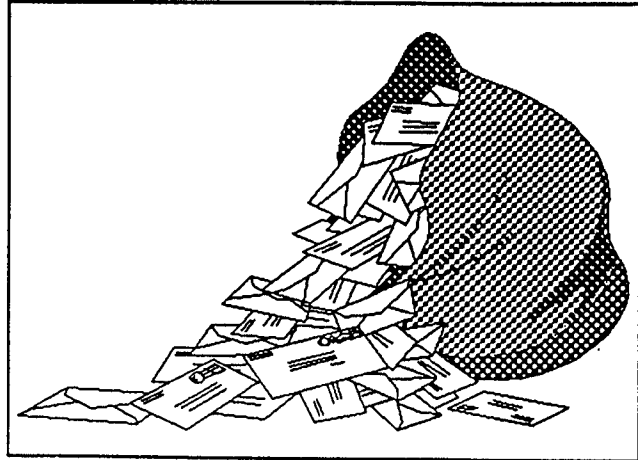
FULBRIGHT SCHOLAR PROGRAM -- The 1994-1995 competition for awards under the Fulbright Scholar Program for faculty lecturing and researching abroad opened March 1. Each year more than 1,000 Fulbright grants are awarded to U. S. faculty and professionals. Grantees come from literally every area of the humanities, social sciences and the physical sciences, as well as from applied fields such as business, law and TEFL. All types of institutions participate in the program. Grantees come from nearly 450 colleges and universities: major research universities, liberal arts colleges, community and junior colleges, state-supported comprehensive universities and historically black colleges and universities.
