

Dean William Parks Memorial Colloquia Series

The Dean's Colloquia Committee is pleased to announce its first offering for the 1979-80 academic year. From Tuesday, October 9, through Friday, October 12, a film classic program will be held on campus.

On Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, October 9 and 10, the movie Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf will be shown in the Campus Center Theatre beginning at 7:00 P.M.

On Thursday, October 11, Professor David Thomson of Dartmouth College will speak on the film from a professional critic's point of view at noon in the Theatre. Professor Thomson is the author of four books on the modern screen and a regular reviewer of the movies. Following his talk, a luncheon in his honor will be held in CC233 at 1:00 P.M. As is our usual practice, all members of the faculty and administration are invited to the luncheon. The cost is \$5 per person, and reservations to a total of 25 persons will be accepted by the chairman on a first come-first served basis. At 2:00 that afternoon an open seminar will be conducted by Professor Thomson in the Board Room. All members of the faculty and student body are invited to both the noon lecture and the open seminar.

On Friday, October 12, Mrs. Elizabeth Taylor Warner, one of the stars of Virginia Woolf, will speak on the film from a performer's perspective in the Theatre at noon. Because Mrs. Warner is appearing on our campus as an artist and will be addressing herself specifically to the making of Virginia Woolf, admission will be granted only to those members of the college community who have viewed the film on Tuesday or Wednesday evening in the Theatre. Number admission tickets to Mrs. Warner's talk will be given to those persons from the college at the conclusion of each showing of the film. Only 380 tickets will be distributed in keeping with Mrs. Warner's wishes and the committee's agreement with her. There will be no exceptions to this arrangement.

Following Mrs. Warner's talk, a luncheon in her honor will be held in CC233 to which members of the faculty and administration are invited. The cost will be \$5 per person and will be taken on a first come-first served basis by the committee chairman. 25 persons is again the maximum.

Please plan to attend the showing of the film and the events each day and forward your luncheon reservations to me without delay. The Committee appreciates your continued support of the series.
