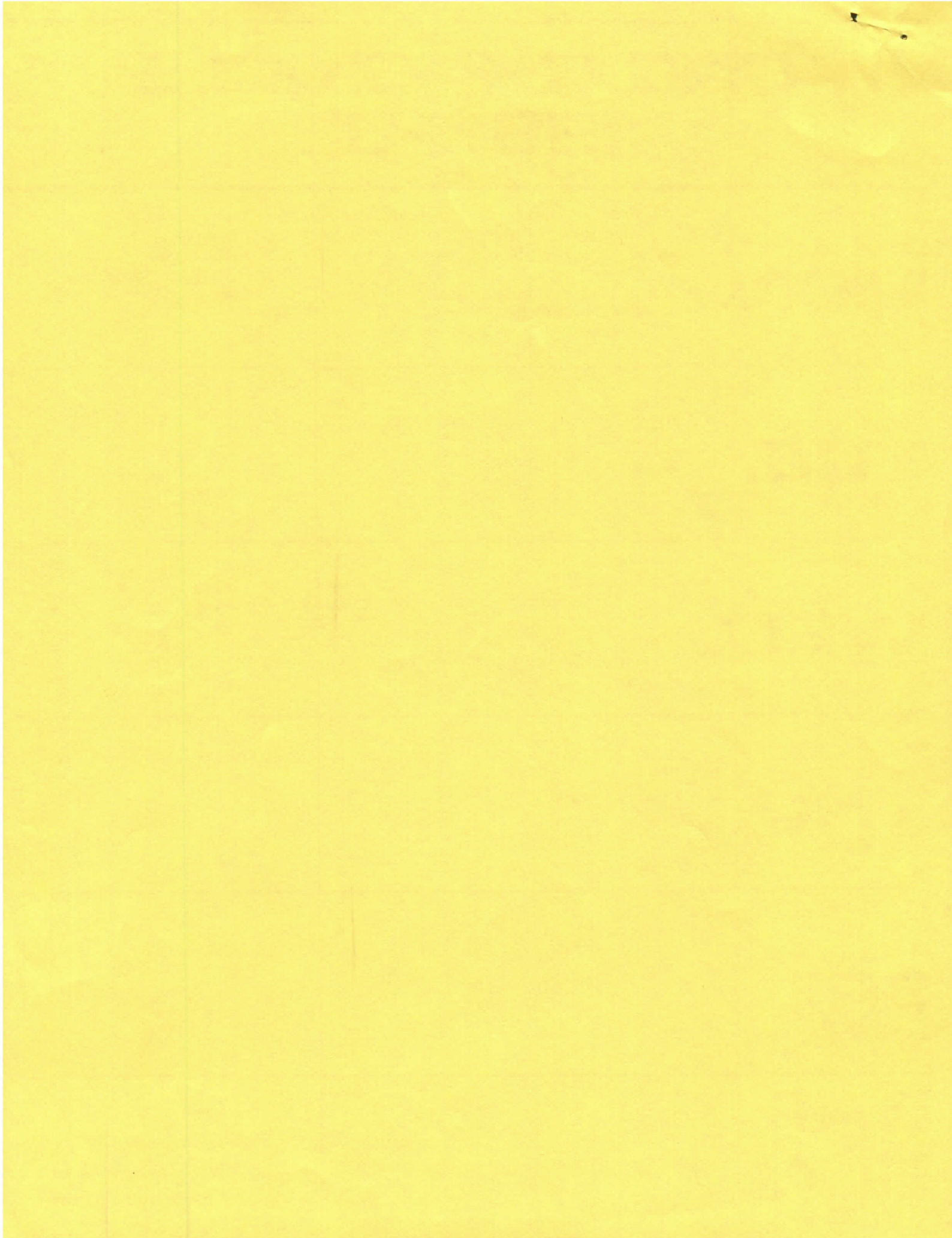

Academic Organization

On Friday, March 18, 1983, the President approved the following names and departmental alignments for the two new schools that were authorized by the Board of Visitors at its meeting of February 24, 1983:

SCHOOL OF LETTERS AND NATURAL SCIENCE, which is comprised of departments of Basic Studies, Biology and Environmental Science, Chemistry, Computer Science, English, Mathematics, Modern and Classical Languages and Literatures, Philosophy and Religious Studies, and Physics.

SCHOOL OF SOCIAL SCIENCE AND PROFESSIONAL STUDIES, which is comprised of the departments of Education, Fine and Performing Arts, History, Leisure Studies and Physical Education, Military Science, Political Science and Governmental Administration, Psychology, and Sociology and Social Work.

The new organization, which replaces the present School of Liberal Arts, Sciences, and Education, becomes effective July 1, 1983.

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Notice to Employees Covered by VSRS

The State currently deducts 5% from your semi-monthly gross pay, which is taxed, as your contribution to your VSRS coverage. Effective October 1, 1983, the State will no longer deduct that 5% of your gross pay, but will contribute for you a like amount because the General Assembly provided funds in the Appropriations Act for 1983-84 that will allow the State to pay the 5% member contribution to the VSRS. Therefore, your paycheck will reflect an increase by 5% of the gross pay you had been contributing for VSRS.

In 1980, the General Assembly created a retirement system applicable to members with no VSRS service credit prior to April 1, 1980. That retirement system placed a "cap" on the amount of retirement benefits a member may receive and also created differences in the way contributions are handled for those members when the employer elects to pay those contributions for its members.

For State employees with no VSRS service credit prior to April 1, 1980, the employer-paid member contributions will be credited to the member's account. For those State employees with VSRS service credit prior to April 1, 1980, the employer-paid contributions will be credited to the State's employer account. The effect of this is that a member with no service credit prior to April 1, 1980, may withdraw those employer-paid member contributions if he terminates employment. The member with VSRS service credit prior to April 1, 1980, will not be able to withdraw those contributions.

If a member remains in State service until retirement, it will make no difference to which account the contributions have been credited and the crediting of those contributions will not decrease his benefit.

Members with no service credit prior to April 1, 1980, will have the employer-paid member contributions added to their creditable compensation at retirement and those contributions will reflect in the average final compensation used to calculate their retirement benefit.

COMMITTEE INFORMATION & FACULTY BUSINESS

Curriculum Committee Minutes - March 17, 1983

Present: Professors Hammer (Chair), R. Hubbard, V. Maniyar, J. Jenkins, L. Olson, C. Mathews, Students Baker and Shires, and Dean Durel (ex officio)

1. March 10, 1983 minutes were approved.
2. Dr. Guthrie and Dr. Woodley presented a new course proposal, Modern Language 302, "Diction in Foreign Language for Music Students." After lengthy discussion the committee passed a motion (Jenkins, second Baker) to defer a motion on passage until pre-requisites are specified and for further information on music program, i.e. use of this course as an UL elective in humanities (out of department).
3. A proposal by the Military Science Department for increase in credit for all Military Science courses (from 2-1-1 to 3-2-1) was forwarded by Dean Durel and briefly discussed. The Military Science Department will be requested to meet with the committee after Spring Break to discuss this further.
4. Following discussion of the Pass/Fail option, the committee noted need for further clarification. This will be presented at the next meeting.
5. Dr. Hammer noted the filling agenda, adding the reminder that recent faculty recommendations addressing the duties of this committee regarding "periodic curricu-

lum review" will require the establishment by this committee of systematic procedures for curriculum review.

6. Meeting adjourned by unanimous decree and mass exodus for Spring Break!
