## Global View Courses Added to Curriculum

Over the past several years, many colleges and universities have incorporated a global view concept into their distribution requirements. In general, a global view course can be described as one that examines the influence of various cultures on a given academic discipline. The concept is intended to transcend any one undergraduate major by being at the introductory level, allowing students from many disciplines to study their subject especially in light of non-Western cultures.

The idea of global view courses at CNC arose approximately three years ago when a special task force sought to redefine the distribution requirements. Its mission accomplished, the task force disbanded, leaving the global concept with the Curriculum Committee. The exact criteria for the concept remained undefined until last September, when the Curriculum Committee drafted an operational definition, which states: "The course should involve either a comparative examination of representative cultures around the world or the application and examination of themes to cross-cultural data. The course should include a significant integration of non-Western elements. These non-Western elements must be a fully integrated aspect of the course, not an addition which could easily be eliminated. The content — and not simply the method — of the discipline must fit these criteria".

Several academic departments have begun developing new courses or course modifications to meet the preceding criteria. Most of these have yet to be approved. Dr. Tim Morgan, chairman of the History department, has proposed a new two-semester

history sequence. Designated History 111-112, the first semester would survey the following distinct civilizations: the Near, Middle, and Far East; Africa, Europe, and Latin America. The second semester would cover the 15th, 16th, and 17th-centuries, known as the Age of Exploration.

Dr. Robert Doane, chairman of the Political Science and Governmental Administration department, says that meeting the global criteria will be relatively easy. Two of the department's upper level courses, International Relations and Comparative Politics, are inherently global, according to Doane. An introductory global course would draw much of its content from these courses. Doane is now in the process of selecting a text for the new course.

Regardless of the global objective, the Sociology department had planned a restructuring of its introductory courses to include a global view. Their two-semester sequence would examine the history of society and the socialization processes of other cultures, using anthropological studies. *Human Societies* by Lenski has been chosen as the text for the first semester. Ruth Kernodle, department chairman, is developing the text for the second semester.

The earliest the global view concept can be implemented is fall 1986, but may be delayed for a year. Contributing to the delay are the proposing, consideration, and subsequent reconsideration of new courses, questions concerning the interpretation of objectives, and the choice of texts. Dr. Lee Olson, Chairman of the Curriculum Committee, says that the process is about halfway finished and in a state of flux.

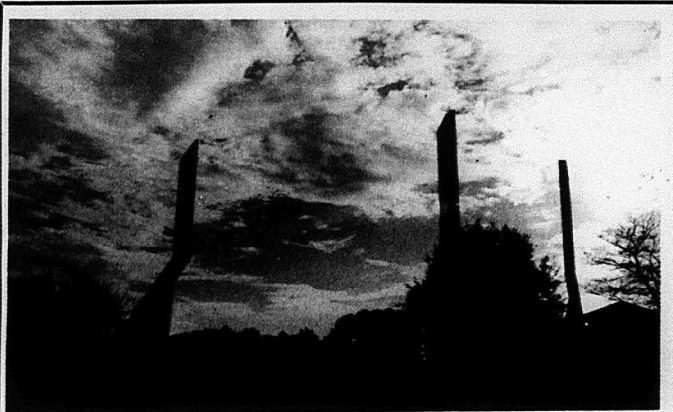

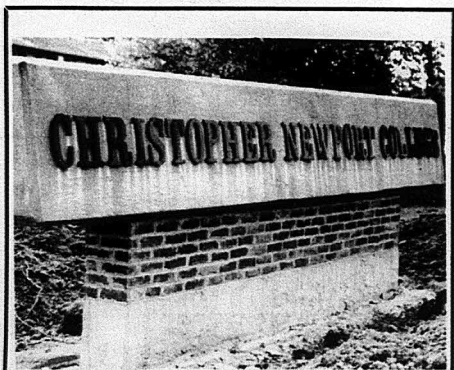

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## Sailing Club Looking For Larger Membership

Even though the fall sailing season is over, coach Mark Gibbons is looking forward to an even more successful spring season which begins in early March. His main concern for the upcoming season is developing a bigger team. At present, the sailing team has approximately eleven male team members and three female team members. He'd like to have an additional six or seven males and possibly ten more females. This is so the team will have enough members to participate in all of the regattas (competitions) and still have alternates as well. The objective is to encourage as many people as possible to come out and give this varsity sport a try. Many students are unaware that there is a female team as well as a male team. Coach Gibbons believes that, "if we could get more people out for the sailing team, we could better our already successful (Mid-Atlantic Inter-collegiate Sailing Association) MAISA standing."

The male sailing team has proven their talent this past fall with their new coach. In their first regatta, CNC placed second to Navy, an Ivy League school. Then

at the Dinghy Eliminations CNC placed sixth, which qualified them for the War Memorial regatta in New York City. In New York, CNC placed eighth in their region which means that CNC is ranked number eight in the MAISA division. This division is considered the most competitive in the nation since it consists primarily of Ivy League schools. "We've also got some tough competition at our back door — ODU," Gibbons added.

The CNC sailing team has the opportunity to be "tough competition" for the top ten teams in the nation if they can continue their success as seen in the fall. "If a team has one or two good sailors, the team can be a winner. What I'm looking for is some good sailors, or people who are willing to learn (women as well), to give my ever-consistent leading sailor, Charlie Brewer some competition. This would make our team even better."

During the regular season the team practices from 3:30-5:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings at the Warwick Yacht Club. "We save Fridays and Mondays for travel and rest days," Gibbons said. The regattas are held on Saturday and Sundays and the team brings

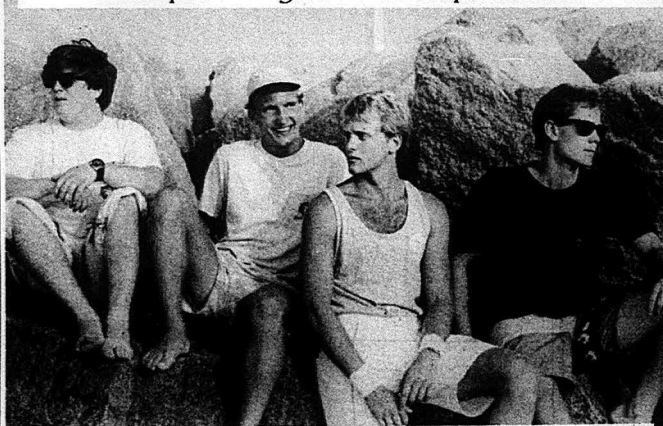
seven sailors plus alternates to each weekend regatta.

Gibbons feels that it's a good opportunity for students to travel to other schools and compete against top national teams as well as possibly getting national attention. The monthly magazine, *Yacht Racing and Cruising* publishes stories and statistics on top college sailing teams throughout the nation. Coach Gibbons thinks, "It would be nice for our team to get national recognition. I think it's possible!"

One of the newest attractions coming to the team this spring is the four new sail boats called, "Flying Juniors." "One of our biggest disadvantages this past fall was waiting for the arrival of our new boats," said Gibbons. He hopes that this team will rise up in the MAISA standings this spring because the new boats will be available for practice.

The sailing team will be starting from a good point this spring, and there are positions available on the team. The team is also looking for a team manager to prepare the boats for practice; this is a paid position. Coach Gibbons realistically believes that "Number one ranked Navy is NOT unbeatable!"

# Schutz, First Baroque Composer, Remembered

By now it is common knowledge that 1985 marks the three-hundredth anniversary of the births of Johann Sebastian Bach and Frederic Handel. But have you ever heard of their predecessor, Heinrich Schutz, the first baroque composer, who was born four-hundred years ago?

In a recent lecture CNC Music professor Dr. Clyde Brockett outlined a biography of Schutz, who has been recognized by music critics as "the first great German composer." Brockett has donated two biographies of Schutz to the Captain John Smith Library — one by H. J. Moser and one by Andre Pierre, the latter in French. Brockett jokingly refers to Pierre as CNC's "great-grand-teacher" because the Sorbonne professor taught Paul Henry Loring who later taught Brockett.

Schutz was born Oct. 8, 1585

in what is now a part of Saxony, 20 miles from Handel's birthplace and 50 miles from Bach's birthplace. He was the oldest of six or eight children. He was encouraged by his parents to study law, but made music a career, studying at the German school Kassel.

Life at Kassel was unusual. The music students, young boys, had to wear black robes, converse in French or Latin, wait on tables, and drink beer which was believed to be good for their voices. Schutz's only teacher was the Venetian choir director of the Church of St. Mark, Gabrieli, a musician who brass music fans recognize as the father of brass compositions.

Schutz began to compose music in 1610. He translated many musical pieces of the Roman Catholic Church into German Lutheran works. The 1630s and the 1640s were the height of

his creative period. In 1636 he composed *Musikalische Exequiem*, a mature German requiem, or music for the dead. No other German requiem was written until Johannes Brahms wrote *A German Requiem* in the 1800s.

An early piece was the *Symphonae Sacrae*, a sacred Latin anthem. His other major works include the *Easter Oratorio*, the *Christmas Oratorio*, the *Seven Last Words of Christ on the Cross*, and the *St. Luke Passion*, all in German. By 1650 Schutz was recognized internationally as the best German composer of his time.

Schutz died at 82. His printed motto was *Vitabit Libitinan* or "He Will Outlive Death."

Brockett points out that since the lecture, several people have brought to his attention articles and musical collections on Schutz and his work.

**BASKETBALL** - Christopher Newport's most hopeful basketball season in several years opens on a difficult note, as the Captains travel to meet VMI.

The Keydets, coming off a 16-14 season, appear strong again and likely will once again contend for the Southern Conference championship. The two teams have met twice before. VMI has won both encounters, 86-66, in 1974-75, and 75-49, in 1978-79.

Coach C. J. Woollum greets three starters back from last year's 13-14 team, headed by All-America candidate Buck Moore. He earned first team All-Dixie Conference honors last year with an 18.2 scoring average and 8.2 rebound mark. Also back up front are 6-3 senior Broderick Roney (7.6 ppg, 5.1 rpg), 6-5 senior Joel Fortune (6.1 ppg, 9.0 rpg), 6-7 junior Carl Haynes (5.5 ppg, 5.8 rpg) and 6-6 sophomore Mark Bryson (3.1 ppg, 4.5 rpg).

In the backcourt Woollum must find replacements for Bobby Griffin (13.7 ppg) and Jimmy Deans (11.1), but things look good. Transfer Jerome Nicholson and freshman Rodney Bradshaw are a couple of exciting point guards, while senior Keith Cobb (3.6 ppg) is handling

the No. 2 guard slot well backed up by junior Brian Schuhart.

Transfer Walter Moody, 6-1, can fill in at several spots, while 6-0 sophomore Bev Vaughan and 6-0 soph Greg Winbush add more depth.

The Captains will have rough early going with games against VMI, Randolph-Macon, Atlantic Christian, Roanoke, William & Mary and several others all before Christmas.

**CROSS COUNTRY** - Freshman Leigh Anne Beale has become CNC's first female runner to qualify for the NCAA Division III National Championships in Cross Country.

Beale finished second at the South Regional in Atlanta Saturday, with a time of 20:01 over the very difficult course. She will compete Saturday in the nationals on the same course. CNC's women's team took fourth place in the regionals, as freshman Kim Angevine finished ninth, also winning All-Region honors.

Meanwhile, the CNC men had a more difficult time. All-America Dan Pittman, who has been ill for more than a month, was unable to finish, and CNC did not score as a team.

Coach Susan Walthall and the Lady Captains are ready, ready to take on the defending NCAA Division III National Champions, the University of Scranton, Pennsylvania. But before the January sixth confrontation the Lady Captains will have seven other games, six of those before Christmas.

The first game of the '85-'86 season will be played at home Nov. 22, 7:30 p.m.

The CNC Captains traveled to Lynchburg to play Liberty University in the first round of the VISA (Virginia Intercollegiate Soccer Association) playoffs. The Captains lost in a penalty kick shoot 5-4, after playing to a 0-0 tie at the end of regulation time.

Bill Dittmar, Jeff Sahms, Herbie Stewart, John Gallarini and Tom Hammond represented The Captains in the penalty kick shoot out. Mark Morrow replaced Rick Longobardi in goal for The Captains during the shoot out.

"Liberty University played good solid defense and a direct brand of soccer. We adjusted our game to play on a small field well and played very well. We had opportunities to score but were unable to capitalize, we were unlucky," explained Coach Seth Roland. "It was a fairly even game. We have rediscovered the intensity and heat in the last three games we had in the beginning of the season. We played very good soccer against Liberty but we were unfortunate." Roland went on to express his displeasure about the penalty kick shootout. **SOCCER (12-6-2, 4-2-1)** - After 1,920 minutes of soccer, one kick by Liberty University's Paul Annan finally put an end to Christopher Newport's best soccer season ever.

Annan, the Flames' goalkeeper, hit the fifth, and winning, penalty kick, giving Liberty a 5-4 win in a shootout in the semi-finals of the Virginia Intercollegiate Soccer Association playoffs. Bill Dittmar, Jeff Sahms, Tom Hammond and John Gallarini all scored on their kicks for the Captains, but Liberty buried five near perfect shots to advance to the finals against Randolph-Macon.

The two teams battled to a thrilling scoreless tie through two overtimes which had the large Liberty crowd excited throughout. Liberty had entered the game as the No. 10 ranked team in Divi-

sion II with a 13-1-3 record.

It ended CNC's record-setting season. New marks included most victories (12), most shutouts (11), most goals (56), best record (12-6-2), most shutouts by a goalkeeper (nine by Rick Longobardi) and most assists (12 by Chris Frazier). Also, CNC's three straight season-opening wins stretched a winning streak to six, equaling the school mark.
