Alcohol abuse prevalent on college campuses

Alcohol abuse is "clearly the most prevalent problem on our campuses, and there is a high correlation between alcohol abuse and sexual assault," said the Secretary of Education for Virginia, James W. Dyke Jr., when he visited Christopher Newport College Nov. 15 to discuss sexual and substance abuse on college campuses.

Dyke is the head of a task force created by Governor Wilder to address sexual assault and substance abuse on Virginia's college campuses. "Substance and sexual abuse will not be tolerated in the state of Virginia," he said.

Dyke said that something must be done about alcohol abuse but stopped short of supporting a ban of alcohol on campus. He said that idea "would not be good" because such a move could cause additional problems. Dyke said that what is needed is an enforcement of the laws already in place. "We are

asking people to be reasonable [in their consumption of alcohol]."

Dyke brought up one situation of a student who was not reasonable when drinking. While visiting Virginia Tech, he learned of a student who consumed

32 ounces of tequila and died. Dyke said that the campus was "in a sort of daze about what had happened. They could not believe it."

Dyke said that the task force will encourage college and university presi-

dents to take an active role in solving these problems; students will also be asked to help each other cut down on substance abuse and alcohol abuse. "A student is more likely to respond to another student than to some mandate-on-high from Richmond."

Under a keg registration program, which is being considered by the task force, a keg must be registered in the purchaser's name, and the buyer will be held criminally responsible if anyone under the legal drinking age consumes alcohol from the keg.

Dyke also suggested stepping up enforcement of laws prohibiting the use of fake I.D.s and noted that new legislation may be needed if present laws are not enough. He said that "use and lose" laws were effective for minors and may be considered to deter adults from drug use.

These laws would require judges to revoke a minor's driver's license if he uses a false I.D. to purchase alcohol.

Veteran's Day ceremony remembers vets

Ceremony guest speaker is Desert Storm veteran

On Veteran's Day, Christopher Newport College's ROTC department, along with other campus officials, remembered America's war veterans with an early-morning ceremony on the school's front lawn.

The ceremony's guest speaker was Operation Desert Storm veteran Captain Gordon Oglesby.

Capt. Oglesby, a chaplain with the 6th Transportation Battalion at Fort Eustis, was deployed to Saudi Arabia on Dec. 16, 1990 and returned last August. While in the Middle East, he served with the VII Corp Redeployment Command.

During his speech, Capt. Oglesby urged the cadets to "remember those

who fought in the past as well as those who will fight in the future."

He chose not to speak on the events of the Persian Gulf Crisis but instead echoed the words of the late President Kennedy: "don't ask what your country can do for you, but what you can do for your country."

Among the handful of people who attended the ceremony were CNC President Anthony R. Santoro, Executive Assistant to the President Mario D. Mazzarella and retired Sergeant Major Johnston.

Cadets of CNC's ROTC stood in formation near the flagpole. CNC's Color Guard performed the ritualistic raising of the flag, playing "Taps" and the lowering of the flag to half-mast in memory of those veterans who have given their lives while serving their country.

The traditional display of a rifle, helmet and boots remained throughout the event as a somber reminder of deceased soldiers.

It is the hope that the achievement of quitting smoking for one day will give the initiative to quit smoking forever.

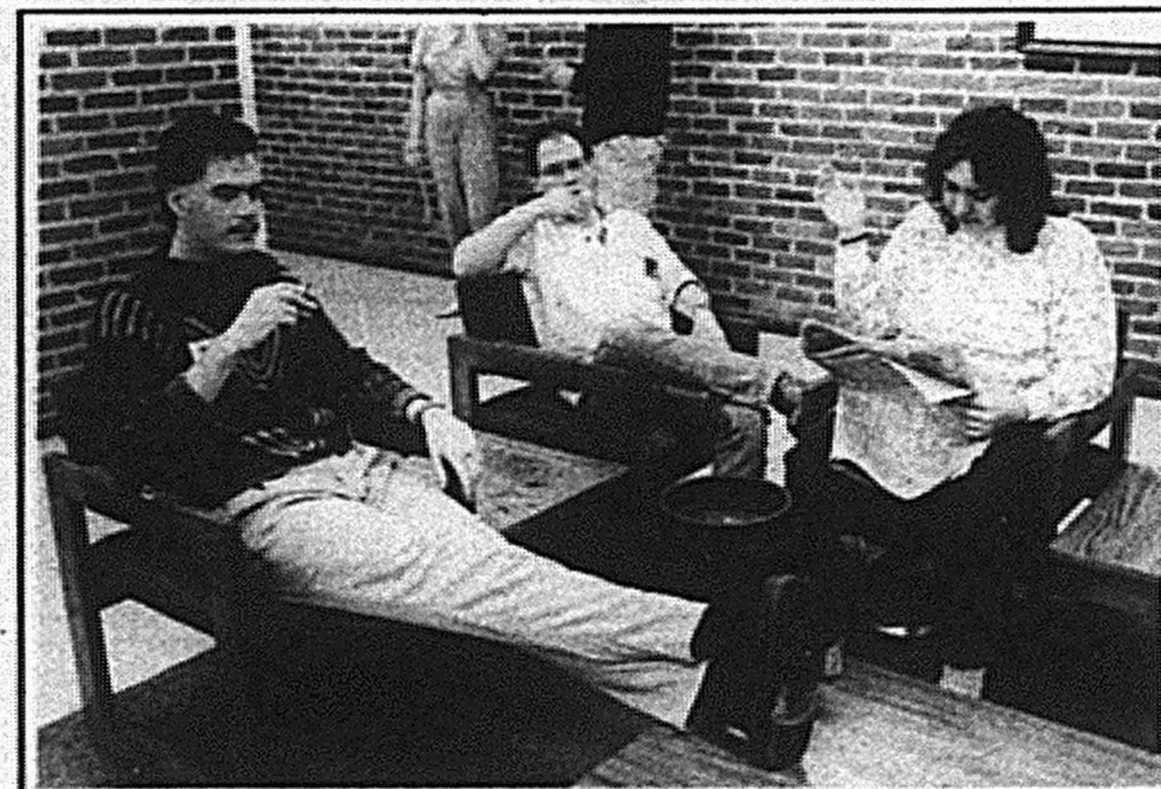
This seems like a reasonable idea for those willing to participate.

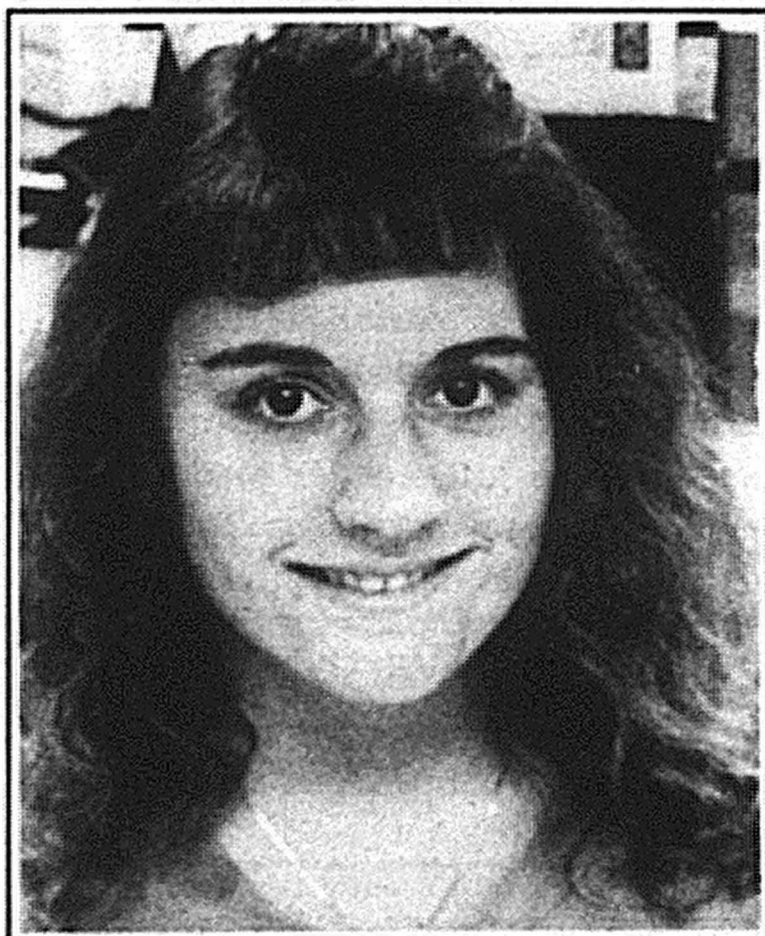

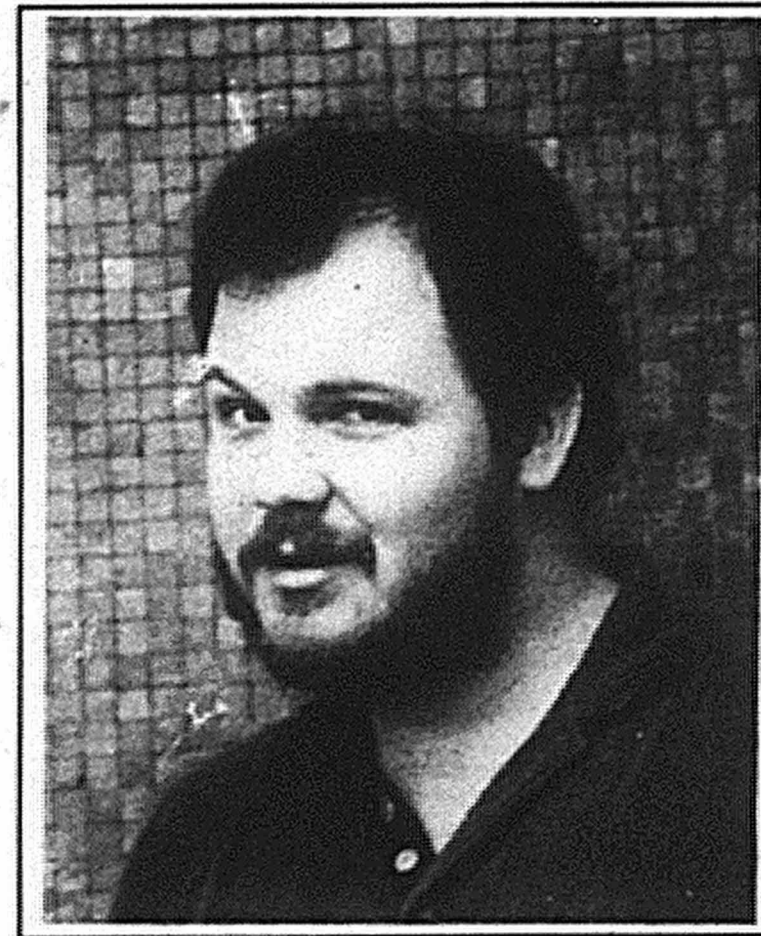

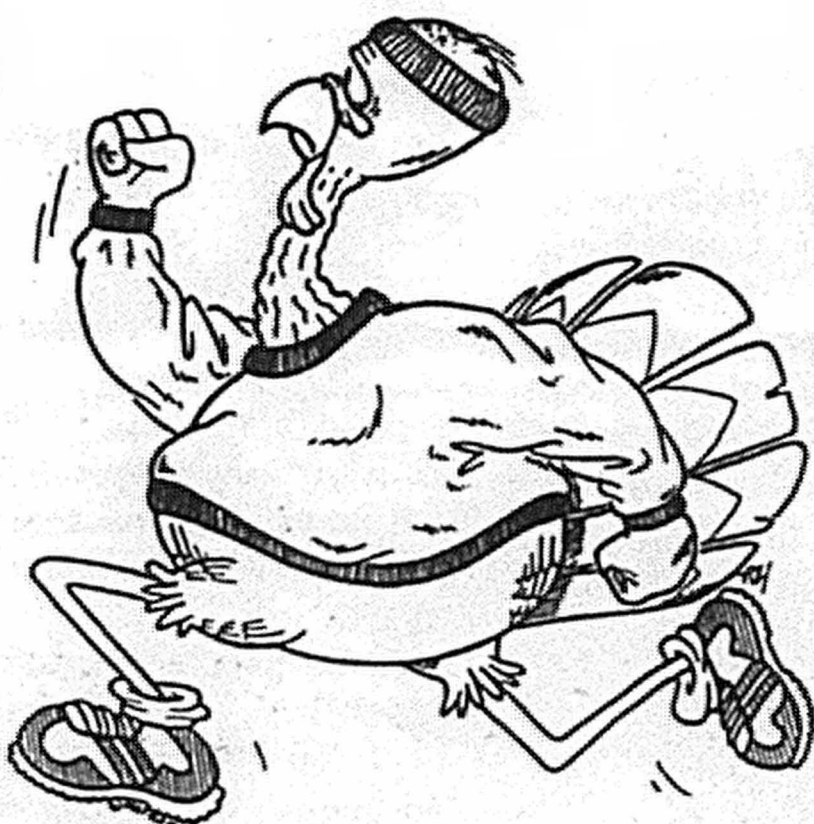

An opera anyone can appreciate

Menotti opera appeals to all audiences

Mention opera, and images of someone dressed like Louis The XIV belting out "Figaro!" are conjured up.

Extravagant costumes, outlandish wigs and outrageous plots performed musically in a foreign language can be intimidating.

Is it theatre? Is it music? It is an art form many people shy away from.

But Christopher Newport College's very own Opera Workshop and Concert Choir should put any fears to rest with their radiant and heart-warming performance of Menotti's opera, *Amahl and The Night Visitors*, directed by Mary Matthews.

It is a modern opera by Italian-American composer Gian-Carlo Menotti, which has traditionally appealed to wide audiences during the holiday season.

"One of the reasons for choosing this opera is that the music is more

accessible. It's in English," explains musical director Ruth Winters. "The music was written for the public." She adds that it was originally written for television, and is only 45 minutes long.

Based on the story of the three wise men, the opera is about a little boy named Amahl and his mother, (played by Janet Miran) who live in poverty.

It is set during the time of the birth of Christ.

The role of Amahl is played by 8 year-old Matthew Cheney, son of CNC biology professor, Dr. Richard Cheney.

Dr. Cheney also has a role in the opera, as does his wife, Beth, and his 15 year-old son Alex. The cast of 35 includes the CNC Concert Choir, who will be on stage in the background, wearing costumes in muted, soft beiges and browns.

The set was designed by George Hillow, theater instructor and was built by the theater class.

It is a simple, rustic setting of wood, stone and burlap.

The magnificent costumes worn by the three kings, designed in royal blue, wine red and gold, reflect the kings riches in contrast to

Last January, New Visions pictures began showing clips from a movie in which Whoopi Goldberg and Sissy Spacek play the two lead roles. It was expected to be a box office hit.

Unfortunately, *A Long Walk Home* was released to a lukewarm response.

Movie executives, realizing the great potential of the movie, put thousands of dollars forward and re-released it at the beginning of the summer film season. But again, they chose the wrong time for such a low-budget film when mostly blockbusters were being released.

The movie was swallowed up into the summer hits and misses and was never heard from again, until now.

This is a great movie. It should be seen by anyone who lived during the Montgomery bus boycott or those who know nothing about it.

The movie is set in Montgomery, Alabama in 1955. It is the story of Odessa Carter (Goldberg), a maid for Miriam Thompson (Spacek) and her family. Carter rides the bus to work everyday because of the distance between her home and the Thompson home. When the bus boycott began, which was led by Rosa Parks and the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., Carter (Goldberg) supports it.

The story is seen through Thompson's daughters eyes, Mary

Catherine, played by Lexi Faith Randall. She narrates the story and the events that occur. She adds a sincerity and intensifies the emotions within the film.

Thompson, unlike most of the white people, doesn't believe the boycott is a bad thing that will lead to blacks running the country.

She feels that most of her peers are wrong so she joins the carpool set up for those who refuse to ride the bus.

The movie presents racist and prejudiced points of view, as only a good movie would, but it provides a message.

The underlying message is that everyone on this earth is created equal and should be treated as such.

The message is presented clearly through the strength of Odessa and Miriam as they join in the fight against the cruelties of racism.

Goldberg comes close to equaling her Emmy-nominated performance as Celie in *The Color Purple*. And Spacek equals her Emmy award winning performance in *A Coal Miner's Daughter*.

This movie deserves an A for dealing with the intense subject matter accurately, professionally and beautifully - despite its lack of success at the box office.

Secretary of Education visits CNC

Financial issues
and policy changes
addressed

During a visit to Christopher Newport College Nov. 15, James W. Dyke, Jr., the Secretary of Education in Virginia, addressed several financial issues as well as possible policy changes with students and faculty members.

A recent concern of many at CNC has been the proposed change of name to Christopher Newport University.

Dyke said that whether or not CNC progresses to university status is up to the College. "It's going to be an outstanding institution no matter what the name is."

Dyke added that funding will not increase just because the college gains university status.

According to the Office of Planning and Budget on campus, CNC currently receives \$2,437 per student from the

state. This is the lowest amount of any institution in the state, and it is \$1,200 below the state average. The highest amount of money per student goes to Virginia Commonwealth University, which receives \$6,278 per student.

About CNC's funding, Dyke said that he could not say why the funding level at CNC, which is set by State Council on Higher Education in Virginia recommendations, was set where it was. "A number of our institutions [in Virginia] are not funded to the percentage they would like to be. I don't know what CNC's funding will be until we look at the budget figures for this year. The situation is complicated by the fact that we are in a recession."

He added that the community college system in Virginia has been under-funded for many years, and is also a problem which needs to be dealt with.

Dyke said that the priorities of the education budget were to give support to students and student groups, and to keep Virginia's colleges and universities looking to the 21st century.

Thanksgiving service planned

The ninth annual interfaith Thanksgiving Service at Christopher Newport College will be held on Nov. 25. The service will begin at noon in room 150 of the Campus Center and will last approximately 45 minutes.

The reverend Lewis McPherrin, pastor of First Christian Church in Hampton, will preach at this service. Rev. McPherrin is Chairman of the Board of United Campus Ministries which will sponsor the service.

CNC music students, under the direction of Professor Ruth Winters, will provide a choir.

The annual Thanksgiving Service is an opportunity for the college community to celebrate together a shared religious and national heritage. It is free and open to the public; all are encouraged to attend.

ACM regional contest

Christopher Newport College finished eighth among thirty-six participating schools, on Nov. 2, in the recently concluded Association for Computing Machinery (ACM) Regional Programming Contest. CNC edged out, among others, University of Pennsylvania, University of Delaware and Georgetown University. It was the first time CNC participated in the annual contest conducted by the ACM. First, second and third place went to Virginia Tech, Drexel University and the University of Maryland respectively.

The contest was held on the campus of the University of Maryland, College Park. A total of thirty-six colleges and universities participated, including several other Virginia schools. Teams were given five hours to solve eight problems. The most number of solved problems was six. CNC solved four correctly.

The team members included: Captain Bob McKittrick, Weldon Godfrey, Jon Bentley and alternate Mike Finn.

For adults convicted of dealing drugs or using illegal substances, the law would revoke the person's license.

Dyke said that one of the major goals of the task force is to show people that "sexual assault will not be taken lightly. Now is the time [due to the attention given the Thomas Confirmation Hearings] to act on sexual harassment and assault."

Dyke added that a major obstacle concerning the prosecution of sex offenders is the victim's unwillingness to step forward with the accusation for fear of being "put on trial" him/herself. To that effort, Dyke said that the task force was trying to find ways to keep the victim from "being a victim twice" when the trial approaches and when the defense attorney starts questioning the victim. "We want to preserve the options available, and make the victim as comfortable as possible."

Dyke said that the task force is in the process of drafting a set of principles which will be given to all victims of sexual assault on college campuses.

Concerning AIDS and contraceptive commercials being aired on television, Dyke said that condom ads in Virginia were a very controversial subject.

He said that the Commonwealth was instead implementing a curriculum to teach children about venereal disease in middle school and high school.

CAREER CORNER

What do employers want?

The decisions you make about your career will probably be some of the most difficult you will ever have to make. It seems ironic, given the importance of making job decisions, that many students are not aware of what employers look for in an employee. This is particularly distressing because many students have what employers are seeking but do not know it. In order to communicate and represent yourself well with employers, it is necessary to know what your skills, abilities and qualities are.

The College Placement Council has asked top college recruiters what makes some students particularly attractive to hire. The following list includes many of their answers. Use this as a starting point to assess and clarify many of your qualities and capabilities. Do not remain a well kept secret to yourself and others.

Motivation: Do you have a positive attitude? Are you success and goal oriented? Do you want to make positive things happen? Do you strive to solve problems and overcome obstacles?

Ability to Communicate: Do you have the ability to organize your thoughts and ideas effectively? Can you express them clearly when speaking or writing? Can you present your ideas to others in a persuasive way?

Intelligence: Do you have the ability to understand a job assignment, learn the details of an operation and contribute new, original ideas to your work?

Self Confidence: Do you demonstrate a sense of maturity and direction that enables you to deal positively and effectively with situations and people?

Willingness to Accept Responsibility: Are you someone who recognizes what needs to be done and is willing to do it?

Initiative: Do you have the ability to identify purposeful work and to take action?

Leadership: Can you guide and direct so as to obtain a recognized objective?

Energy Level: Do you demonstrate a forcefulness and capacity to make things move ahead?

Imagination: Can you confront and deal with problems which may not have standard solutions?

Flexibility: Are you capable of change and receptive to new situations and ideas? Do you have the capacity to effectively evaluate a variety of opinions on how to perform a task?

Interpersonal Skill: Can you bring out the best efforts of individuals so they become effective, enthusiastic members of a team?

Ability to Handle Conflict: Can you

successfully contend with stress situations and antagonisms?

Competitiveness: Do you have the capacity to compete with others and a willingness to be measured by your performance in relation to that of the competition?

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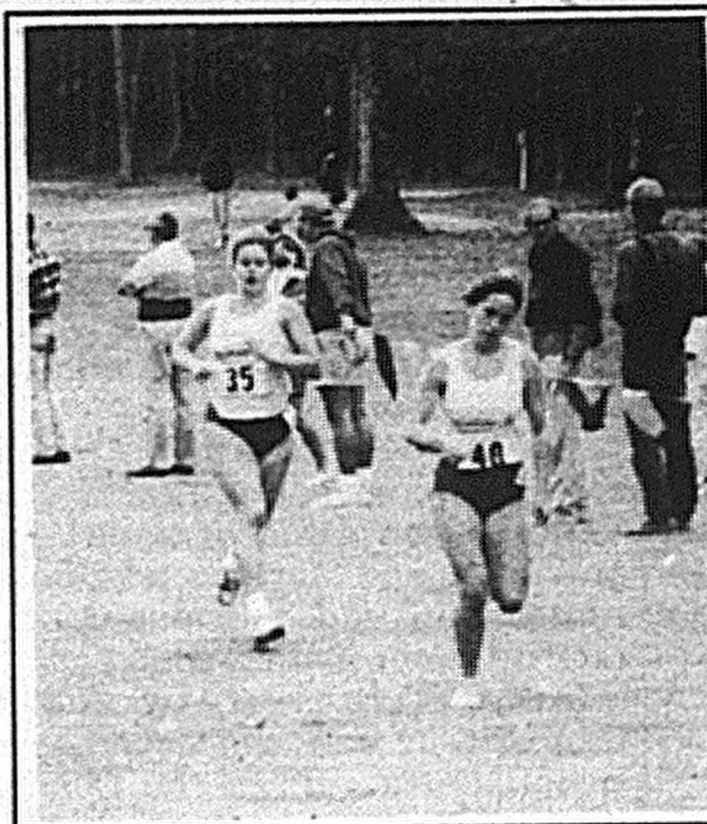
Runners give it their all in Regional meet

This past Saturday CNC hosted the regional South-Southeast cross country championships at Deer Run Golf Course. The Captains had strong team performances along with several key individual showings. However, they were unable to qualify anyone for the NCAA National Division III Championships which CNC hosts Saturday 23 on the same course.

The women placed third in the thirteen team field, but only champion Emory will represent the region at the nationals. The Lady Captains finished with 92 points, only a 28 point difference between Emory's 64. "To be within 28 points of winning the meet is great," said assistant coach Dave Sobal. The top four team scores were Emory (64), Mary Washington (77), CNC (92), Catholic (95).

Pacing the women were Maura McColgan (8th with a time of 19:35), Stephanie Baker (9th 19:36), and Jennifer Freeburn (12th 19:45). "I went out too fast and then died at the end," exclaimed an exhausted McColgan after finishing the race. McColgan added, "I ran something like a 5:40 or 5:45 for the first mile...I've never done that before." Consequently, she was in fourth position after the first mile turn. Leading the pack for the duration of the race was Cheryl Hart from Centre College with a

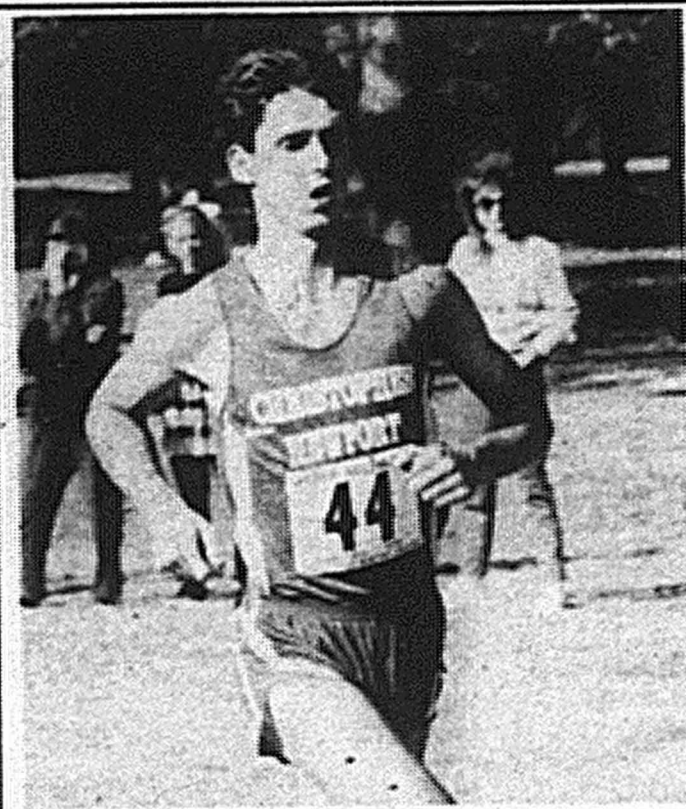

finishing time of 18:51.

One possible reason for McColgan's drop in the field was the course at Deer Run. Individuals came into the finish line at a near collapse. One woman crossed the line and fell to the ground unable to walk.

In addition, the competition caused many people to strive to run better but that took a lot out of them. According to McColgan, "I tried to be conservative

but it just didn't work...the field was real competitive."

For the first time in CNC's history there were three All-South-Southeast candidates. The qualification for getting this title is to place among the top 15 in the regional meet. Thus, McColgan, Baker, and Freeburn all were eligible.

The men also had an All-South-Southeast runner as Eugene Shum

placed tenth in 26:59, and missed qualifying for nationals by one place. Shum was in the ninth position up to the last 400 meters where he was passed by Dennis Bradecamp from Mary Washington College. "Unfortunately Gene is going to spend a lot of time over the next year wondering why he is not running in the nationals," said Sobal. According to Sobal, Shum was more concerned with the defensive aspect of the race—maintaining his ninth place position—rather than taking the offensive role—trying to catch the runner in front. "He still has to be happy with his performance though," finished Sobal.

The overall team scores were dominated by Lynchburg College led by Gregg Cavaliere who took first place honors at 25:22. In addition, Lynchburg also captured second, third, and fifth place to finish with a total of 35 points. CNC came in at fifth in the team scores with 159 points. Other top team scores were Emory (2nd, 68 points); Mary Washington (3rd, 69 points); Washington & Lee (4th, 92 points); and Catholic (6th, 174 points).

This Saturday's race will be the second time CNC has hosted the cross country national championship, the first was in 1983. The school has also hosted three regional championships.

The women's race will start at 11 a.m. Saturday near the Deer Run Golf Course clubhouse; the men will run at noon.

Soccer season ends bitterly with an added controversy

The Captains lost a heartbreaking, 2-1, decision to Virginia Wesleyan in the semi-finals of the Virginia Inter-collegiate Soccer Association (VISA) playoffs.

It was the second time this year CNC had played within a goal of the top 10 ranked Marlins. CNC started the scoring first when Demo Saras put one in the net with less than three minutes elapsed in the game.

After that score, the controversy began. In the next ten to fifteen minutes, a pair of non-calls by the referees provoked some questions. The calls, if made, would have given the Captains two penalty kicks and a possible, 3-0,

lead.

With five minutes to go in the game, goalie Mark Mury was given a red card. Mury and Jeff Barefoot both collided with a Va. Wesleyan forward on a break-away. Either Mury or Barefoot could have been given the card. Usually with only a short time left in the game the referee will not give a red card to the goalie. However, this was not the case and Mury was forced to leave the game.

Therefore, Paul Bleier had to go into the net cold with the score tied, 1-1. He was later scored on by Jon Haskins with just 1:39 remaining in the game, to finish CNC's season.

The Captains' 12-6-2 final record equalled the third best in school history.

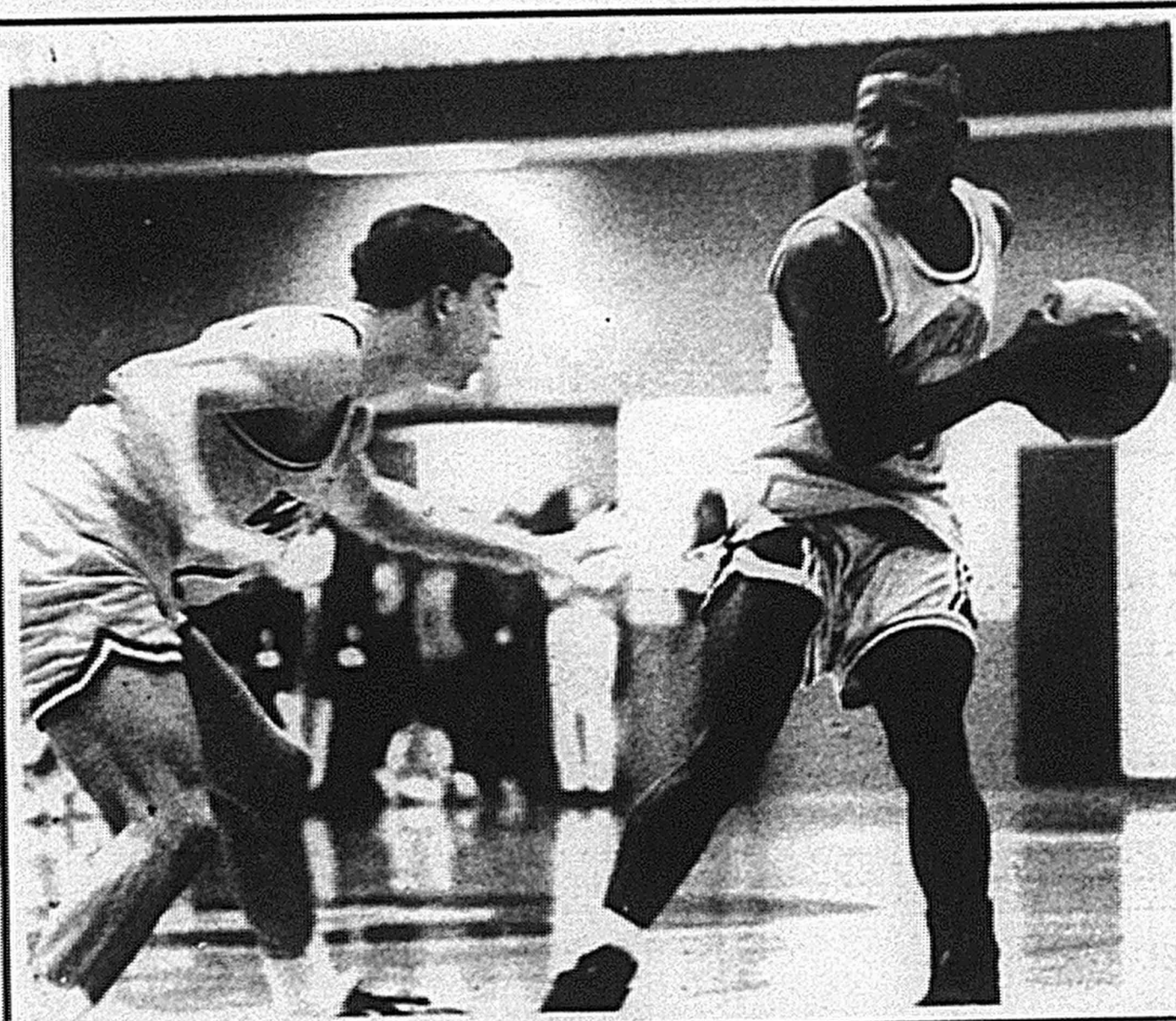
