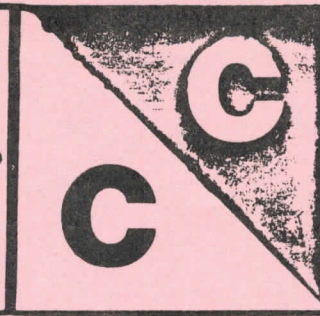
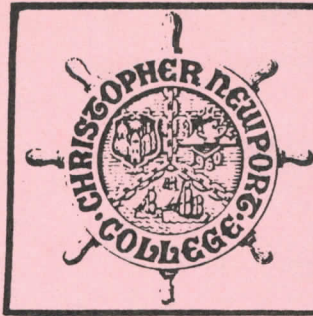

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### Long Distance Phone Calls

Each employee is reminded that all long distance calls to any of the 48 contiguous states originating from State telephones be placed through the SCATS network. Any agency placing long distance calls outside the SCATS network appears on regular reports to the respective Cabinet Secretaries, Boards of Commissions.

Use of the system is simple. Dial the SCATS access number 8, the area code, and the desired number.

This system was designed to provide adequate telephone service, utilizing the most economical means of communication. Projected savings to the State should exceed \$50,000 per month, based on current usage of long distance lines by State agencies. Therefore, the use of SCATS is mandatory.

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### Film and Discussion Concerning the Old Order Amish

Dr. John Hostetler will lead a discussion of "The Mechanisms of Survival: The Old Order Amish" in the Campus Center Theatre of CNC at 12:00 noon on November 7, 1979. The presentation will include introductory remarks by Dr. Hostetler, a film about the Amish, and a discussion period.

During the current semester, Dr. Hostetler is a visiting professor in the Department of Religion at the College of William and Mary. He holds a joint appointment in the departments of Sociology and Anthropology at Temple University.

His presentation is sponsored by the CNC Philosophy Club and the office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs. The CNC departments of History and of Sociology are co-sponsoring the event.

### Curriculum Committee

The Curriculum Committee recommends the following courses for approval:

Biology 218 - Human Anatomy & Physiology (5-4-3)

Systemic study of normal living processes, structure and function of the human body.

Biology 315 - Advanced Human Physiology (3-3-0)

Prerequisites: An anatomy course (human anatomy, comparative anatomy or equivalent); two semesters of chemistry or concurrent enrollment in second semester.

Offered spring semester.

An in depth systemic study of the normal human functions.

Accounting 415 - Accounting Systems (3-3-0)

Prerequisites: CS 220 and Acct. 301 or permission of instructor.

Topics related to the analysis, design, and auditing of accounting systems. Principally concerned with computerized accounting systems using COBOL language.
