

FACULTY NEWS

JOHN HARWOOD will receive his Ph.D. in English on May 14 from the University of Nebraska. His dissertation examined the argument that literature is a means of moral instruction and focussed specifically on the ways in which Restoration comedy has been regarded as moral.

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On Wednesday, April 13, MARSHALL BOOKER represented CNC at the University of Virginia School of Medicine for a day-long conference, "A Day at the Medical Center." On Thursday, April 14, Marshall presented a paper at the Cultural Economics Session of the Virginia Association of Economics Conference in Roanoke. His paper was entitled: "Museums-The Heart of the Town-Aesthetic Pulse of the People or Epitome of Economic Inefficiency." On behalf of the Talented and Gifted Committee of Surry County Public Schools, I am writing to request your assistance in our program planning for 1977-78. An essential component of our proposed service for next year involves the cooperation of area colleges, universities, and apprentice programs.

As currently planned, high school students who have been identified as superior learners will be enrolled in a daily one hour seminar where they will have an opportunity to pursue individual interests. After an initial orientation to research categories and methodology, each student would select a subject or topic which he would pursue in depth. It would be at this point that the program coordinator would contact interested college and apprenticeship teachers and/or outstanding seniors and graduate students in the designated areas. The representatives would work with individuals and small groups of students on concentrated study and research projects in the preferred area. Time spent by the representative in the school system could be varied according to the representative's obligations. Limited compensation and travel allowance would be available from the school system.

I am writing at this time to determine the interest and availability of representatives of your institution for this "visiting professorship" proposal. In order that the Committee will have sufficient time to alter or amend plans for next year, please reply on or before May 2, 1977.

National Foreign Language Week, 1977

National Foreign Language Week gives all of us the opportunity to examine the importance of foreign language study and to reassess the position of language instruction in our educational system.

When I was Governor of Georgia, I was pleased to invite all foreign language teachers to Atlanta in 1972 to attend a national convention on the teaching of foreign languages. My awareness of the importance of linguistic skills has been sharpened by my travels in Latin America. I learned the enormous value of being able to communicate freely and directly on a person-to-person basis.

As President I have come to believe even more strongly in the benefits of mastering a foreign language. As time allows, I work to improve my own fluency in Spanish, and members of my family are actively studying this language.

I appreciate the good work of our nation's foreign language teachers in constantly upgrading their professional standards, and I share their concern about declining enrollments in this area during recent years.

I think this observance provides a positive step in the direction of encouraging useful and rewarding language study at all levels of education and on through adult life.

Friendly and peaceful relations among nations depend greatly on improved communication between their individual citizens. Becoming fluent in another language is one of the finest ways of achieving such improved communication and promoting better international understanding and goodwill. In the spirit of this Week, I commend all those who are currently teaching or studying a foreign language, and I encourage other fellow citizens to do so.

BOOK REQUESTS FOR 1977/78

Since the date for turning in book requests to Faculty-Library Coordinators was inadvertently printed in the April 15, 1977 CNC Chronicle calendar, to clarify the situation, we feel that we need to reprint the notice that was printed in the April 8, 1977 Chronicle.

Since there will be no funds available from the state appropriated budget for the purchase of new books during 1977/78 due to the reversion of monies to the state, no funds will be allocated to departments for the purchase of books during April of this year as has been the practice in past years. We anticipate that remaining state funds will only be sufficient for the continuation of present periodical subscriptions during 1977/78 and for the continuation of reference services such as the Wilson periodical indexes, the National Union Catalog and a few annual yearbooks. Fortunately, however, funds should be available for the purchase of books during 1977/78 as a result of this year's annual college fund drive. The faculty will be notified at the beginning of the fall term of the amount of money available to them for the purchase of books. The library would like to express appreciation to those faculty members who have supported the library during the annual fund drive.
