



DATES FOR YOUR DIARY

The United Nations Association Peninsula Chapter cordially invites you to participate in its 1974-75 series of World Affairs Forums on Global Economic, Social and Military Problems.

The five evening meetings in this series will be held at the Christopher Newport College Campus Center, commencing September 3 and continuing at bimonthly intervals thereafter. The meeting time is 8:00 P.M.

The Forums will center on the major global problems which are before the United Nations General Assembly and which are of vital concern to all of us. The following five subjects will be covered, the discussion to be led by a well known authority on each:

September 3 - The Growing World Food Crisis and Its Implications for the American People. Ambassador Howard R. Cottam, a retired Foreign Service Officer and UN Food and Agriculture Organization Representative, will initiate the discussion.

November 4 - The Energy Crisis and Its Long-Term Implications for Society. Dr. M. King Hubbert, Research Geophysicist, U.S. Geological Survey, has been writing and speaking for over 30 years on the world's diminishing natural resources.

January 6 - World Poverty and Development Assistance. Mrs. Donna Galchus, Department of Economics, Hampton Institute.

March 3 - World Military Expenditures and Strategic Options. Mr. John M. Collins, National Defense Specialist, Congressional Research Service, U.S. Library of Congress.

May 5 - World Economics Situation in Review. Mr. Melville H. Walker, VP, National Foreign Trade Council, New York.

For the series of meetings there will be an attendance fee of \$5.00 (student fee \$3.00). UNA members will be exempted from the fee. Tickets will be available at the door or by writing to the following address:

NEH Summer Stipend Awards for 1974

The National Endowment for the Humanities has announced the availability of 1975 summer stipends. The purpose of this program is to help college, junior college university teachers, and other humanists in their research and as teachers. To this end, the Endowment provides support for two consecutive summer months of full-time study. Posters announcing this program have been placed at several locations on the

College campus.

During this period of the bicentennial observance of the American Revolution, the Endowment has a special interest in studies relating to the Revolutionary era and to the philosophical and social foundations of the Revolution and the history of our nation. This interest is directed not only to studies of the Revolutionary era itself, but also to studies of American institutions in general. The Endowment also continues its special interest in studies of the relationships between human values and science and technology.

Applicants for summer stipends must be nominated by their employing institution, which may recommend three summer stipend applicants. Two of the nominees should be in an early stage of their careers, and one of the nominees should be in a more advanced stage of his career.

Any faculty members who wish to discuss a research project with Dean Musial with a view toward being nominated by Christopher Newport College are encouraged to do so within the next two to three weeks. The application deadline for the summer stipends is October 15, 1974. Applications require a rather specific description of the research project.

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Change Magazine

Change has become one of the leading magazines in higher education. It has also become the center for a number of significant national activities which include special faculty reports, important conferences, and the dissemination of teaching resource information, reprint, and reference works.

The Lilly Endowment has made available to Change magazine a \$100,000 grant to provide subvention assistance to distribute Change at a rate that is below the current level. Christopher Newport College can take advantage of this subvention support in the following way.

If Christopher Newport College arranges for ten or more faculty subscriptions, the cost of each faculty member will be \$8 a year, with the remaining \$4 contributed through the Lilly Endowment grant. Any faculty members at the College who wish to take advantage of this special offer should submit their name, together with \$8, to Dean Musial by September 13.

FACULTY NEWS

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Travel and Budget Committee

The procedure which requires the President's permission and signature for all out-of-state travel was initiated last year during a period when very careful scrutiny of all travel was required due to the Governor's request for the return of general fund monies. This emergency has now passed, and this procedure requiring the President's permission is no longer necessary, except in cases where the State car is used for out-of-state travel. President Windsor has requested that Dean Musial assume responsibility for approving faculty travel requests until such a time as departmental budgets are finalized.

All department chairpersons have been asked to participate in determining the distribution of 1974-75 travel and equipment monies. Professor Bauer has agreed to serve as the Chairman of this academic budget committee.

LIBRARY NEWS

Regulations Governing Direct Loans From William and Mary Library

In June of 1974 the Earl Gregg Swem Library of the College of William and Mary modified its circulation regulations. The following regulations govern the direct borrowing of books by Christopher Newport faculty members.

Christopher Newport faculty members are classified by the Earl Gregg Swem Library as special borrowers which entitles them to borrow books for a longer period of time. The basic loan period for special borrowers is six (6) months, with an option to renew books in person once only for a like period of time. (This renewal option does not apply to CNC-W&M Cooperative Loan books borrowed through the Smith Library.) Renewal requests by mail will not be accepted, and additional renewals will be authorized only with the approval of the Swem Library Circulation Librarian. Thus the maximum loan period for special charges will be one (1) year. No limit will be imposed upon the number of books loaned to an individual borrower.

Recall - Except for recalls for the Reserve Room, which will be made immediately, no book will be recalled until two weeks after the date checked out. Christopher Newport faculty members will be notified by mail, or by telephone when time permits, that a book is needed by the Swem Library. Charge cards will be marked to indicate a date due of ten (10) days from the date the recall notice is issued and overdue fines will be charged from that date.

Library Fines and Fees - Christopher Newport faculty members assume responsibility for books charged in their name, including their safe return on or before the date due or their replacement if lost or damaged beyond repair. This responsibility cannot be transferred to a third party, e.g. by giving books to friends to return or mailing them to the library. The Swem Library will attempt to provide adequate warning to borrowers through its overdue notices, but neither the failure of the library to issue an overdue notice nor the failure of the borrower to receive a notice modifies the responsibility of the borrower to adhere to library regulations. Overdue fines for Christopher Newport faculty and other special borrowers are assessed at the rate of 10¢ per day. No borrower will be charged more than a maximum of \$5.00 per book for overdue fines.

Lost Books - When a book has been lost or has accrued a fine of \$5.00 and thereby is considered lost by the Swem Library, its replacement cost must be paid by the borrower. Replacement costs, when imposed by the library, shall include all of the following: any overdue fines applicable, plus the cost of the book as determined by the publisher's catalog, plus a surcharge of \$5.00 per book to cover costs involved in reordering, cataloging, processing, etc. Borrowers owing substantial amounts to

the library over a long period of time shall be considered "delinquent." No delinquent borrower shall be entitled to borrow books from the library without specific approval from the Circulation Librarian.

Library Cards - Each borrower may be required to present a library borrower's card indicating the type of borrowing privilege to which he is entitled; and if necessary, the Swem Library may impose a fee to cover the cost of preparation and issuance of borrower's cards.
