

Pulitzer Prize Winner on Campus

Christopher Newport College will present Pulitzer Prize winner Henry Taylor reading his poems on Wednesday, April 1, at 7:30 P.M. in the Main Lounge of the Campus Center.

Mr. Taylor published two collections of poems--The Horse Show at Midnight and An Afternoon of Pocket Billiards--before his Prize-winning volume, The Flying Change (Louisiana State University Press, 1985). "With this wonderful book," one critic has said, "Henry Taylor takes his earned place among our finest living poets."

A resident of Lincoln, Virginia (in Loudoun Country), Mr. Taylor is professor of literature at American University. He won the Witter Bynner Foundation Poetry Prize in 1984.

There will be no admission charge for the reading, which is partially funded by the Virginia Center for the Creative Arts.

CHRISTOPHER NEWPORT COLLEGE DIRECTOR OF STUDENT DEVELOPMENT

The Office of Student Affairs is seeking a Director for the newly created Office of Student Development. The Director of Student Development will provide overall coordination of programs of academic support with Vice President for Student Affairs, Admissions, Registrar, Financial Aid, Career Planning and Placement, Student Life, Vice President for Academic Affairs, Academic Deans, Department Chairs, Faculty, Institutional Research and Computer Science. The Director will initiate programs of research to develop a better understanding of the student body, including why students come to CNC, who our students are, what makes students successful and why some choose not to continue their education at CNC.

The Director of Student Development will oversee the counseling functions of the College, to include testing (CLEP, placement, career, etc.), and counseling (personal, career, academic, and crisis counseling). This individual will support academic advising -- to include coordination of freshmen advising -- and oversee the computerization of advising services. The Director will administer and coordinate the College Transition Project and the Funds for Excellence Subprogram called "Connections." Research of the student body, particularly to acquire an understanding of those issues related to student development and retention, will be the responsibility of the Director of Student Development. A freshman course, with goals similar to a "University 101" course will be developed and possibly taught by the Director of Student Development.

Qualifications: Candidates should possess at least a master's degree in a helping profession, experience in counseling, demonstrated ability to apply knowledge of human development, demonstrated organizational skills, knowledge of computers...hardware, software and at least one computer language, significant experience in a higher education setting with some portion as an instructor, a demonstrated ability to write proposals for, and obtain, grant funding, a demonstrated ability to assess, develop, and implement programs to enhance student development, a working knowledge of student learning as a developmental process, and, working knowledge of basic research skills.

This is an administrative position with twelve month contract. Faculty rank and salary commensurate with experience and qualifications. This position is available immediately and will be filled as quickly as possible. Candidate should be prepared to meet with the Search Committee as early as March 30, 1987.
