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Division Coordinators

In recent elections, Dr. Herrmann was selected to be the Coordinator of the Division of Social and Behavioral Sciences, and Professor Randall was selected as Coordinator of the Division of Education and Communications. Other division coordinators are: Dr. Hammer - Division of Natural and Quantitative Sciences, Dr. Nauman - Division of Arts and Letters, and Professor Vazzana - Division of Business and Economics.

The primary functions of division coordinators are to chair divisional meetings considering course or academic program proposals of member departments for the purpose of making recommendations on these matters to the Curriculum Committee, and to participate in the formation of certain special peer groups as delineated in Chapter V of the Faculty Handbook. The section of Chapter IV of the Handbook titled "The Office of Division Coordinators" will be revised in the near future to reflect the change in the functions of the office of division coordinator.

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FACULTY DEVELOPMENT GRANTS

Upon recommendations of the Faculty Advisory Committee, the Dean has awarded Faculty Development Grants to the following persons in the amounts and for the purposes indicated:

Category I. Instructional Improvement & Professional Development Category

1. Dr. Harold Cones - \$55.00 to support the purchase of one hundred reprints of his article "Principles of Pioneer Biology." The dissemination of research results is a part of the total academic research process and a reasonable number of reprints of published journal articles should be made available to the academic community.
2. Professor Richard Guthrie - \$650.00 to continue study of Sign Language and courses in the Education of the Deaf at Gallaudet College. This increases Professor Guthrie's instructional effectiveness and is appropriate given the new laws governing the educational opportunity afforded handicapped students at the college level.
3. Dr. James Hines - \$600.00 to study voice privately to increase instructional effectiveness with the CNC Choir.

4. Dr. Al Millar - \$800.00 to prepare for teaching English 300 - The Bible as Literature, by observing this course as taught at VCU.
5. Dr. Tim Morgan - \$645.00 for the purpose of conducting academic research concerning the integration of traditional historical work and oral history using the life of Indians in Virginia as the historical topic.
6. Dr. Bob Wildblood - \$440.00 to attend three week-long workshops - Part I of the Mid-Atlantic Training program. These workshops will improve his clinical and group work skills.
7. Dr. William Wolf - \$500.00 to complete academic research which will increase his instructional effectiveness.
8. Dr. Marshall Booker - \$285.00 to attend the Teaching Information Processing System three-day workshop at Duke University. This course will increase Dr. Booker's expertise in the use of the computer in teaching economics courses.
9. Professor Fran Slocumb - \$600.00 to attend the Graduate Student Professional Development Program Phase IV and the weekend workshop in Conflict Management. Both of these programs will increase her instructional effectiveness and are related to her teaching area.

Category II: Dissertation Grant

1. Professor Pat Balan - \$450.00 to support tuition and travel in connection with his dissertation.
 2. Professor Hamdi Bilici - \$1,000.00 for a dissertation grant to be applied toward research this summer at Louisiana Tech.

OFFICE OF CONTINUING STUDIES

SOC Associate Degree Program Network for Military Personnel (SOCAD)

The Office of Continuing Studies has received a letter from the Servicemen's Opportunity Colleges announcing Christopher Newport College's membership in the SOC Associate Degree Program Network for Military Personnel (SOCAD) to serve both as a Type I Member (Student Sponsoring Institution) and as a Type II Member (Institution Providing Instruction on a Major Base in the United States) effective with the Fall Term 1977. In part, this letter reads,

"Christopher Newport College is one of the 49 initial SOCAD members designated as of October tenth. We expect that at least another dozen will qualify for membership by the end of the calendar year.

This new network has been established in response to the request of the Army (Director of Education, Office of the Adjutant General) for such a program to serve more effectively its enlisted personnel. The program however is intended to be available to all ranks and all Services as requested.

On behalf of the SOC Advisory Board representing the twelve higher education associations behind SOC and the Army we commend you and your institution. Membership in this important network signifies your institution's intent and commitment to be an integral part of a plan to make an associate degree program (from a civilian institution) available on every major Army base and hopefully other Service installations in the future."

This letter culminates several months of discussions and negotiations with SOC Administrators to gain SOC recognition of the College's Associate's Degree. Associate's degrees have become important to continued relations with the military. Because SOCAD membership is very restricted - 60 schools versus 300 in SOC - the College believes that this special designation will increase the College's strength locally and will allow it to develop means to limit the power of out-of-state institutions.
