the milder responses, Mississippi Chancellor Gerald Turner said, "I'd rather not be on their list."

University of Tennessee Vice Chancellor Phil Scheurer called it a "blessing" to be left off the list.

"The Number Two ranking puzzles me," says Miami Student Affairs official Bill Mullowney. "We have ample social life here, but I'd be interested in knowing the criteria of the study, who they talked to, what they observed."

"If we're Number Two in the country as a party school, we do even better academically," Mullowney maintains.

"I don't think they (Playboy staffers) were ever on this campus," complained a Cal Stat-Chico spokeswoman. "I don't think it was very accurate reporting."

Chico students agree, claiming they don't party any more than students on any other campus.

"It's a nice label to tag on the school,

but the survey must not have been very extensive," says student government President Greg Hill. "Students here enjoy a party atmosphere, but they're here to study. They know their purpose."

Paige says Playboy asked students to rank their own schools and others in their states. On each campus, seven-to-10 students were questioned about the number of parties held on campus, other entertainment opportunities and who attended such social gatherings.

"Obviously, we didn't call the campus librarian on a Tuesday night," Paige says.

At Miami, Playboy might not have been able to reach many students on Tuesday night either. Almost 60 percent of the students are commuters, a demographic that minimizes partying, some students say.

"The Miami area is very big, very interesting and there's lots to do," explains UM senior Juan Diaz. "A large percentage of students leave campus to party."

"In fact, you just don't see much

partying. When I was a freshman or sophomore, I wanted to go to a different school where I could have more fun."

But some students agree with Playboy's assessment of their schools' social atmosphere.


"There's a reputation here in Southern California that everyone is pretty laid back," says Lisa Estrella, a student at San Diego State University, Playboy's thirdranked party school.

"SDSU is a good school academically, one of the best in the state university system, but overall it is a party school. Fraternities and sororities are popular here and they do party a lot."

And, while administrators at Georgia's Mercer University, a Southern Baptist College, call the school's 9th place survey ranking unearned and undeserved, students are overioyed.

"Everybody is talking about it," says one fraternity member. "They can't wait to tell their friends at other schools that didn't make the list."

As time ran out to 1:04 CNC captured the lead at 59-62. CNC remained in the lead and added yet another click in the win column.


