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CHRISTOPHER NEWPORT SCHOLARS -- OPTIONS FOR MATURE STUDENTS

Before Susan McLaurin became a Christopher Newport Scholar this summer, she could not incorporate enough business courses in her art major to meet her goal--one day to open a gallery.

With the guidance of her advisor, Professor Jon Petruchyk, McLaurin fashioned an individualized curriculum and received the Honors Council's approval.

Now she can count Market Management (BUSN 450) and Market Theory & Analysis (BUSN 311) as well as courses in Crafts (FNAR 389), Sculpture (FNAR 351), and Etching (FNAR 395NTP) toward her major. In addition, she is exempt from other remaining curricular requirements.

She joins two other current students--Bonnie Daniel and Carol Newman--as Christopher Newport Scholars, a program designed for mature students who have proven their academic excellence.

To apply, one must submit a proposal to the Honors Council, making sure to distinguish his or her aims from those served by existing majors.

To be eligible, one must have a GPA of at least 3.5 and have earned about 75 hours. See page 133 of the current Catalog for more information.
